Saturday March 24 at the Surf Club

The DC Blues Society proudly presents Clarence 'The Bluesman Turner and Mike Westcott & Blues on Board at Chick Hall's Surf Club. The music starts around 9 PM and go until about 1 AM. Tickets cost \$15 at the door, and advance tickets will cost \$10 for members and \$12 for nonmembers. Clarence Turner was the winner of the Society's 2006 Battle of the Blues and was a finalist at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Listening to some of his father's records led

to his love of the blues and in the past few years his lively performances that make the audience part of the show have become quite popular as he brings together a bunch of influences including Muddy Waters, B.B. King and Freddie King into his ebullient approach. Mike Westcott & Blues on Board have gone to Memphis for the third consecutive year for the IBC. In 2005, they represented the DC Blues Society, having won our Battle of the Blues the previous year. In 2006 they represented the Frederick Blues Society and this past year they represented the River City (Richmond) Blues Society. Mike and his band play a rocking style of blues with Mike's performances bring together passion and fiery guitar.

Together the two will put on a terrific evening of music. We certainly hope to see you there.

Having more volunteers with Microsoft Office experience AND versed in DCBS operations would have provided the necessary redundancy that could have prevented the newsletter delay. The slow arrival of the newsletter also revives recollections of our attempt to gauge member opinion about electronically delivering the newsletter. While the survey was incomplete, an overwhelming number of respondents were for receiving the newsletter by email or web download. In an effort to get some version of the newsletter to you (before the March issue arrived) we sent it by email to all members with email addresses. The newsletter was also mailed to all members.

One opportunity for DCBS to more efficiently and timely deliver the newsletter is to send it by email regularly. You will have the chance to opt out of email delivery and a printed copy will be mailed to you. Printed copies will continue to be delivered to members without email addresses. Taking this action will reduce the expenses of printing and delivering the newsletter, saving more money for the annual festival, Blues in the School activities, and special events.

While the newsletter's major delay was not an auspicious start to our 20th anniversary year, we will continue to do most things right. One key indicator is membership growth. Since December we've added another 20 members. Thanks and welcome new members! Our first show of the year with Bobby Parker was a blast and a success in every other way.

Bobby Parker at the Surf Club

The night of Feb. 10 was a perfect local blues trifecta for this author: my first live exposure to the D.C. Blues Society, Bobby Parker and the Surf Club. Several days earlier, I'd started up a conversation on the Metro with someone who turned out to be DCBS President Felix McLairen. I like blues and had heard about the Society and had been wanting to check it out, and he encouraged me to come to their next gig, Bobby Parker and the Blues Night Band.

I decided to do that, and wasn't at all disappointed. Bobby Parker and his band were great to listen as well as dance to, as evidenced







by the large number of folks getting down on the dance floor. Bobby played a good variety of fast and slow tunes, and both his guitar-playing and singing were skilful, heartfelt and extremely energetic. The sax player was also excellent, including offering up a couple of well-played (and much-appreciated) solo riffs. I think I and the other patrons were especially tickled the several times Bobby came down from the stage and mingled with us on the floor, even as far back as the bar. All of a sudden, you wouldn't see him on stage but would hear him sing-

ing and playing, and you'd turn around and he'd be there right next to you.

The crowd was great: friendly, funky and one of the most diverse I've ever seen in the D.C./Baltimore area. And people wore everything from T-shirts and jeans to suits and flamboyant dresses and outfits. Chick Hall's Surf Club is an excellent venue. It's very spacious, with a large and well-kept dance floor. This meant that even though there were often many dancers out there, we weren't stepping on each other's feet and elbowing each other like in many other music joints, which was a nice change. And I know some folks may think blues aren't as "authentic" without some smoke hanging in the air, but I person-

ally like the fact that you don't have to worry about coughing up a lung while enjoying great blues music. The only downside to the Surf Club is the food – very basic bar grub, with not many choices – so you'll probably want to eat before you go there.

Big Pete Pearson

While the back of the CD cover for **I'm Here** Baby (Blue Witch) calls Phoenix based Big Pete Pearson a shouter, he comes across more like James Cotton crossed with a bit of Lonnie Brooks. The album is roduced by Bob Corritore and has appearances by Ike Turner, Johnny Dyer, Joey Francesco, Leon Blue, Kid Ramos and W.C.Clark. The opening Too Many Drivers is a rocking shuffle in the vein Cotton excelled at with Matt Bishop providing rollicking piano as Chris James and Johnny Rapp on guitar push the groove while Corritore wails on harp. Its a good indication of what's to come on this set of straight, no chaser blues. Leon Blue handles the ivories and Corritore is on chromatic harp on a nice version of Tin Pan Alley with a gritty vocal. A good song writer, Pearson's original The Way I See It, has him reaching down in the alley on his vocal, while Worried About My Baby is an easy rocking number with Johnny Dyer contributing a nice harp break on a recording that would have been at home on a vintage Chicago blues collection. I'm Here Baby, is a slow-drag bump and grind number that Pearson just pours his heart into. Ike Turner and Joey DeFrancesco are present for Big Legged Woman, a number that brings Lonnie Brooks to mind while a more West Coast flavor is on the evocative rendition of Percy Mayfield's The Highway Is Like a Woman. Cousin W.C. Clark join on a spirited blues medley, trading verses and songs as well as the closing Texas Blues Memories. Possum Up the Tree, with Kid Ramos on guitar evokes vintage Muddy Waters. Down home flavor is added to the rendition of Natural Ball. While Texas born, Big Pete's music sounds like he was in Chicago, not Phoenix, the past fifty years. This

is an exhilarating blues disc that certainly should make him a singer in demand on the hopefully reviving blues circuit. This is a good one. Check out www.bluewitchrecords.com or www.bigpetepearson.net for more information.

Coco Montoya

Powerhouse guitarist Coco Montova has a new Alligator CD, **Dirty Deal**, full of his stomping blues-rock as well some fine straight blues. Produced in part by Little Feat's Paul Barrere, it opens on a hard rocking vein with Last Dirty Deal, followed by a nice treatment of John Mooney's Three Sides to Every Story, and Lloyd Jones' funky Love Gotcha. He certainly knows good songs to cover including Otis Rush's It Takes Time as well as Johnny Copeland's It's My Own Tears, Albert Collins' Put the Shoe on the Other Foot, Lowell Fulson's It's All Your Fault and Mike Andersen's How Do You Sleep at Night. He does more than replicate the earlier recordings, placing his stamp on them. It's My Own Tears is probably the best performance here with a terrific vocal. Montova may not be a great singer but he capably invests the vocals with plenty of passion. It is his guitar that will get the most attention with his driving and imaginative playing and the performances here certainly demonstrate why he has developed a substantial following.

Michael Power

Michael Powers received much acclaim for his Onyx Root recording with his interesting take on the blues mixed in with some psychedlic rock. His latest Barycon release, **Prodigal Son**, starts off as it will be more a rock vein with the opening over-the-top rocked out rendition of Freddie King's recording of Goin' Down. I find the next number, It's a Bloody Life, a bit more to my taste with an appealing raspy vocal, an intriguing mix of acoustic and electric guitar in the backing and a hint of John lee Hooker's influence. The title track benefits from not being cranked up as Power updates the biblical tale. White Lightning is an strong funky number while Wild Side has Powers rocking out again before Powers evokes Bruce Springsteen vein for the reflective Every Grain of Sand. Lay the Hootch is another rocking number with some nice piano followed by the fast walking tempo of Oh John, with a nice buzzing guitar solo, followed by a some rock flavor on Signed D.C., as he sings "That nobody cares, nobody cares, for me." Compassion is an attractive acoustic instrumental with a tinge of country-folk flavor that suggests Powers musical influences are very broad indeed and followed by a bit of hokum on You Got To Go Down, with a bit of skiffle feel with some nice acoustic guitar from Powers and a washboard in the backing, followed by a rousing rendition of the Tiny Bradshaw's The Train kept a Rollin, perhaps channeled through Aerosmith more than Johnny Burnette. If one was going to call this a strong rock record I would not argue. At the same time, there is more than enough here of a blues nature to also describe this as a fine blues recording with some nice rock flavoring and if I find the hard rock moments the least appealing to these ears, I won't dispute there is plenty of gold to

be heard here.

The Sean Carney Band

Winner of the 2007 International Blues Challenge, The Sean Carney Band is no Johnny come lately. Carney has been an important part of the Columbus, Ohio blues scene for many years and participated in the IBC several years ago backing up finalist Teeny Tucker. Carney has recorded several times and his CD, Life of Ease (Nite Owlz Records, demonstrates the appeal of his music that led to his winning in Memphis. Carney is a terrific guitarist with a crisp, swinging attack, a solid songwriter and his band is a terrific band that can cover a lot of territory from uptown jump blues and swing to a more downhome groove as on *Pennies & Teardrops*. As a vocalist Carney evokes Jimmy Witherspoon on the title track and at other times suggests Duke Robillard, as on the atmospheric I've Got a Gypsy Woman. Solid remakes of T-Bone Walker's I Know Your Wig Is Gone and Pee Wee Crayton's When It Rains It Pours, shows that Duke Robillard isn't the only one who can channel Walker's pioneering style. The guest spots include the late Joe Weaver's marvelous updating of Casey Bill Weldon's Outskirts of Town (credited to Louis Jordan), Willie Pooch's fine treatment of Lowell Fulson's Tramp and Teeny Tucker, daughter of Tiny Tucker, filling up the room with the fine I Live

Alone. Special note should be made of the fine playing of saxophonist Gene Walker, a King Curtis protege on three selections. Thirteen track are studio recordings, and three are live recordings, including two renditions of two songs among the studio recordings and this is an excellent disc that is available from www. cdbaby.com.

Freddie Roulette

Long before Chris Strachwitz issued his first collection of **Sacred Steel** recordings on Arhoolie, guitarist Freddie Roulette recorded on lap steel on a variety of recordings including Earl Hooker's classic Arhoolie album, **Two Bugs and a Roach**, Big Moose Walker's great 45, *Ramblin' Woman*, and the Chicago Blues Stars. What stood out was the vocalized quality of his playing with his playing evoking trains, howling dogs and other sounds in a fashion that the sacred steel players and a few other guitarists do today (Derek Trucks being a notable one).

Roulette has lived in the San Francisco area over three and a half decades. Back in 1997, he had a terrific album on Hi Horse, **Back in Chicago**, where he was backed by the late Willie Kent and his excellent band. Now guitarist Henry Kaiser has produced a new release by Roulette, **Man of**

Steel, on the German Tradition & Moderne label. Certainly it provides enough space for Roulette to display his considerable talents, but the presence of several other guitarists, some of whom also play slide provide for what is overall a less satisfying recording. It opens with Roulette reviving the Johnny Taylor/Albert King classic Breaking Up Somebody's Home, with some startling playing but a lesser vocal, followed by Washington Phillips' Tattler on which David Lindley takes the vocal lead and adds slide. Once one gets past the limited vocal by Roulette on the simple lyrics of You Got To Funkifize, one hears nice playing from Roulette but perhaps too much from Kaiser for these ears. With Ken Emerson providing a foundation on his lap steel, Roulette imaginatively takes lead on a reworking of Lee Morgan's Sidewinder, before either Kaiser or Phil Emerson takes a nice solo. Roulette's vocal comes off better on Willie Nelson's *Nightlife* with his lap steel embellishments behind his vocal a nice touch. A Hawaiian instrumental How Do Ya Do? provides nice lap steel playing from Roulette and Ken Emerson, and is followed down by a slowed down, stop-time rendition of Arthur Crudup's *That's Allright Mama*, with a nice vocal by Ken Emerson. It is a wide-ranging set with fine work by Roulette covering a variety of musical styles with some fine ensemble playing but not as satisfying as the Hi Horse disc.

Billy Gibson

Born in Mississippi where he developed his distinctive soulful singing and harp, Billy Gibson has established himself as among the strongest blues acts in the Memphis area today. Gibson has a new album on Inside Sounds, **Southern Livin'**, that focuses on his marvelous vocals although he does not ignore his harp. Gibson's band includes guitarist David Bowen and bassist James Jackson, both veterans of Albert King's band along with drummer Cedric Keel and keyboardist Charlie Wood along with some taut horns on several tracks and guest appearances from guitarists Preston Shannon and Daddy

Mack Orr. Bowen's original Fireman opens with Bowen's guitar evoking Albert King before Gibson's delivery of the clever lyric. Bowen & Gibson collaborated on Mississippi, a funky celebration his roots and the state's people with a short harp break. Preston Shannon guests on guitar on Bowen's I'm Single, a rocking shuffle about no longer being tied up and out having fun while *Too Many Times*, is a soul-blues ballad reflecting on a relation gone bad as his woman tries to take two and make three with a killer line about how hard it is to forget her for as Willie Nelson says "you're always be on my mind." Gibson's Hey Hey Pretty Baby. has him telling is woman he is going to rock and sock it to his woman that she'll know it can't be wrong, throwing in a short, focused chromatic harp-break. One of three covers included here is a tasty reworking of Sam Myers, I Got a Thing for the Voodoo Woman. There is hardly anything i can fault on this impressive release. The band is tight and Bowen and Wood are as impressive on their instruments as Gibson is on harp, but the focus remains on the songs and Gibson's authoritative and convincing vocals. Highly recommended.



Blues in the Schools Update by Chet Hines

It was 11 AM on Wed, Jan. 23rd when 200 children from River Terrace Elementary School walked in the auditorium and sat staring in space wondering just why they were summoned there. Without warning a rather large black man belted out "Good Morning Boys and Girls, children of all ages, you are about to be part of the blues in the key of life." Behind him stood three men looking at the kids and holding objects that seemed a little out of place for this early hour. The big guy talked about the blues musical history and why it just might be something they (the kids needed to know about).

Suddenly the room was filled with the gut-wrenching sound of a guitar being played by a man who calls himself, Memphis Gold. The kids started to smile and bounce in there seats to the beat of his rhythm. As they settled into enjoying his solo sounds, a tall smiling guy named Clarence 'The Bluesman' Turner roared in with some thundering bass notes that seemed to just push many of them out of their seats with joy.

The large black man who had started this musical journey turned and asked the children "if anyone there had a Mississippi Saxophone?" The music quieted down a bit and the kids looked bewildered. Just about then, the third man in the trio on the stage said "hey, hey, I do," and the kids looked at him but didn't see anything. He cupped his hands and placed them over his mouth then started to blow some of the sweetest sounds in the air, which caused the kids to turn to each other and point at the guy who was named Charlie Sayles. This trio soaked the River Terrace Elementary School children in the musical history of the music we call the blues.

This program is just one of many that the DC Blues Society sponsors throughout the year in the Washington DC area public schools. The program offers children of all ages a close examination of the rich cultural history of the Afro-American music art form known as the blues.

The children at River Terrace Elementary School traced the music roots of the blues from the West Coast of Africa to the modern hip hop streets of the neighborhood in which they live. The session included periods of questioning from the kids and rewarding of children with a Mississippi Saxophone when they successfully answered questions from the large black man who hosted the event, who was later identified as Dr. S.O. Feelgood.

The DC Blues Society will sponsor a six week workshop on the Mississippi Saxophone for the children at River Terrace Elementary School starting this month, (February). The schools sponsor for this unique program and workshop is Ms. Vata Frederick, she is one the few teachers that I have met who truly understands the importance of integrating the music and arts into the classroom and she is very successful at it. Thanks to teachers like Ms. Frederick, the children are becoming a new fan base that will ensure that the blues remains alive.
