

### **DCBS Interview With Grady Champion**

Grady Champion is one of the hottest talents on the blues circuit today, having won the Blues Foundation's 26th Annual International Blues Challenge in Memphis in January 2010. Champion was honored in the Best Blues Band category, topping 110 other outfits.



Champion has worked in the music field for nearly 20 years, attracting plaudits for his harp playing, singing, and crowd-friendly approach to traditional blues. Grady also writes and plays guitar. This year, he also has a part in the horror movie "Rites of Spring" filmed in Mississippi.

For much of his career Champion has toured the Southeast, but he is coming to the Washington-area this summer, as the headline performer for the DCBS Festival Fundraiser to be held on July 31, 8:30 pm to midnight at the Silver Spring, MD, American Legion Post 41 on Sligo Ave.

CBM reporter Burney Simpson contacted Champion through his Facebook site and he graciously responded via email to questions.

**CBM**: Congratulations on winning the Blues Challenge. What's new since then?

**GC:** It was a big plus to my career by winning the 2010 International Blues Challenge. It has gotten people interested in what I am doing even though I have been doing it for years. To be voted as the top blues band in the world, it gives you credibility as you begin booking internationally.

**CBM:** You also were honored this year with a Grady Champion Day by the Mississippi State Senate and with a Grady Champion Day by your home town of Canton, Miss. How did that feel?

**GC:** It feels great to be honored by the state and the city in which you were raised and to have the support of the people of where I live, it is remarkable.

**CBM**: Most of your touring is south of the Mason Dixon line. How can we get you up north more often?

**GC:** Back in the early 2000s, I did a lot touring in the north east. By having promoters book me in these areas, I will be more than willing to come back.

CBM: Any plans to release a new CD?

**GC:** Yes, we are working and taking on new material. We're gathering songs to do recording towards the end of the year for release in 2011 and possibly working on a deal to have a new release of my 2008 album since we didn't have distribution on it. We are working on having it redistributed.

**CBM**: Why the long break in CD releases from 2001 to 2008? **GC**: I moved back home from Florida and decided to go back to school and study music.

**CBM**: Your voice has been compared with Robert Johnson, your harp playing with Sonny Boy Williamson, and your interaction with an audience with Luther Allison. Who did you listen to as you forged your own sound?

**GC:** I listened to a lot of older blues greats like Sonny Boy Williamson, Little Walter, Muddy Waters, Howling Wolf, B.B. King and numerous others

**CBM**: Besides other musicians, what personal influences are heard in your music?

 $\mbox{\bf GC:} \ \ \mbox{My life}$  and the life that I lived and my experiences are heard in my music.

**CBM**: You began as rapper and switched to blues. Why?

**GC:** I wanted to be involved with a more mature audience and at the time that I was really into rap it started moving into gangster rap and my mother did not raise a gangster.

CBM: How can musicians bring the blues to young people?
GC: Young people can be brought the blues by bringing it more into television, radio, and bringing the blues into the schools

**CBM**: What contemporary blues musicians do you listen to? **GC**: I don't listen to any contemporary blues musicians in particular; I am mostly interested in traditional blues music.

## 17th Annual Tinner Hill Blues Festival — The Crossroads for Music, History & Culture

The annual Tinner Hill Blues festival, a tribute to John Jackson, takes place June 10 - 13 in Falls Church, VA and promises to be a musical journey from the Mississippi Delta, up through the Piedmont, and across the continent to the Pacific Northwest and Canada.

The 4-day event kicks off with a fundraiser (a ticketed event) on Thursday, June 10 at the State Theatre with two of DC's icons of music: Chuck Brown (The Godfather of Go-Go) and legendary guitarist Bobby Parker. If you missed last year's show, this encore presentation gives you a chance to redeem your musical soul. If you were there – well you know - and you also know you want to be there again! Get a ticket, tell your friends and kids about this chance to witness musical history! Each of this mighty duo was dubbed a "Hidden Gem" by Washingtonian Magazine. The show also includes a guest appearance by vocalist Miss Nadine Rae plus New York comedienne (and Falls Church native) Nicky Sunshine who will have everyone in stitches.

On Friday, June 11, Creative Cauldron, a new art space in Falls Church, hosts an original theatrical production, *Tinner Hill: Portraits in Black & White*, (this is also a ticketed event) exploring the city's early civil rights history and race relations with live Blues music and an art exhibit. You'll also find great food and Blues bands in restaurants around Falls Church, aka *The Little City*.

A mid-morning panel discussion, *Red, Black and Blues*, will take place on Saturday, June 12. Three notable Native American experts, Dr. Ron Welburn, Elaine Bomberry, and Penny Gamble Williams, will join festival performers PuraFé, Lee Gates, Murray Porter and Corey Harris to explore the influences and shared musical traditions of Native Americans and African Americans. The theme carries into the free *Concert In The Park* which follows from 1–8 pm. (See article on p 6 for more information on some of the festival performers.)

Other performers include Phil Wiggins (with Corey Harris), Clarence "The Bluesman" Turner, Patty Reese, and MSG Acoustic Trio. Kristin Gomez will lead kids' activities with Kidz Pull Strinz, and there will be performances by The Yorktown Blues Band and Curtis Blues, harmonica lessons from Choo Choo Charlie and more. Other happenings include a barbecue cook-off, soul food and vendors in the park, plus music on South Washington Street and a shuttle to carry Blues lovers between venues, the Metro, and restaurants along the way.

Blues history also abounds with the screening of the award winning documentary, *John Jackson: A Blues Treasure*, and the debut of a new Smithsonian Folkways CD, *Rappahannock Blues: John Jackson*. The collection of twenty songs selected from hundreds of live concert recordings also includes an informative booklet written by music historian Barry Lee Pearson. The CD will be available to the public for the very first time at the Tinner Hill Blues Festival!

The festival finale takes place Sunday, June 13, 11 am-3 pm, with a Blues Brunch and Jam at Bangkok Blues. # Tinner Hill Blues Festival – Continued Some of the Saturday Performers

The Tinner Hill Blues Festival ad and article on p 4 of the CBM highlights the different activities that are scheduled for this 4-day event in Falls Church, VA. Here's some teaser information on some of the Saturday, June 12 panel discussion participants and the free concert performers.



Pura Fé is a founding member of the a cappella group Ulali and this vocalist, singer, actress and activist, helped bring the contemporary music of Native Americans to the world. Her solo career has taken her to concert stages around the world where "...her soulful voice and acoustic lap steel slide guitar, carries the ancestral message of the 'Indigenous World' and the missing history that unified and separated the blood ties of Black and Indian people of the South. With a fresh new

take, PuraFé resurrects and elegantly states the common bond and the indigenous influence on the 'birth of the Blues.'" - Music Maker Relief Foundation). Benjamin Bratt (actor and supporter of Native American causes) said of her "Like all truly great singers, PuraFé has the power to move you. With a potent mix of Native influences and good old fashioned blues, her voice is 'soul' itself...." Information: www.purafe.com

**Murray Porter**, keyboardist, singer and songwriter, was raised on Six Nations Reserve and resides in Vancouver, BC. The Pappa Johns Band with Murray Porter won Best Blues Album at the 2004 Canadian Aboriginal Music Awards for their CD *Full Circle* and were 2005 JUNO Award nominees for Aboriginal Recording of the Year. As a solo performer he has received many music nominations and awards including the 1999 CAMA award for Best Songwriter; a 2003 International Songwriting Competition finalist and nominated for 2005 Songwriter of the Year by the Maple Blues Awards, Canada's national blues awards. www.myspace.com/murrayportermusic

Phil Wiggins & Corey Harris are no strangers to area blues fans. Phil's unique harmonica style makes him one of the leading harp players in the world. He is also a gifted writer and his songs helped define the duo known as Cephas & Wiggins. Now he has teamed with guitarist/vocalist Corey Harris, who, in addition to Piedmont Blues, has also delved into Delta Blues, reggae, R&B and African music. Harris was the recipient of the prestigious MacArthur Fellowship "Genius Award" in 2007, a \$500,000 unrestricted fellowship given to talented individuals who have shown extraordinary originality and dedication in their creative pursuits and a marked capacity for self-direction. Wiggins' and Harris's combination of talent and experience make each performance unique and are true ambassadors of the Blues throughout the world. <a href="https://www.piedmonttalent.com">www.piedmonttalent.com</a>

Lee Gates is known as a powerhouse guitar slinger. This first cousin to Albert Collins was born in Pontotoc County, MS and moved to Milwaukee as a young man. He worked in the steel mills by day and at night, the house band of a local club. And, although he did not cut his first album until 2003, his years of work paid off and he is the acclaimed foremost guitarist of that city and his talent has taken him to music venues throughout the US. # Artists on the CBM Cover - A Sample of the Talent You Can See at Festivals This Month

**Bernard Allison** is one of a terrific lineup that blues fans can see at the June 3-6 Western Maryland Blues Festival in Hagerstown, MD (ad on p 9). His bio on his website (<a href="www.bernardallison.com">www.bernardallison.com</a>) says Bernard "totes the same smokin' six string shooter that his late father Luther Allison assaulted the blues with. And he is blessed with his father's

soulful voice, spiritual devotion, and a musical freedom which experiments with the blues.... As a true "son of the blues," Bernard possesses the requisite guitar feel and vocal intonations necessary to push his blues into the next century. He knows the energy level necessary to hold audiences and combines enough showmanship and spontaneity to push the performance in fresh, innovative directions.... "In order for anything to expand, you have to take a risk," says Bernard. "Blues is about experimenting and getting your feelings across to someone else. And if you want to keep it going, people are going to have to give it all a chance because we're losing all our creators...."

Big Bill Morganfield is one of the artists who will be performing at the June 13 Billtown Blues Festival in Hughesville, PA (ad on p 8). Big Bill Morganfield is the son of McKinley Morganfield, who is better known as Muddy Waters, one of the most influential musicians of the 20th Century. Big Bill began his own music career in his adult years, after he had already obtained bachelor's degrees in English from Tuskegee University and Communications from Auburn University. In fact, it was several years after the death of his father in 1983 (when Bill was 27), that Big Bill decided to explore his musical heritage, bought himself a guitar, and started playing and teaching himself. Years later, Big Bill's music shows that he carries Muddy's spirit and love for the blues, and he says he feels a spiritual bond with his father when he's on stage. In 1999, his debut album, Rising Son, was produced by Muddy's long time guitarist. Bob Margolin, who also played on the record, along with three other former members of the Muddy Waters Blues Band. The album was well received, and Bill went on to receive the W.C. Handy Award for "Best New Blues Artist," the equivalent of a Grammy Award in the blues world. Big Bill's subsequent albums included Ramblin' Mind and Blues in the Blood, which also showcased Big Bill's talent as a songwriter. www.blindpigrecords.com

Anders Osborne will be at the June 19 Blues House Festival in Winchester, VA (ad on p 10). Blues fans at the May 22-23 Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival also had the opportunity to see him perform there. <u>Jambase.com</u> provides this interesting summary of his talent: "Oftentimes the most true portraits of America have been rendered by those who have come from outside its borders, yet somehow seem to understand and inhabit our culture more than those of us who have lived here all our lives. Consider the Band, which 30 years ago became the archetypal American outfit despite being four-fifths Canadian, Swedish native (and current New Orleans resident) Anders Osborne is that sort of artist as well. He's worked his magic for other performers, writing "I Was Wrong" and "A Better Man" both Grammy-winning songs from Keb' Mo's album Slow Down. Osborne combines classic American musical forms such as blues, rock and roll, and Crescent City funk to create a sound that acknowledges no borders as they're usually understood, but defines its own space in the world and demands to be heard."

Bobby Parker will be at the Tinner Hill Blues Festival on June 10, with Chuck Brown and Nadine Rae, and the Safeway/National Capital BBQ Battle on June 27 (ad on p 7), performing right before Cyril Neville. Bobby is no stranger to the DC area, and you can see this veteran performer and blues guitar legend at numerous venues in DC and surrounding areas. Some of his recent performances were at the May 22 Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival, the May 26 Congressional Blues Festival, the April 11 DCBS-sponsored Nadine Rae Benefit, and he was the surprise guest at the April 23 Joe Bonamassa concert at Lisner Auditorium. Bobby's new website (www.bobbyparkerblues.com) has great videos and photos - check it out! Bobby Parker's seminal late 50'searly 60's singles "Watch Your Step", "Blues Get Off My Shoulder" and "Steal Your Heart Away" influenced a host of rock legends. He was lead guitarist with the late Bo Diddley; a member of the bands of Chuck Berry, Little Richard and Fats Domino in the 1950's. John Lennon once said of him; "The best stuff I ever heard is by a bloke called Bobby Parker."



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

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
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### 31st Blues Music Awards Announced

### **2009 International Songwriting Competition Awards**

The International Songwriting Competition (ISC) recently announced its 2009 awards. The Blues winners include Suzie Vinnick and Dan Kershaw (Toronto, ON, Canada) for their song "Sometimes I Think I Can Fly" (First Place); Jason Ferguson (Omaha, NE, USA) for his song "Time Is Now" (Second Place); and Darren Watson (Wellington, New Zealand) for his song "Can't Get Enough Of You" (Third Place). The winners were chosen by a panel of celebrity and industry judges. More than \$150,000 in cash and prizes is shared among the 65 winners. Entry deadline for 2010 awards is October 6, 2010.

### **RIP Roy Carrier 1947 - 2010**

Roy Carrier, aka Zydeco Roy, died of a heart attack on May 3. He was the last of the Zydeco players who evolved in the 50's and 60's and helped put Louisiana's sexy blend of Caiun and LaLa music on the American roots map. Roy was one of 9 children born to a sharecropping family with a definite musical bent. At the age of 10, Roy began playing the live music circuit with his father, an accordion player. Roy later formed his own band, the Night Rockers, playing guitar and then the accordion, despite having lost most of his right index finger in a well -pulley accident. For 16 years, Roy worked as an offshore driller, while playing his music, and buying and establishing a neighborhood roadhouse that become "the place" for Zydeco musicians to convene, learn, jam, and develop this wonderful genre of music. In 1989, Roy began focusing on his music full time. His website asserts that his music "never veered far away from a blues-based style of Zydeco's origins." One testimony on Roy's website aptly describes his music as follows: "Roy Carrier and the Night Rockers are the asskickingest Zydeco band on the planet, guaranteed to make you lose your mind and your composure out on that dance floor." ### **RIP Lena Horne 1917 — 2010**

Lena Horne died on May 9 at the age of 92. This legendary performer, adored by audiences all over the world, was known for her sultry blues ballads and fiery jazz classics, and especially her signature song, "Stormy Weather." The great-granddaughter of a freed slave, Lena entered show business at age 16 as a member of the chorus line at New York's famous Cotton Club. As a teenager, she also toured with an orchestra led by jazz bandleader Noble Sissle. The racial discrimination she encountered as her musical and acting career evolved led to her work in the civil rights movement of the 1950s and '60s. Although blues and jazz were her specialty, Lena Horne's husky, contralto voice was equally at home with a variety of styles "She was, and still is, a pioneer for women, and especially for black women," said Dionne Warwick when Lena received the Kennedy Center Honors Award in 1984 for her achievements in the performing arts. "She has kept alive her inner fires, cast them into song, and warmed us all." Lena Horne received the Grammy Award for Lifetime Achievement in 1989.

### **Watermelon Slim Tears Down the House**

Watermelon Slim gave a tutorial on the blues at the Old Bowie Town Grille, in Bowie, MD, on May 19. It was just his slide guitar, harp, and coyote's howl of a voice against the world. And he tore down the

house.



There were no socially conscious lyrics about the homeless, no carefully paced guitar solo, harp solo, vocal. Watermelon Slim is worn - - his hair, his teeth (or lack of), and his weathered face. He complains openly about his amp and carps about driving 1000 miles back home.

Watermelon Slim is not of this era. Thank goodness. He doesn't hide his love for the blues and for performing behind a veneer of irony and studied professionalism. He really feels it, and you feel it too. Slim has drive and spirit and more energy

than guys half his age. He puts it into every song, scratching out the lyrics, punching the air to accentuate the lines, straining the slide on his guitar to drag out that high note. He lays out a dozen harps, slides, chatchkes and shaman's tools next to his upside-down, left-handed slide guitar.

Slim's solo set was a mix of his own songs and blues classics from

the likes of Mississippi Fred McDowell, Sunny Boy Williamson, and Howlin' Wolf. He brought new life to "Angel from Montgomery," the John Prine song that Bonnie Raitt made a hit. He mixed 60 years of disappointment with a lifetime of hope as he sought 'one thing I can hold onto,' knowing he was never going to get it.

That rawness was countered with a sense of playfulness. Slim gets the crowd to sing along with "Traveling Man" by Ricky Nelson and jokes about




aging and "half-timers' disease." Between songs the Viet Nam vet and long-haul trucker cracks wise on semis with no pop, blues music, dead heroes, and the daughter of an lowa mechanic

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
