President's Drum

John Cephas

One of the DC Blues Society's founding fathers, John Cephas, has finished his work in this world. Some of that work is close to the hearts of those who loved his music. Those who labor on behalf of and support, through their membership and donations, the efforts of the DC Blues Society, also cherish his contributions. John was one of three signatories (along with Barry Pearson and Carl Johnston) to the articles of incorporation that formally laid out the mission and structure of the Society and gained its nonprofit status. John's blueprint has guided the focus and growth of the Society since its creation twenty-one years ago.

Through his hard work and vision, John helped launch a perpetual Blues machine that continues to enrich, educate, and entertain Blues lovers in the DC region. His collaboration with Phil Wiggins took him around the world, perpetuating his particular style of Piedmont Blues. While many will miss John Cephas, his legacy will live on through his recordings and through the organization he did so much to create.

While I didn't know John personally, I and all the board members, past and current, ride on his shoulders. The DC Blues Society is forever grateful for his contributions. Read more on John Cephas on Pg. 5.



In another loss to the Blues community, **"Blu Lou" Rao** succumbed to cancer over the weekend after a valiant battle. Lou was a fixture at Chick Hall's Surf Club and a dear friend of Chris Hall for many years. He lived his love for music, playing bass guitar and other instruments and singing, establishing and leading jams, and helping others any way he could.

Blu Lou was always on hand for DC Blues Society jams and shows and eager to help us set up the sound system, troubleshoot problems, and handle deejay duties. On a personal note, Lou brought

me into his home to record an audition disc for the competition to become the voice of Metrorail [Washington Metropolitan Transit Authority], "...the doors are closing..."

The doors have now closed behind Blu Lou as he exits this stage. But for those of us whose lives he touched with kindness, generosity and his infectious love for music, the door will always be open to fond memories. Lou was a great friend to the DC Blues Society. On behalf of the Society, I extend our sincere condolences to Lou's friends and family.

About the upcoming Silver Spring Blues Festival, Sam'i said, "The band will basically consist of a rhythm section, and we will showcase a top flight vocalist or other talent" to keep it interesting. The band's lineup for the Silver Spring Festival includes Anthony "Swamp Dog" Clark (harmonica); Sam Brawner (drums); Dave Jackson (bass); Sam'i Nuriddin (second guitar). John Cephas

(September 4, 1930 – March 4, 2009) was born in Washington, DC to a family rich in musical talent. His father, Ernest, was a Baptist minister who recognized his son's gifts and encouraged him to learn the guitar and his mother, Sylvia, taught her sons to sing. John's grandfather, John Dudley, lived in Caroline County, VA, near the town of Bowling Green and it was here that John learned much of the music traditions and history of rural Virginia that would eventually shape his musical career. Along with other relatives, he played at family gatherings and heard the music of early Piedmont Blues artists. He would later list Blind Boy Fuller, Rev. Gary Davis and Blind Lemon Jefferson as some who influenced his playing. And, in time, his own talents, as a singer, guitarist and composer, would put his name in that list of remarkable Blues musicians.

When one speaks of the Blues musicians of his generation, certain names are bound to come up: John Jackson, Archie Edwards, Bill Harris, Flora Molton, Nap Turner, Mary Jefferson. Harris ran a club called *Pigfoot* not far from Edwards' place (the Alpha Tonsorial Barbershop) in Northeast DC. There were after-hours sessions at the club and Saturday jams at the barbershop. Traveling musicians stopped as they passed through DC and locals came to hone their skills, pickup pointers from the seasoned players or just play with old friends.

In 1977, while performing at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival, John Cephas and Phil Wiggins met. The following is taken from the duo's website (www.cephasandwiggins.net): Cephas was playing in the band of pianist Big Chief Ellis and Wiggins was accompanying gospel singerguitarist Flora Molton. Along with pianist Wilber "Big Chief" Ellis and bassist James Bellamy, John and Phil formed the Barrelhouse Rockers. A year after Ellis' death, the duo of Cephas & Wiggins was born.

Cephas & Wiggins were leading exponents of the Piedmont Blues – specifically the Piedmont-style guitar... Almost immediately after the two musicians joined forces, the blues community proclaimed them as the new champions of the East Coast Piedmont style of blues...

To Cephas & Wiggins, the blues lyric was the poetry of the Africanof black people in communities all across this country when times were hard. It

American experience. Said Cephas, "The blues is a creation of black people in communities all across this country when times were hard. It was a way of expression, an outlet, and it's had so much impact. Blues music is truth. The lyrics are true-to-life experiences that people everywhere can relate to." "People automatically think of sadness and depression when they think of blues. But the blues is uplifting music, music to rejuvenate you, to nourish the spirit. When you get down, the blues will pick you up again. Blues is nourishment for the human spirit," says Wiggins.

They chose their repertoire carefully, not only for musical impact, but also to highlight the cultural and historical content of their genre. Their concert performances evoked life in the post-Reconstruction South. Hard work, celebration, joy, and struggle are all there. A verse that may sound like a straightforward love song may also contain an allusion to African tribal culture or the indignities of racism or an optimistic assertion of a better future. Cephas & Wiggins provided their audiences with a very special treat – a powerful and intelligent performance of a wonderful, American treasure, the blues.

According to blues historian Barry Lee Pearson, Piedmont blues and other types of acoustic blues were sorely overlooked by the music industry who viewed them as not commercially viable. Recording contracts were scarce but with perseverance, a little luck and a lot of support from people like Pearson and Joe Wilson who promoted US artists through the US Information Agency tours, the duo began to gain some recognition. To the surprise of many, Cephas and Wiggins won the 1986 Traditional Artists of the Year award and in 1987, *Dog Days of August* won the W.C. Handy Best Traditional Blues Album award.

The importance of passing on musical traditions to ensuing generations was not lost to these musicians. Cephas and a group of friends, mostly musicians, recognized the need to formalize their jam sessions as a way to preserve the legacy of the Blues, especially acoustic Blues, and to provide opportunities for local musicians. With that, the DC Blues Society was born. Cephas served as its first president, Wiggins as its second.

Cephas was also committed to passing on the Piedmont guitar style to younger musicians and he opened his home and his heart to many as evidenced by the large turnout of musicians at the Sunday, March 29 tribute at the Smithsonian's Baird Auditorium and Westminster Presbyterian Church. The unmistakable sound of the Blues filled the theatre as family, friends and fans (some of whom came from as far away as Seattle) gathered for the celebration. Phil Wiggins, Corey Harris, Daryl Davis, Eleanor Ellis (a founding member of DCBS), Rick Franklin and others paid the musical tribute to John Cephas while friends like Barry Pearson (another DCBS founder), Joe Wilson, Bill Wax, to name a few, told stories about the man they knew and loved.

Later in the day, a house party jam took place at Westminster Presbyterian Church in southwest DC. (The church hosts Blues every Monday night and jazz every Friday night.) Musicians from across the region came to play before an appreciative audience Musicians set up outside the church entrance to play under bright skies and cherry blossoms; a dozen or so took over an inside stairwell to sing doo-whop; and of course, inside there was the main stage with musicians taking turns for their joyful musical tributes.

As you will see from the photos on Page 9, the spirit of John Cephas was evident throughout the day as old friends reconnected, new friendships were made, songs were shared. He will be sorely missed but his mission will continue through his recordings, his friendships and, in the society he founded over twenty-one years ago. And, remember his words too : **Blues music is truth.**

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Requiem

Hank Crawford (Jan 29, 2009) 74. Born in Memphis, Crawford was raised on the blues. In his early career, he worked with Bobby "Blue" Bland, B.B. King and Ike Turner. In addition to playing baritone and alto saxophone, he was also the musical director for Ray Charles. His style of playing, often described as "soul-jazz" connected jazz to its roots in blues and gospel music. As a composer, arranger and musician, he recorded several albums with David "Fathead" Newman and Jimmy McGriff. He also toured and recorded with Dr. John, Etta James, Lou Rawls and others.

Jimmy Boyd (March 7, 2009). Singer, musician and actor, Boyd was just a month short of his thirteenth birthday when he recorded the hit single "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus." Initially banned in Boston by the Catholic Church on the grounds that it mixed sex with Christmas, the song has sold over 60,000,000 copies. Boyd went on to have a career in music, television and film. He was 70.

Willie King (March 8, 2009). Delta Blues guitarist and singer. His album, *Freedom Creek*, received the Living Blues 2000 Best Blues Album award and Best Contemporary Blues Album award. He was featured in Martin Scorsese's series *"The Blues"* (2003) and was the subject of a documentary entitled *Down in the Woods* (2007). A 2005 inductee to the Howlin' Wolf Hall of Fame, King died on his 66th birthday.

Eddie Bo aka Edwin Joseph Bocage (March 18, 2009), 79. This Blues singer, songwriter and pianist worked with Etta James, Irma Thomas, Art Neville, Joe Turner, Ruth Brown, Lloyd Price and a host of others in Blues, jazz and R&B. Among his role models were pianists Oscar Peterson and Art Tatum. He was featured in the Smithsonian music series, *River of Song.* Bocage received music industry awards and honors from New Orleans.

Mel Brown (March 20, 2009), 69. Blues guitarist, pianist and band leader he recorded with many blues legends like T-Bone Walker, B.B. King, John Lee Hooker, James Cotton. His Electro-Fi album, *Neck Bones & Caviar*, won the 2001 W.C. Handy Award for Blues Comeback Album of the Year.

Cyril Neville's CD *Brand New Blues* Review by Ron Weinstock

The youngest member of the Neville Brothers, Cyril Neville has long engaged in a variety of projects including exploring reggae and other world music, and revisiting some Crescent City classics along with adding his voice and conscience to the Neville Brothers. MC Records is bringing out his latest disc, *Brand New Blues*, which has a most definite blues focus.

Brian J, the producer, provides most of the musical accompaniment but many tracks are supplemented by such artists as Neville brother Art, nephews Ivan and Ian, guitarist Tab Benoit, harmonica whiz Johnny Sansone and washboard from Waylon Thibodeaux. There are a few originals and some intriguing covers like Jimmy Reed's "I Found Joy" which opens the album. It's a simple groove and a vocal that suggests a hint of Taj Mahal. The title track has Neville singing about all types of blues, from the hole in shoes to broken hearted blues, but when he thought he had seen it all, she walked in to his life with the brand new blues, spending his money as if no tomorrow. "Shake Your Gumbo" is a funky, dance oriented number and Neville does a marvelous treatment of "I'll Take Care of You." "Cream Them Beans," with Thibodeaux's washboard and Sansone's harp, is a lively ditty with a hot creole groove. "Cheatin and Lyin" has Neville wondering how some people sleep at night "as something so wrong can be seen as right" with "cheating and lying from the White House on down." "Mean Boss Groove" has a protest lyric about a bad boss and credit card bills piling up with a haunting, accompaniment evocative of John Lee Hooker's brooding slow blues. Neville also does "Blue Blue Water," another lesser known Jimmy Reed number. The CD closes with a highly expressive, bluesinfused rendition of Bob Marley's "Slave Driver."

Many of Neville's recordings have had limited distribution. Hopefully, MC Records will be able to get his music into wider circulation as he has a voice that deserves to be heard on its own.

Memphis Gold's CD Release Party and Gibson Guitar Award at Blues Alley CD Review by Ron Weinstock

Let me begin with a caution: this article may display some bias on my part since Memphis Gold and I have been friends for about eighteen years and I was in the studio while he finished some of the tracks on his latest CD, *Gator Gon' Bitechu!* (Stackhouse).

When Memphis gave me an advance of his second CD, *Prodigal* Son, I was floored by how much his music had matured. *Gator Gon' Bitechu!* is a very successful follow-up highlighting Memphis' strengths: his sanctified-rooted singing, his solid, rhythmically charged guitar playing and the good-time feeling he invests in each performance.

The new CD opens with a sample of a symphony orchestra then moves into some slide guitar played against a North Mississippi groove as Memphis sings "I Shoulda Known," a lament about a woman who bled him dry. It's followed by "Catfish Creeper," with dual slide guitars sounding like "Dust My Groove," as Memphis sings about laying on the river bottom like a log until someone comes along with the right bait.

Set to the groove of "Woke Up This Morning," Memphis asks his Alley on Tuesday, March 3, 2009. That woman "Do You Still Want Me?" after she's used him and broken his night, Memphis Gold also celebrated his heart. The title track, inspired by WPFW (98.3 FM) blues programmer, birthday and received a special honor from Da "Gator, has an infectious funky groove with some brassy horns and Gibson Guitar. Bill Wax, the host of *B.B. King's Bluesville* on Sirius XM Radio, pre-

"My 2 Kcandys" is a jaunty shuffle that gives a shout out to a Candy and a Kandy. On "Can't Get Enough," using the melody of B.B. King's "The Thrill Is Gone," Memphis sings about not being able to get enough of his woman using him while hoping one day she'll finally see his love.

The mood then shifts on a lovely blues ballad, entitled "How I Got Over," a song about falling in and out of love. The groove picks up again on the quasi auto-biographical shuffle "I Was Born in Memphis." "Squeaky Wheel" features a nice harp solo.

"Lil Lucy" opens with a dreamy backing as Memphis recalls a boyish fantasy about a beautiful lady who used to pass his house everyday, then the band shifts into a funky groove with a funky bass riff as Memphis asks "Lucy, why do you tread on me?"


Legendary Rhythm & Blues Revue
