


We'll be back at the State Theatre on April 3 for the Legendary Rhythm & Blues Revue. The Revue features Joe Louis Walker, Deanna Bogart, Debbie Davies, & The Tommy Castro Band. You (members) can get FREE tickets to these and other events by visiting www.dcblues.org. Tickets are limited and available on a first-come basis. So, visit your website often. Also check out the website and DCBS emails for member discounts for shows, restaurants, merchandise, and services.

Speaking of snowed-out events, we regret the cancellation of the February Jam. In keeping with the Blues spirit, we will keep on keeping on and try again to hold the March Jam at the same venue: Departmental Progressive Club, 411 Gibbon St. Alexandria, VA 22314. After a serious car accident on Christmas Eve 2009, Nadine Rae is recovering from her injuries; however, additional eye surgery will be needed. Despite this, Nadine is looking forward to performing beginning in May. We spoke with Nadine on February 25, which happened to be her birthday. She was in good spirits, thanking her blessings for having walked away from a very nasty ice-related car accident.

Nadine is very appreciative that the music community has been overwhelmingly expressive about her recovery. A fundraiser for Nadine was held on January 16, at the Old Town Bowie Grille, and she is so grateful for this support and the gift that was subsequently presented to her. Another fundraiser will be held on March 7, from 2 to 6 pm, at The Whiskey in Annapolis

(www.thewhiskeyannapolis.com). It will feature Rich Chorne, Tommy Lepson, Dean Rosenthal, the Remnants, Mike McHenry Ron Weinstock Tribe, and other special guests. DCBS is also planning an early April fundraiser (details not yet available).

Looking back over 2009, Nadine recalled some highlights of the year, including performances at several fundraisers for needy musicians, homeless people, and other entities, such as the AM-FM Annual Christmas Show at the Rams Head in Annapolis. Other highlights were the Tinner Hill Annual John Jackson Blues Festival; and the 2009 Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival had been a very special opportunity, where she was featured along with Deanna Bogart, Melanie Mason, and Patty Reese as one of The Chesapeake Bay Ladies of Blues. Out of that special union, several recording projects have evolved; e.g., with Deanna Bogart, along with Patty Reese. Nadine also recalled how much she enjoyed the interview that Ida Campbell conducted with her during Ida's WPFW show. She expressed her excitement for being nominated again this year (and every year since 2006) for the WAMA Award for Best Female Vocalist in the Blues/Traditional R&B category. The ultimate highlight of the year was the birth of her first grandchild, Gianni, on September 1, 2009.

Although Nadine has another 6- to 12-month healing period ahead of her, she's looking forward to performing: 1) at this year's Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival with Patty Reese; 2) as the opening act for Chuck Brown and Bobby Parker at the State Theatre for the kickoff of the 2010 John Jackson Blues Festival (formerly known as the Tinner Hill Blues Festival); and 3) as emcee at the Chesapeake Music Guide's Anniversary Celebration; and 4) other venues. She's also working on some collaborations for her debut CD project.- Ed.

Lil' Dave Thompson - May 21, 1969 - February 14, 2010

The Blues community is mourning the death of Lil' Dave Thompson, who was killed in a car accident early Sunday morning, February 14, while traveling home with his band after playing the Blues Bash at Fiery Ron's in Charleston, SC. This final gig was the last scheduled event of an extensive tour. The other band members were not seriously injured.

Lil' Dave was a dynamic artist who was widely acknowledged as one of the very best of the current generation of Mississippi Blues Artists. DCBS had proudly featured Lil' Dave at a DCBS Valentine Day's Party in 2009, and at its 2008 DC Blues Festival and the After-Festival Party.

Born in Hinds County, Mississippi, Lil Dave' came from a musical family. His father, the late Sam Thompson played with Willie Foster, Asie Payton, Paul Wine Jones, Eddie Cusic, James Son Thomas and others. At the age of 14, Lil' Dave formed his first band, The Delta Blues Band. As a teenager, Dave played with various blues, R&B, Reggae, and gospel bands in the Delta area, and eventually toured with the late Booba Barnes in 1990. In 1995 his album, *Little Dave and Big Love* was released, followed by a 6-year break before he reemerged with subsequent CDs/albums that include *C'mon Down to the Delta* (2002), *Got to Get Over You* (2006), and *Deep in the Night* (2008), as well as an extensive touring schedule that brought him critical acclaim and a loyal following. His website (www.lildavethompson.com) aptly describes his style: "Thompson's confident, aggressive guitar solos combine the buzz-saw snarl of Albert King and the sweet, metallic sting of Little Milton, and his unpretentious vocals seem equally influenced by blues and soul." When he performed, you could not stand still. His DCBS performances had them dancing in the aisles at the 2008 Festival and rockin' the house at the After Party.

Stacy Brooks, DC-based Blues artist and another stellar performer, reflected on Lil' Dave's untimely death: "I met Dave Thompson in 2008 at The Pocono Blues Festival, and in that short time we became good friends. He was a patient guy who didn't mind listening and answering all of my questions. I respected and admired him for the great accomplished musician he was and was proud to call him my friend. Although we were the same age, he had an old soul and offered some very valuable industry advice like a big brother. I could always call him and sing him a song I was working on and get his opinion. I will cherish our friendship and the times we shared the stage. I miss him dearly and still can't believe he's gone. R.I.P. Dave!"

And The Winners Are ... The 2010 Wammies

On February 28, the Washington Area Music Awards (also referred to as the "Wammies") were announced at a musical gala held at the State Theatre in Falls Church, VA. These awards recognize significant career achievements by area musicians.
