It never ceases to amaze me how blues musicians and their fans so quickly rally to help a cause, whether it's a fellow musician in need, or a business owner or fan who has met special challenges. The weekend of October 23/24 provided a great example of this. On Saturday, the owners of Beale Street Grill, 9725 Traville Gateway Drive, Rockville, MD, held an afternoon blues festival to raise money for two charities that are especially important to their families. Blues artists Rick Franklin, Jay Summerour, Memphis Gold, Daryl Davis (photo at left) and others performed for the crowd that was packed into the outdoor area by the restaurant. Was it a success? Here's what Beale Street Grill posted on their Facebook page.

Meet the Performers for the College Park Blues Festival

Guitar Blues Legend Bobby Parker



Bobby Parker is, indeed, a Guitar Blues Legend, with a music career that spans many years and a following and fan base that includes music luminaries such as Carl Santana, Eric Clapton, Jimmy Page and Robert Plant of Led Zeppelin, and many more, including The Beatles. John Lennon and George Harrison are on record crediting the guitarist's signature riff which forms the basis of his 1961 classic "Watch Your Step" as being the impetus for the band's 1964 chart topper "I Feel Fine."

Parker's early career got a jump start after he won a talent contest sponsored by West Coast Blues and R&B legend Johnny Otis. He started working on electric guitar with several big name Blues, R&B, and Funk groups of the time, with his first stint being with Otis Williams and the Charms. Over the next few years, he also toured and played lead guitar with Bo Diddley, recording the record "Diddley Daddy" at the famous Chess Records in Chicago. Bobby (photo at left) toured and performed with a long list of musicians, such as T-Bone Walker, Buddy Holly, Little Walter, Jimmy Reed, Ray Charles, Paul "Hucklebuck" Williams, Sam Cooke, Chuck Berry, Little Richard, Fats Dominio, and far too many more to name. Parker recorded the original versions of the songs "You Got What It Takes," "Blues Get Off My Shoulder," and "It's Hard But It's Fair."

He is perhaps best-known for his 1961 hit song, "Watch Your Step," a single for the V-Tone label that became a hit on British and U.S. R&B charts.

Parker's first official album, *Bent Out of Shape* was released by the New Orleans Black Top Records label in 1993, with a follow-up album in

1995, Shine Me Up. It was around this time that he started to perform at some of North America's most prominent concert venues, including The House Of Blues, BB King's, Fleetwood's, The Commodore Ball Room (Vancouver) and Johnny Depp's Viper Room in Los Angeles. To the great joy of his international fans, Parker found himself performing around the world in places like Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates, London, Toronto, Vancouver, and Amsterdam, in addition to playing in big US cities, and even playing as the opening act on tour with Santana. Bobby also was invited to perform at some of the largest Jazz & Blues Festivals worldwide, including most notably the famous Montreal Jazz Festival, The Chicago Blues Festival, The Mississippi Valley Blues Festival, Guantanamo Base Music Festival (Cuba), San Francisco Blues Festival, and North Sea Blues Festival (Holland).

Parker's style has been described as Guitar Slim meets James Brown -- he's got the ability to fuse funk, rock, soul, R&B and blues all in to his own original music. If you are familiar with Parker's style, then you know you are in for a treat at the College Park Festival. The DC Blues Society Band will be showcasing their talent and will feature Waverly Milor on harp and vocals. The DC Blues Society Band is a special group of local musicians who support DCBS jams and other events and also provide the opportunity for promising and established musicians to be featured as special guests. Waverly Milor (photo at left), the featured musician at the CP Festival, has performed in the DC area for over 20 years and is known as one of the region's most dynamic live performers. adept at both acoustic and electric blues. He began playing at the age of 6 and has scarcely laid it down since. He formed his first band, Zach Sweeney & The Old Weenies in 2005 (the band performed at the 2005 Greenbelt Labor Day Festival), and he later performed with Wammienominated ACME Blues Company. Currently, he is the newest member of the Big Boy Little Band and

Anthony "Swamp Dog" Clark & the Blues Allstars



Harmonica player, songwriter, and singer Anthony "Swamp Dog" Clark is counted among the best blues harmonica players in the DC area. His unique tone, masterful musicianship, and stage showmanship have thrilled audiences and have been noticed by other musicians. He has been sought after for recording projects, such as his recent contributions for releases by Alligator Records recording artist Kenny Neal and Stackhouse Records artist Memphis Gold.

Swamp Dog and his band the Blues Allstars won the DCBS 2010 Battle of the Bands and the right to compete in the 2011 International Blues Challenge

(IBC) in Memphis. The College Park Blues Festival is a fundraiser to cover some of the band's expenses for their travel to the IBC.

Anthony started out playing the drums at the age of five. His parents saw his love of music and bought him a snare drum and signed him up for lessons. By the age of 12, he started listening to the blues greats, like Sonny Boy Williamson, his first inspiration as he was drawn to the harmonica. At 15, he joined a top-40s band as drummer.

In the late 70s, Anthony moved to the DC area from York, PA and began to play around town in jazz clubs as a drummer. Eventually, however, the blues and harp prevailed as Clark's music and instrument of choice. He became a regular at the Surf Club's open mic jams and was recruited to play with other musicians. He joined the Capital Blues Ensemble band, which won the DCBS 2009 Festival Auditions and performed at the 2009 Silver Spring Blues Festival and the 2009 DC Blues Festival. In July 2009, he formed the Blues Allstars, and quickly became noticed for playing a harder edged, funk-tinged version of the blues. His debut CD is soon to be released. His band members include Charles "Red's" Adkins on bass, Kenney Sparks on guitar, Glenn Alexander on guitar, and Emmitt Kittrell on drums.

by women this year, a big

change and one that bodes well for a music that has traditionally been a male preserve (although the highest any of these women placed was third.) The level of talent was more even this year; almost any of the bands - take away a few technical problems or given a slightly different set of judges - could have won. There was not a single traditional Chicago-style guitar-playing leader and singer, and guitar histrionics in general were downplayed. Only one of the bands. Swamp Dog's, was predominantly African-American, another sign the blues continues to move ever further from its birthplace in the Mississippi Delta in this suburban dads who just happen to be young century, raising all kinds of questions about where the music is going - non-traditional, guitar-hero bombast a la Joe Bonomassa? A reversion to tradition in the Keb' Mo' mode? Part of a world music approach like Taj Mahal? Punk blues? Electronic blues?

I thought this year's choices - Swamp Dog; Bad Influence, a fourpiece jump-blues band; and the Moondog Medicine Show, another foursome led by Lana Spence, a Janis-Joplin-influenced big voice - were pretty reasonable, given how evenly talented the pool was. On the other hand, I'd have put the Moonshine Society and its spunky woman singer first - in my opinion, they did a near-perfect set of relatively challenging music. Swamp Dog gave a very polished and slick set and I had them ranked second; and Moondog third, like the judges, for the wailing Ms. Spence, who needs an equally big sound from her band to finish higher in these things. (There were a lot of "moons" and "dogs" this year, by the way.)

Here, then, is my take on the performances: Ms. Spence and Moondog drew the short stick and went first at the low-ceilinged basement of the American Legion Post in Wheaton, Maryland. The place was only about a third full at 7:45 and the energy level was laid back. The band gamely kicked off with a chugging version of the Jimmy Reed clas-

sic "My Babe" ("she don't stand no cheatin'") although they were understandably a little stiff to start. The B.B. King slow blues "Sweet Little Angel" was better, and Ms. Spence sold this more ardently. Lana Spence (photo at right) does the entire Janis gamut, from guttural moans to hoarse shrieks, and there is undeniable power in her voice, but also a curious, seeming disengagement from some of the material; a lot of technique, not that much emotion. The band was solid and workmanlike.



Next up was Swamp Dog himself, a solid harp player (who, unfortunately, didn't always break through the mix) and a nice but not overwhelming vocalist, backed by a tight, four-member funk-edged band. Definitely cutting through was one of the guitar players, who utilized a glass-cutting tone that sounded great on his low-note, bottom-of-theneck solos and who gave a guitar master class on one of the slow blues. A cover of Muddy Waters' "Hootchy Kootchy Man" was a little rickety in places, but on the funk stuff the band really cohered, all stuttering repeated guitar figures and snapping high hat and snare drum.

The next band was Bad Influence, which knows how to reach out and grab an audience from the first bar. They started with an insis-

Rose Between Thorns had the best Four of the bands were led sound balance of the night; you could hear

everyone in this six-piece band very clearly, not always the case all night. Led by another woman, Christine (photo at right - who like all the other members gives only first names), this band was a reassuring sight for middle-aged white guitar players like myself because - and I mean this in only the best way - it looks like five very good at getting down instead of






playing golf. It's an eclectic set list for a blues band - more Jimmy Reed mixed with a somewhat lifeless Patsy Cline cover.

Moonshine Society gave, again in my opinion, the consistently best set of the night. Black Betty, despite the pin-up girl schtick (no, seriously, there are pin-up photos on the band's Web site) has a strong voice, tons of personality, and a tight grip on the material, which is more rhythm and blues-sounding than many blues bands, with rolling gospelchord changes more reminiscent of Ray Charles than Howlin' Wolf, and definitely more sophisticated. Stuff like "Feel Like Breaking Up Somebody's Home," covered by everyone from Etta James to Bette Midler,

and a slow blues called "Better S SOCIETY than This" stood out. The guitar player, Joe Poppen (photo at right, ring You with Black Betty), was the last big $^{rac{1}{2}Blues}$ discovery of the night - fluid, tasteful, sophisticated, articulate, intelligent. He got a spongy, Robert-Craytype tone from his Strat that sonically fit perfectly with this tight ensemble, and yet his playing is far more interesting than Cray's paintby-numbers approach to soloing.

JP Reali Is Going to the 2011 IBC as the DCBS Entry in the Solo/Duo Category Big Boy Little Band's New CD is Nominated for Best Self-Produced CD

The International Blues Challenge (IBC) competition that is held in Memphis each year includes the more visible Band competition (see p 5 for information on the DCBS nominee "Swamp Dog" and the Blues Allstars), as well as a Solo/Duo competition. To complement the live music component of the IBC, The Blues Foundation also bestows an award for the Best Self-Produced CD of the year. DCBS is pleased to announce the following nominations have been forwarded to The Blues Foundation for these categories:

- JP Reali will represent DCBS in the Solo/Duo competition at the 2011 IBC.
- Big Boy Little Band's 2010 CD Live from the XM Satellite will be the DCBS nominee for Best Self-Produced CD of the year.

JP Reali has been a veteran of the DC music scene for more than twenty years and has played in numerous venues throughout the DC and surrounding area. In the 1980s, he played lead guitar for The Next Step. In the 1990s, he was half of the acoustic roots duo The Hudson River Drifters. His most recent musical project has been as a dobro player in the West River Blues Crabs. (Note: A dobro is an acoustic guitar most commonly used in country music, usually played on the lap. It has a raised bridge and a metal resonator cone that produces a tremulous, moaning sound.) After a 10-year break from regular performing, JP and his brother Chris Reali released the Hudson River Drifter's album Between the Late Night and the Early Make Believe in 2006. In 2007, JP released his long-awaited solo album, Cold Steel Blues, featuring nine originals and six cover tunes by such blues greats as Robert Johnson, Willie McTell, and the Reverend Gary Davis. In 2010, JP released another solo CD entitled Bottle of Blooze. A review of this CD in On Tap magazine (www.ontaponline.com) said the album "is especially noteworthy for Reali's novel approach. He employs musical themes developed by the pre-World War II country blues masters, but infuses this classic musical style with modern lyrical themes. "Bottle of Blooze" eschews the electric flash of the Chicago form and instead relies on simplicity and feel. Reali's acoustic guitar picking



is crystal clear – and at times mesmerizing" (Michael Coleman). JP Reali is a member of the Piedmont Blues Preservation Society, the Washington Area Music Association, and the DC Blues Society. His influences include Reverand Gary Davis, Son House, Mississippi John Hurt, Leadbelly, Blind Boy Fuller, and Robert Johnson, plus others. Big Boy Little Band was the DCBS 2009 Battle of the Band winner and was among the top finalists at the 2010 IBC in Memphis, with the band's guitarist, Matt Kelley, winning the coveted Albert King award at the IBC for most promising guitarist. The CBM has reported on Big Boy Little Band's accomplishments since last year's IBC, including the Band's summer 2010 release of its first CD Live from the XM Satellite. Several songs from the CD were played when the Big Boy Little Band opened the September 4, 2010, 23rd Annual DC Blues Festival. DCBS is pleased to be able to nominate the BBL CD for The Blues Foundation award for Best Self-Produced CD of the year. A review of that CD appears below, and includes information on how to obtain the CD.

CD Review The Big Boy Little Band Live From the XM Satellite

Brett Littlehales has been part of the DC music scene for decades, but it was not until recently, as

leader of the Big Boy Little Band (BBL), that the spotlight has been on him as a singer and harmonica player. I should also note he is a well-respected photographer, having done a superb series of portraits of DC jazz legends for Washingtonian magazine among his credits. He has been running the Thursday night jam (and playing one weekend night a month) at the Zoo Bar for I cannot remember how many years, and has had excellent musicians playing with him for such a lengthy period. In the past couple years, the BBL has become more visible, playing at other clubs in the Washington DC metropolitan area.... (see above article regarding recent BBL accomplishments). The result (of the Band's recent success and exposure) is a new self-released CD by the Big Boy Little Band, *Live From the XM Satellite* (Big Train Records).

In addition to the harp and vocals of Littlehales, and Matt Kelley's guitar (and vocals on one track), the band also includes Steve 'Wolf' Crescenze on bass and Robby Leebrick on drums. The band has a distinct sound with Kelley's trebly guitar adding a menacing tone at times, behind Littlehales's world-weary street smart lyrics with a crisp rhythm. This live recording, in fact, is pretty representative of the band's music, and 8 of the 9 selections are originals (all but the Jerry Leiber and Artie Butler penned "Downhome Girl," that Alvin 'Shine' Robinson had recorded).

In the original "Shuck and Jive," that opens this CD, Littlehales' vocals have a bit of cynical edge to them and Kelley takes a strong solo with a hard rhythmic focus before Big Boy sings about tossing his woman into the water, taking her to New Orleans, and watching her



dance to the Irving Bannister Band, a nice reference to the underappreciated New Orleans guitarist who stayed with Littlehales immediately after Hurricane Katrina. "Deer Rifle," a Kelley original, has a bit more conventional feel - Kelley sings about finding a rifle next to his woman's bed, with a melody akin to "Forty Four," and with Littlehales' harp effectively responding to the vocals. The highpoint of the CD may be "The Heat and Humidity," a gritty bit of urban storytelling about a woman shooting a man (on TV she never thought the gun would ever sound so loud) as Littlehales plays some tasty harp that is based on Alan Wilson's solo on Canned Heat's recording "On The Road Again," while Kelley takes a tasty short break. With the spare backing from the rhythm, it is a very impressive performance, "Twelve Bar Blues" is a lively celebration of the blues and a litany of various blues bars.... "Beg for the Money" is a driving number with a rockabilly tinge. "Carondolet" opens with atmospheric harp with Kelley's soft single note guitar contributing to the flavor, as Littlehales spins a tale centered on New Orleans and a shotgun voodoo shack -- one can almost smell the incense with the smoky vocals.

The disc concludes with "The Idiot Talking," with its churning rhythm and Littlehales' tale of having a bad day and talking on and on until he noticed his baby had gone. Kelley has a nifty guitar figure he employs during the vocal chorus and also takes a driving solo, and the Big Boy also picks up the Mississippi saxophone for one last time here. It is a strong closing to the band's long-awaited (to its Washington, DC-based followers) debut album. Given how long Brett Littlehales has been playing, it is several decades overdue, but worth the wait. With nine songs and slightly under 40 minutes of music, there is no fat or gristle, just lean meat. CD Review: James Cotton's Giant

James Cotton's career as a musician extends some 66 years, and while he no longer handles the vocals, he still wails on the harmonica. His latest CD, Giant on Alligator Records, features his band of the past several years: Slam Allen on guitar and vocals; Tom Holland on guitar; Noel Neal on bass and Kenny Neal, Jr., on drums, in addition to Mr. Superharp himself. It's refreshing that for this latest Cotton recording, they did have Cotton with his band and eschewed the superstar guests. Slam Allen certainly has developed into a solid singer with plenty of personality, and Tom Holland has become one of the most highly regarded traditionally-oriented guitarists around today, and little need be added about Noel Neal and Kenny Neal, Jr. This is a great band as the many who have seen them will readily testify.

There are a few originals on the CD in addition to interpretations of classic blues, of which "How Blue Can You Get?" "Since I Met You Baby," and "That's All Right" are the best known of these. I know the opening "Buried Alive in the Blues," by Nick Gravenites, has been recorded a lot, but it is relatively new to these ears and it receives rollicking shuffle treatment here with plenty of Cotton's harp. "Heard You're Getting Married," is a slow blues penned by Allen and Cotton, with more crying harp. A pair of Muddy Waters tunes follows, with the slow rendition of "Sad Sad Day" standing out with terrific slide guitar from Tom Holland, who evokes Waters' classic style. Another Allen-Cotton original "Change" follows with a churning rhythm and a rocking solo from Allen. Allen does a pretty solid job singing "How Blue You Can Get." The song is handled pretty straight and Noel Neal takes a bass solo with Cotton's harp adding commentary to the bass solo. A hot instrumental, "In the Quickness," has a short guitar break from Allen and is followed by the Ivory Joe Hunter ballad "Since I Met You Baby," which again serves to showcase Cotton's harp with a serviceable vocal from Allen. Holland plays some lovely guitar behind the vocal on this, in addition to Cotton's strong playing responding to Allen's vocal. The band rocks on Muddy Waters' "Going Down Main Street," which includes some strong guitar before Cotton quotes his classic instrumental "The Creeper," as he takes the song to its end. Allen follows with a first-rate vocal on "That's All Right," that also sports first-rate harp. "Blues For Koko," a moody instrumental by Cotton dedicated to the late Koko Taylor, concludes this disc on a high note. Mention should be accorded to Tom Holland's accompaniment of Cotton's dazzling, virtuosic harp on this.

Bruce Iglauer notes that Cotton has cut nearly 30 albums in his career. That does not include the many recordings he played on as a sideman. *Giant* simply is a strong addition to Cotton's rich musical legacy and is also valuable to document the terrific music that Cotton has been playing with his working hand



RIP Solomon Burke 1940 - 2010

On October 10, the great Solomon Burke passed away, dying in Amsterdam at the age of 70. Burke, known as the King of Rock'n'Soul was scheduled to perform in the Dutch City. The Philadelphia-born Burke was a major soul artist of the sixties and seventies after having made his debut recordings as a gospel artist while very young.... The legendary Atlantic producer Jerry Wexler once

referred to Burke as "the best soul singer of all time."... In the eighties and nineties, Rounder Records and Black Top Records issued superb recordings by Burke. They were followed by recordings produced by Joe Henry which presented Burke in different contexts and singing different material, and all these introduced him to new audiences while reintroducing him to older audiences. I only saw him perform once, at the 2009 New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, and he still had the voice as he sat on his crown and mesmerized the Congo Square stage audience. It was one of that year's JazzFest highpoints.

RIP Walter Payton 1942 - 2010

Walter Payton, veteran bass player on the New Orleans scene who played on classic rhythm and blues recordings by Aaron Neville and Lee Dorsey, as well as with Preservation Hall, passed away on October 28 after a lengthy illness. Let me quote Keith Spera's obituary from the Times-Picayune: "Mr. Payton, the father of Grammy-winning trumpeter Nicholas Payton, was an exceptionally versatile

musician in possession of an exceptionally engaging persona. A student of music theory and music history, he could easily switch from electric bass to upright acoustic bass, from rhythm & blues to traditional jazz to modern jazz. His recording credits include Aaron Neville's "Tell It Like It Is" and Lee Dorsey's "Working in a Coal Mine...."

I had the pleasure to see him perform several times at JazzFest. I took the above picture at the 2005 JazzFest, and I saw him this past April as well. Five years ago, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation began a new endeavor, the Crescent City Blues & BBQ Festival, to lure people back to the city. Thanks to HBO's series Tremé, I developed a severe case of NOLA fever and when I saw the 2010 line-up for this free festival, I had no choice but to go.

Arriving in NOLA the afternoon before the Festival provided time for a trip to Bourbon Street to see Big Al Carson at The Funky Pirate, and what a treat that was! Big voice and big personality, Al gives his all to the audience six nights a week. The devotion of his fans is evident as he walks into the place, but many are there for a quick drink before heading to their next stop on the list of "must see" French Quarter clubs. Too bad they don't stick around for a second set, because he doesn't disappoint. While his old-school R&B standards keep tourists entertained as they down hurricanes and hand grenades, die-hard blues fans appreciate his presentation of the classics. He closes his shows with a crowdpleasing song appropriately entitled "Take Your Drunken Ass Home." You can view it on YouTube, so check it out and watch some of his other songs. You won't be disappointed.

Now, about those two days of music in Lafayette Square Park. Hometown favorites like Carol Fran, Henry Gray (pianist with Howlin' Wolf), Little Freddie King, Joe Krown Trio with Walter "Wolfman" Washington/Russell Batiste, and Barbara Lynn shared two stages with Anders Osborne, Otis Taylor, Corey Harris, Luther Kent, Mem Shannon, Ruthie Foster, Li'l Ed & the Blues Imperials, and others. Taj Mahal, who closed out Saturday's schedule, performed before an enthusiastic audience of several thousand filling nearly every inch of Lafayette Square Park. Sunday's turnout may have been slightly less due to the Saints game but the performances were in no way diminished.

There was time after the festival for a last trip to the French Quarter's Palm Court for some traditional NOLA cuisine, a little jazz and, to my delight, the presence of Uncle Lionel Batiste, an 80-year old singer who plays the bass drum in the Tremé Band and also appears in the TV series. It was an appropriate ending to a great weekend; however, my NOLA fever hasn't been cured because there was too little time for sightseeing, beignets, oyster po'boys and all those other clubs and all that other music.
