Surf Club Lives Again! — Kenny Neal Show

The Surf Club Live, 4711 Kenilworth Ave., Hyattsville, MD 20781, goes live once again on Thursday, August 26. After more than a year of only recorded music and deejays, Surf Club Live will host a DC Blues

Festival Fundraiser and CD release show featuring The Kenny Neal Band, from 8:00pm to 12:00am on August 26. The Bad Influence Band will open the show, and Kenny Neal hits the stage around 9pm.

New Orleans born Neal is known as a modern swamp-blues master and multi-instrumentalist, who draws musically from the sizzling sounds of his native Louisiana. Neal plays harmonica. guitar, bass, trumpet, and piano.

Some of Kenny Neal's many Photo by Mary Knieser awards and nominations include



the 2005 W.C. Handy Blues Awards "Acoustic Blues Album" and Grammy nominations in 1999 and 2009. Neal's new CD, Let Life Flow, has garnered much acclaim and several awards. The song "Let Life Flow" won Neal the 2009 Blues Music Award for song of the year; and the CD and Neal Family Band won the 2009 West Coast Blues Hall of Fame Awards for Blues CD of the Year and Blues Band of the Year.

"The Chicago Tribune pegged Kenny as 'one of a mere handful of truly inventive young contemporary guitarists, Neal has something fresh to say and the chops with which to say it," while AllMusic said his "gruffbefore-their-time vocals retain their swamp sensibility, while assuming a bright contemporary feel that tabs him as a leading contender for future blues stardom."

22nd Annual DC Blues Festival Caps Off the Summer on Saturday, September 4

Each year, Labor Day weekend means the DC Blues Festival is here, and Blues fans flock to the Carter Barron Amphitheatre to enjoy a full day of Blues music The lineup this year brings major Blues talent from Texas, Ohio, Louisiana, Missouri, and of course, Washington, D.C.

Bryan Lee & The Blues Power Band - Bryan is a southern Louisiana bluesman who has been playing the Blues for more than five decades. "He is one of the most recognizable bluesmen to call New Orleans home." His Summer 2010 tour began with his performance in Chicago at Buddy Guy's new club. He has been lauded as one of the finest Blues guitarists performing today by none other than Eric Clapton and encouraged in his youth by the legendary Muddy Waters. www.braillebluesdaddv.com

Diunna Greenleaf & The Blue Mercy Band - Duinna is a native Texan (Houston) and like so many other great Texas Blues men and women, she has developed her own style of Blues — combining "intricate patches of jazz, gospel, and heartfelt soul to create a kind of Blues that takes one on an emotional roller coaster ride." www.diunna.com

Cheryl Renee with Them Bones - Cheryl hails from Cincinnati, where she was born and now resides. However, she's toured all over the country and overseas and was also previously part of the New England Blues scene. Doug MacLeod - Doug is a singer-songwriter, traveling artist, acoustic guitar wizard, and avid St. Louis Cardinals fan. Big Boy Little Band - Bret Littlehales leads the Big Boy Little Band (BBLB), the band that won the 2009 DCBS Battle of the Bands and went on to finish as a finalist in the 2010 International Blues Challenge (IBC) in Memphis. Band member Matt Kelley won the Albert King Guitar Award as the IBC's top guitarist. Cheryl Renée, Goddess of the Blues: In Her Own Words

Interview by Felix McClairen

Charles Sawyer, author of "The Arrival of B.B. King" writes, "Cheryl Renée is a meteorite, no doubt about it. She burns with a fiery intensity, she glows red hot, and she devastates all in her path." ... Here's what She says...



"I started playing piano in the fourth grade when I took lessons in school. I was 18 years old when I began to perform professionally. The first band I went on the road with was an all black show band with horns, so we played a lot of Earth Wind & Fire, Chaka Kahn, and the funk of the day. I started singing with them...they said I HAD to, 'cause I'm a girl. We did two U.S.O. tours, one in Germany, and the other in the east (Japan, Philippines, Korea, Guam, etc.). The show bands after that were mostly white, multi-instrumentalists. One group even had six dancin' girls with harnesses and feathers like in Vegas...

I have a lot of the Show Pony still goin' on, even though I'm playing Blues now ~ I learned about Blues in New England (of all places) ... I did not like it at first, but then was convinced by actually listening to it that, like they said, the Blues and I were *made* for each other.

I have shared billings with Shamekia Copeland, Larry Garner, Jimmy Rogers, Susan Tedeschi, and played with Joe Tex and Saffire, The Uppity Blues Women, among others."

Cheryl is a fulltime musician performing solo, duo \sim up to her own, 'Cheryl Renée's Blues Band' \dots

DCBS is very pleased to have Cheryl performing with Them Bones at the DC Blues Festival on September 4, at the Carter Barron Amphitheatre, and at the After-Pary at the Silver Spring American Legion. Cheryl wants to remind you that they will be selling the CD, Cheryl Renée Live with Them Bones at the Festival ... "We recorded that one at Pickle's Blues Extravaganza when we opened up for Larry Garner back in '08 ~ most folk like it." Also, a Cheryl Renée bTB, (before Them Bones) release, I Believe You Know the Blues, will be available.... "most folk like that, too."

SMOKIN' HOT FISH FRY

There was great music and food at the 6th Annual Fish Fry 'n' Blues 'n' Bike Contest at the American Legion Hall in Silver Spring on July 17, as blues fans gathered for a summer repast. The music included a mix of new groups and old favorites that had the dance floor full.

The music was dynamite with new faces like Richmond's Bush League along with DC-area Blues vets Lady Rose and Not In Service delivering strong sets. Bands like Liz Springer and Built for Comfort, and Gina DeSimone and the Moaners intrigued the crowd while the Moonshine Society made some new fans.



Blues Society members and friends (like our lovely volunteers, Dianne, Arneda, and Celina, in photo at left) donated their time and talents, either tossing fish into a deep fat fryer-no small feat considering it was over 90 degrees with massive humidity-or keeping the table well-stocked with terrific side dishes for hungry listeners and dancers. The beverages kept flowing too.

The music included about a half dozen bands providing half hour-orso sets, much like the monthly jams the Blues Society's Sam'i Nuriddin manages at the Legion Hall.

Bush League (photo at right), a group with a left-handed guitarist, always a good sign. The Bush League, a Richmond-based group, joyfully told the audience they had just won the opportunity to represent the Sedalia Blues Society (formerly the James River Blues Society of Sedalia) at the 2011 International Blues Challenge in Memphis . The band strutted their "stuff" and entertained the crowd with several self-

penned songs, including "Rock the Fish" specially written for the Fry.

Moonshine Society (photo at right), featuring vocalist Black Betty, was up next. The band boasted a barefoot bassist and drummer from Boston's Berklee College of Music while songs leaned on the horny woman and two-timing man theme. Moonshine Society proved to be a high-energy group that won over the crowd with a well-performed set.



Lady Rose (photo at left) and her band continued the party and provided a strong set, with Lady Rose grabbing the crowd's attention as she belted out the songs.




Liz Springer and Built for Comfort (photo at left) followed and took advantage of its two lead guitars line up to emphasize stinging solos.

Next to play was Gina DeSimone and the Moaners, a three girl and one guy (drummer) group, an unusual line-up for the Fest. Gina sings lead and plays guitar while the Moaners feature horn player/ vocalist Justine Miller (lower photo at left) who also plays with Afrofunk group Chopteeth. Gina and the Moaners offered a combination of rockabilly, blues, and New Orleans jazz funeral, an interesting mix that gave Fest listeners a nice alternative to the classic blues that dominated the evening.

The group started a little rough and DeSimone noted they hadn't played with the drummer before. But the band got tighter as the brief set

continued with dancers soon bopping to the eclectic sound.

The Not In Service band featuring keyboardist Anthony Emerson (photo at right) provided a solid The Southside Blues Breakers started the show followed by The set of traditional blues. The band may be named after the many Metro busses that sport 'not in service' as they pass you by, but this group definitely gives good service to fans.



The only downside for this Fish Fry was the lack of entrants in the People's Choice Best Bike contest, as voters had only three motorcycles to choose from. (Although at one point, ten motorcycles had been parked outside the Legion!). Frank Perkins (photo below) took the honors and the \$200 prize for best bike with his black Thunder Mountain Harley, a great looking machine.

CD Review Big Daddy Stallings' *Blues Party*

"I'm Charles' Big Daddy' Stallings and I approve these blues," the gentleman from Baltimore proclaims on the introductory track of his third CD, *Blues Party* (Tai Jeria Record Company). Stallings, who became prominent in the Baltimore-Washington scene about five years ago, brings a down-home blues style with a band that mixes traditionally-oriented Chicago blues with classic sixties and seventies rhythm and blues. There are a variety of folk handling the backing on the CD, including Gail Parrish or Ronald Bland on bass, Russell Hayward II or Bill Pratt on drums, Joe "E Flat" Thomas on saxophone, Clarence Ward III on trumpet, and Steve Levine on harmonica. Mark Wenner of the Nighthawks adds the down-home harp for the "Intro," and "Down on the Farm." There is plenty of music here, with 16 original songs bookended by Stallings' intro and thank you tracks

The title track is a nice good times track, followed by the somewhat salacious "Horny Bee," with a Jimmy Reed groove and some biting lead guitar from Leroy Flowers, Jr., while Stallings grittily delivers the vocals. Riffing horns embellish the simple groove of "Fine Lady," that displays Stallings' simple lyrics and rustic vocals, with him taking a stinging solo. "Down on the Farm," a lazy, rustic piece of blues storytelling is perhaps the most memorable track here, as he recalls growing up on the farm and the hard life down there. Mark Wenner contributes the harmonica for this song. "Swing 2010" is an instrumental (perfect for dancing) with Washington keyboard legend Jackie Hairston on organ, a hot trumpet solo from Ward, and a sax solo by Carlos Johnson.

"She's Gone" is a lament about Big Daddy's baby having gone and left him all alone because he did her wrong, while "Knocked Up" has him wondering about why there is so much teenage pregnancy. "In Love With Yourself" is a nice soul ballad about one's marriage ending and it being no fun to be in love by yourself. After a brief spoken introduction, organist Hairston and saxophonist Johnson are featured on the jazzy "The Lucy Number," while Clarence Ward's trumpet blasts off "James," a funk tribute to the Godfather of Soul," with tough horns and a strong groove, followed by a couple nods to disco-life. "I Wanna Dance" is followed by his salute to "Latin Girls," another number with a dance groove and a percussion breakdown, with Big Daddy closing as he asks us to put some "Blues in Your Funk," with nice harmonica (I presume Steve Levine since it is not credited in the booklet) as well as brassy horns.



On "Old Folks," a slow blues with nice guitar, Stallings sings, "Keep those bloomers on Granny, Grandpa ain't giving up no love tonight." While it has some catchy lines like most of the record, the lyrics sometimes come off as simply strung together by some common theme. In a sense, it's perhaps best to enjoy the music and songs and not analyze the words too much. Big Daddy brings plenty of heart to his music and the band is tight behind him. There are nearly 80 minutes of music on the CD. If one just gets into the spirit, then one will have a *Blues Party*.

On the National Scene:

- Alligator Records July 30, 2010 press release highlighted that Tommy Castro and Charlie Musselwhite won 2010 Living Blues READERS' POLL AWARDS. Castro won the 2010 Living Blues Readers' Poll Award for Best Blues Album of 2009 for his Alligator Records release, Hard Believer. Musselwhite, whose new Alligator CD The Well will be released on August 24, won the award for Most Outstanding Musician (Harmonica).
- Are you a Holmes Brothers fan? The Holmes Brothers (Wendell Holmes, Sherman Holmes and Popsy Dixon) will perform an intimate, semi-acoustic NPR Tiny Desk Concert on Monday, August 2, 2010. The concert is available at the NPR website, and can be viewed any-time on and after August 2 at http://www.npr.org/templates/story/story.php?storyld=92071316.
- The star of the TV show "House," Hugh Laurie, just announced via a press release that he has signed with Warner Music Entertainment to release a New Orleans blues album. He will be spending the rest of the summer and fall recording the album. "House" fans may have seen the cantankerous doctor (the role Laurie plays) showing off his piano and guitar skills in various episodes. Now Laurie is planning to test those skills and says "I am drunk with excitement about this opportunity."

Grady Champion Captivates Audience at Festival Fundraiser

Grady Champion's performance at the July 31 DCBS Festival Fundraiser confirmed his status as a rising star and a Bluesman to follow. The audience saw what the International Blues Challenge judges had seen when they named him as the IBC 2010 winner. Grady is a showman with a singing and spoken voice (love that Mississippi down-home twang) that suits his songs and warms the audience. He wears a wide belt at his waist to hold his many harmonicas and bends the notes and gets the range like the best. As the IBC winner, Grady earned a spot on many upcoming Festival lineups, but it's the smaller venues like the Silver Spring American Legion that let him play the crowd and get up and personal with the audience. Grady is not one to stay on the stage. Throughout the night, as he sang and played the harp, he came out into the audience, visited each table repeatedly, danced with the ladies, and even gave harmonica lessons on his breaks and then got his "students" up on stage to play (bottom left photo). Grady sang a number of familiar favorites, including "Down Home Blues," "Hootchie Cootchie Man," "All Night Long," etc. , and his selection of music kept the dance floor full and the audience singing along.

At the Legion, Grady's band included his son, Marquis Champion on bass, Xavres Good on drums, and guest guitar player King Edward (Edward Antoine). Grady acknowledged King Edward's own stature as a Bluesman (he's played with legends such as Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf, Buddy Guy, James Cotton, and even opened for B.B. King), and turned the stage over to King Edward for several songs, including "The Thrill is Gone." DCBS's own Dr. S.O. Feelgood handled the sound for the band and served as DJ during the band's breaks. Grady playfully stepped aside at one point, and had Dr. Feelgood take the mike for his always entertaining rendition of "Big Legged Woman."

RIP Phillip Walker - February 11, 1937 - July 22, 2010

Celebrated Blues guitarist and vocalist Phillip Walker died of apparent heart failure on July 22, 2010, at the age of 73. Born near Lake Charles, Louisiana, Walker's earliest musical influences were the Cajun and Creole rhythms he heard in his youth. He began making a name for himself in the early 1950s. At the age of 16, Walker toured with Zydeco king Clifton Chenier, and his musical career evolved from there. His first full length album, *The Bottom of the Top*, was released in 1973 for Hugh Hefner's short-lived Playboy label. Over the next three decades, Walker's musical career included numerous recording projects for HighTone, Black Top, Rounder, JSP and Alligator Records. In 2007, he signed with Delta Groove Music and released the critically acclaimed CD *Going Back Home*, with recordings that explored the rich musical history of Louisiana, Texas and West Coast Blues on classic material by Lowell Fulson, Ray Charles, Lonesome Sundown, Lightnin' Hopkins, Champion Jack Dupree and Frankie Lee Sims among others. *Going Back Home* was awarded Best Album of 2007 in the New Recordings / Contemporary Blues category by the Living Blues Awards Critics' Poll. *Delta Groove Music*

The International Songwriting Competition (ISC) is now accepting entries for its 2010 competition. The entry deadline is October 6, 2010. This competition is open to both amateur and professional songwriters, and it includes all genres of popular music. Past winners have included hobbyist songwriters through Grammy winners. This year, to better level the playing field for unsigned artists, ISC has added the "Unsigned Only" category which is open to songwriters and artists *not* signed to a major label record deal, publishing company, or distribution deal — allowing unknown artists to compete against others on a similar level.

The ISC has put together what they describe as "the most high-profile and prestigious judging panel in its nine-year history." Peter Gabriel, Tom Waits, Steve Winwood, Kings of Leon, Rihanna, James Cotton, Ben Harper, Train, Timbaland, McCoy Tyner, Kelly Clarkson, and many more celebrities will team up with music industry executives to select the 2010 ISC winners. The promoters for the ISC say winning the ISC can be a great career booster. Some winners have been signed to major labels, others have secured publishing deals, smaller label deals, licensing deals, and distribution deals, in addition to getting more gigs, fans, and recognition. The ISC gives away more than \$150,000 in cash and prizes (shared among the 66 winners), including an overall Grand Prize consisting of \$25,000 (US) cash and \$20,000 in prizes.


The annual DCBS Battle of the Band will be held on Saturday, October 9. <u>Blues fans mark your calendars now for this event.</u>
