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

Nappy Brown

Blind Pig recording artist Nappy Brown, one of the first R&B stars in the mid-50s and one of the last classic blues shouters, has been hospitalized in Charlotte, NC for about a month. His summer tour has been canceled due to his illness. The rhythm and blues pioneer has been enjoying a heady career resurgence since the release of his universally acclaimed CD Long Time Coming culminating in two recent Blues Music Award nominations. It is uncertain when he'll be released. This

extended hospital stay is a lonely and

Lil' Dave Thompson's CD, Got To Get Over You, gets reviewed by Ron Weinstock

Playing with Booba Barnes as a teenager, and later recording for Fat Possum, while touring with R.L. Burnside, Jr. Kimbrough and others, Mississippi blues man Lil' Dave Thompson may not be 40, but he has developed into a terrific modern bluesman. Thompson had an impressive debut album on Fat Possum followed by an excellent recording on the British JSP label.

Despite his hill country roots, Thompson's stinging guitar and forceful vocals owes much to the legendary Albert King, joining such other notable blues artists as the late Son Seals and Larry Davis as well as the muscular blues of Michael Burks. His new album, Got to Get Over You (Electro-Fi), certainly shows he has developed his own solid blues style. He's a fiery guitarist whose tone evokes King, although like others, he has a busier style. Tied to this is solid singing and a program of strong blues originals including the first-rate title track and rocking shuffles like "Out in the Cold," and "Hard Headed Woman." Recorded in Toronto, Electro-Fi backed Thompson with a tight band with organist John Lee and saxophonist Pat Carey notably adding their voices, but the spotlight remains most impressively on Thompson and with his fiery performances (this writer just saw him at the Pocono Blues Festival), his stature in the blues world should be growing. This disc is highly recommended and his performance on Saturday, August 30, at the 20th DC Blues Festival promises to be one of the highpoints for the popular event.

Sometimes you have to just sit back and savor stuff, like the American Legion hosting a blues rave-up. The white veterans returning

from World War I, who founded the Legion, kept it segregated for decades. Legionnaires broke strikes in the 1930s, witch-hunted lefties in the 1950s and helped the cops smack Vietnam War protesters around in the 1960s.

But time mellows us all, including the Legion. The blues, in fact, survived in part because, like jazz, the mainstream audience discovered it (although rather later than jazz, and the blues buzz started in Britain instead of here, but you get the idea.) Still, though, it's more a hobby music than an actual, everyday pop music, like hip hop.

Like fans of every other kind of roots music, blues fans tend to feel a little protective These days we splash sentiments like "Keep the Blues Alive" across our tee-shirts, as if local blues societies were running a charity to treat a disease, like the March of Dimes. And we treat blues festivals almost reverently, as if we were going to church (a church that serves barbecue and beer, nonetheless.) We're constantly taking the music's temperature and wondering if it has a cold.

There I was, contemplating these weighty matters in the comfortably beat-up Greenbelt American Legion hall, which hosted the D.C. Blues Society's 4th Annual Fish Fry on Saturday night, July 19. There was plenty of room to dance, a well-stocked bar a few paces away and some excellent fish cooking up outside. Perfection.

And I had an epiphany. Like other types of roots music, the blues is relatively simple – three chords, usually, and relatively easy even for amateurs to play passably. And the amateurs gigging in beer bars and Legion halls are likely to keeps the music going, even as more sophisticated, harder-to play pop music dominates the radio and the happening nightclubs. These amateurs will also prevail because the very unpopularity of the blues they play means they can experiment with it and change things around and try new stuff and keep it fresh and interesting.

Consider the Idle Americans, who leavened the blues they play with a little country; they boast a fine guitar player, who sounded a lot like the great country picker James Burton, who backed Elvis. Or First Thing Smokin', one of the few blues bands I've seen with a conga player, and with a funky approach to the blues that sounded at times as much like James Brown as Sonny Boy Williamson.

Or the Country Bunker Funky Blues Band, with a wailing harp player (It's the rare band that has one these days. Do we need to start a Little Walter scholarship fund or something?) Or the Stacy Brooks Band, which keeps that whole Koko-Taylor-style, blues-diva thing going in style.

Seasoned musicians like Memphis Gold and Charlie Sayles sat-in, providing the continuity that one generation gives to the next and fried-fish sandwiches were the dish du jour (just like they were at the Delta juke joints where Robert Johnson and the other old-timers played) and we contributed to the music's longevity, too. Sales were up 50 percent over last year and that's a pretty big deal, because it's important to save something worthwhile. $\mbox{\em J}$

Zac Harmon

Mississippi Bluesman, Zac Harmon headlines the DC Blues Society's 20th Annual DC Blues Festival. Harmon will hit the festival stage fresh from playing festivals and nightclubs in Spain and France where he and his Mid South Blues Revue band electrified packed audiences throughout his tour. Harmon won the Best New Artist award for the debut of his second recording, The Blues According to Zacariah.

Zac's band, the Mid South Blues Revue, features Jeff Stone on blues harp, Doug "Dug Mug" Swanson on bass, Rodney

"B.R." Millon on guitar and Jerry Angel on drums. Born and raised in the heart of Jackson, Mississippi, Zac relocated to L.A. in the early eighties where he worked first as a studio musician, and then as a writer and producer, crafting songs for the O'Jays, Freddie Jackson, Karyn White, Alexander O'Neal, Black Uhuru and the Whispers.

Harmon released his first CD, *Live at Babe and Ricky's Inn*, independently in late 2002. That thrilling testimonial to the Mississippi blues helped successfully launch the career of Zac Harmon, the artist. Since then, Harmon has played the Legendary Blues Cruise and major festivals around the country and in Europe. His latest CD entitled *The Blues According to Zacariah* was released in 2004 on the Blue Stone Records label (www.bluestonerecords.com). *The Blues According To Zacariah*, reflects his commitment to the blues as he takes the listener "from the pulpit to the juke joint" with such standouts as *That Mighty High*, *Who's Knockin'*, *It Hurts Me Too* (featuring Mickey Champion) and *Comfort of a Man* (featuring Greg Wright).


What do you get when you combine two of the best vocalists in the DC area? You get The Jazzy Blues Women!



Lil' Dave Thompson

David Lonzo Thompson was born in Hinds County, Mississippi May 21, 1969. Lil' Dave's exposure to music came early and has always been a way of life. His father, the late Sam Thompson played with Willie Foster, Asie Payton, Paul Wine Jones, Eddie Cusic, James Son Thomas and others.

Lil' Dave's list of influences reads like an anthology of the blues. His family was burned out in legendary Moorhead, MS (Where the Yellow Dog Crosses the Southern) and moved to B.B. Kings hometown of Indianola, MS. But it was in Leland, MS, (Hellhole of the Delta) and

home of James "Son" Thomas and other blues legends that Dave, at the age of 14, formed The Delta Blues Band. As a teenager, Dave played with various blues, Rand B, Reggae, and gospel bands in the delta area until he met and toured with the late Booba Barnes in 1990.


A third or fourth generation Mississippi delta blues guitarist and vocalist, Thompson has come full circle with the blues. He has lived it, learned it and now seems to appreciate the rich legacy and his responsibility to the blues, this region and his fellow blues artists, past, present and future.

Dave returned to recording with a bang after a six-year hiatus. In 1996 he burst onto the scene with his Fat Possum debut, then quickly disappeared. In 2002, he re-emerged with *C'mon Down to The Delta*, a 14 song slab of modern, original soul-blues that were remarkable mature for a player under 35. His visceral, unvarnished music exude swagger, and there's plenty of variety: shuffles, slow blues, junk, Southern strollers, and even a light jazz instrumental.

Thompson's confident, aggressive guitar solos combine the buzz-saw snarl of Albert King and the sweet, metallic sting of Little Milton, and his unpretentious vocals seem equally influenced by blues and soul. His latest CD, Got to Get Over You is getting rave reviews.

Charles "Big Daddy" Stallings really knows the essence of the blues. Born in Columbia, S.C. and raised on a farm in Hobbsville, N.C. with ten brothers and sisters, he lived the blues everyday. Music became his escape and the first song he learned to play was "Big Boss Man" by Jimmy Reed. After migrating to Baltimore, MD. "Big Daddy" continued to develop as a musician performing in local R&B and jazz bands, all the while dreaming of recording his own blues project. His critically acclaimed debut release, *One Night Lover* featured the song "4x4 Woman" which reached #1 @ XM Radio's Bluesville. His newest CD, *Blues Evolution*, released on the independent Tai Jeria Music label has been described "Good Time Blues With A Twist."

"Big Daddy" has shared the stage with many blues notables including Hubert Sumlin, Pinetop Perkins, The Nighthawks, Michael Burks, Marva Wright, Mark Hummel and Candye Kane. He represented The DC Blues Society at the 24th International Blues Challenge in Memphis, TN in 2008.
