


From the Editors:

Ida Campbell interview continued...

Q: Do you have any radio experience?

A: No, but I have done a lot of volunteering at WPFW during the membership drives and. as a member of the DC Blues Society, I was on the radio last year announcing our holiday party. After that, people started encouraging me to get on the radio. So when Chester Chichester's time slot became available, I just decided to go for it. It couldn't hurt to try.

Q: But you do have a musical background, right?

A: As a teenager I had a band with my brother and sister when we were growing up in South East, DC. We competed in battles of the bands and talent shows around the area. I continued to do that during high school. And, of course I was in the choir at church.

Q: Didn't you also have a brief career singing in a band with your husband?

A: Yeah, fifteen years brief. His family had a gospel group, "The Campbellaires," of Silver Spring, MD. Then he and I had our own band. We sang R&B and Blues.

Q: How is your program going to be different from the others?

A: I'm going to bring in more history— of the Blues and Blues artists. I'm going to try to put a spotlight on our local artists because every-body recognizes the well-known names, but when we announce a show by a local artist I want the audience to be able to say, "Oh yeah, I know who that is. I've heard of him, or her, or them, on Ida Campbell's show." I also want to keep the Blues alive in our young children all the way through high school. College students get it, but the younger kids need to know where the music comes from and they need to know the reason why the blues ever came about.

Good luck, Ida!

2009 International Blues Challenge An Unforgettable Experience

Imagine sixteen blues venues within three city blocks, each staging eight bands performing in succession for 20 minutes, then repeating that same schedule the very next day! It happened on historic Beale Street in Memphis, TN, during the semifinals of the 25th International Blues Challenge (IBC).

The DC Blues Society was represented by Billy Thompson and Friends with Billy on guitar and vocals, Gene Monroe on bass and Tim Biery on drums. Fourteen year-old Ellicott City resident, Matt Wigler competed in the solo-duo category and also participated in the Youth Showcase (twenty-four acts for performers under the age of 21). Wigler, who sang for the first time in front of an audience, was accompanied on drums by Mike Aubin, who has been Deanna Bogart's drummer for thirteen years. Neither Billy Thompson's highly charged contemporary blues act, nor Matt's pristine performance made it to the finals, but each of the 180 bands (including the solo-duo acts) were already winners since they had

been selected by their respective blues organization. Other DC-area performers included Clarence "The Bluesman" Turner who represented the Baltimore Blues Society, and Mike Westcott's "Blues on Board" who carried the torch for the Blue Ridge Blues Society. Former DC-area harp player, Waverly Milor was the only "non-Westcott" in the family five-piece band.

In addition to the US, bands came from Australia, Croatia, Poland, Italy, France and Canada to compete. Under the rules of the Blues Foundation, each performed for 20 minutes in the same venue, two days in a row, before a rotating set of judges and a full-house. The Blues Foundation has added a vocal talent category to next year's competition.

It was impossible to see all the acts. You stop and enter one of the blues clubs when you like what you hear like a great voice or some enticing licks spilling out into the crowded street. Everyone had his or her own personal favorite, who may or may not necessarily be a semifinalist! There was the mesmerizing, soulful voice of Davina of Davina & the Vagabonds from Minnesota, who modulated her voice to perfectly replicate the heavenly combination of tremolo notes played by her trombonist. And, the amazement in seeing two young men playing boogie in sync on the same piano while facing each other. Enter the Boogie Boys from Poland who made it to the finals which were held at the Orpheum Theatre, one of the most beautiful opera houses east of the Mississippi.

Thank you, Memphis, and thank you, Blues Foundation, for this memorable 25th IBC...Gerard de Valroger

Saffire-The Uppity Blues Women Ron Weinstock reviews a new CD and the end of an era

It's been twenty-five years since the trio of Gaye Adegbalola, Ann Rabson and Earline Lewis started performing around Fredericksburg, VA and Washington, DC. I remember seeing them for the first time at a DC Blues Society charity concert at Georgetown University and picking up their self-produced cassette, Middle Age Blues, mostly compiled from classic blues with a few originals, including "Middle Age Blues Boogie," which became the trio's theme song with its still memorable refrain "I want a young, young man." I was delighted when they signed with Alligator in 1989. Their debut Alligator disc, the eponymously titled SAFFIRE - The Uppity Blues Women, was a surprising and well deserved, success.

A story I did for the DCBS newsletter was the basis for the first major one on them that appeared in an early issue of *Blues Revue*. Along the way, Lewis departed to be replaced by Andra Faye who, in addition to bass, also displayed a multi-instrumental talent on mandolin, guitar, fiddle and more. In the ensuing years, they performed countless times as well as continued to teach at blues workshop programs mentoring a large number of modern acoustic blues acts. From the Washington, DC and Tidewater, VA area such groups as BluesWorks and MSG the Acoustic Trio mine traditional blues along with contemporary originals rooted in traditional sources.

Havin' the Last Word is their eighth album of new recordings for Alligator (this does not include the excellent compilation "Deluxe Edition") and their first since Ain't Gonna Hush in 2001. This is their swan song as a trio and the ensuing performances will also be their final regular ones. Each will continue the solo careers begun in the past several years.

Unlike their previous albums, there is only one classic blues revived here, "Kitchen Man," and the rest are fresh tunes composed by the three along with tunes by EG Kight and others. The opening is a Carla Daruda song, "Going Down to the River" in which the three trade verses about going to the river and washing their troubles away. It's followed by Gina DeLuca's "Nothin' in My House" where Adegbalola delivers the sassy lyrics about letting others say what they will "if I want to honky tonk all night... what do I care, I ain't got nothing in their house." Rabson revives "Kitchen Man" with a stately piano and Faye's complimentary mandolin. EG Kight and Tom Horner contributed "Somebody's Gotta Give," a song that Faye belts out (and one can imagine it being translated into a band format by Faye and The Mighty Good Men).

Other highlights include "Bald Headed Blues," an original by Adegbalola addressing the consequences of chemotherapy and dancing with life and not death. Faye adds fiddle to Rabson's not completely reflective "Since You've Been Gone," while her own "Blue Lullaby" has a country flavor. Kight and Horner collaborated with Rabson for "Travelin" at the Speed of Love," a celebratory boogie. Adegbalola's "I Can Do Bad All By Myself" has a nice guitar solo from Rabson while Adegbalola sings about how bad things have gone "so she needs to take a payday loan," but she does not need anyone else's help. Faye playfully celebrates her body on having "Too Much Butt" while Adegbalola's "Bald Eagle" is a lustful celebration of female sexuality. Deanna Bogart's "I'm Growing Older" is a humorous tune about the inevitable and Faye is guite comfortable about aging like fine wine and becoming a wilder woman. The album concludes with another Rabson, Kight and Horner collaboration, "The Bad Times," with echoes of "Drown in My Own Tears" in its melody and noting "bad times make the good times better, bad times make our love strong ... good times will be here before long."

Saffire has provided us with good music for a quarter of a century — good times to get past the bad and sad times. While the musical partnership of Saffire - the Uppity Blues Women may be ending, its musical legacy is firmly established to be enjoyed for years to come just as each of its members will establish her own legacy. Like Jim Brown leaving professional football, *Havin' the Last Word* has Saffire ending its run while still performing at the highest level.
