

# Bluesman Kenny Neal - His History and a Recent Conversation

The esteemed Blues Master Kenny Neal will perform at a special DCBS-show on Thursday, July 28 at the Surf Club Live. See details in the poster at the right. Kenny performed at a standing-room only DCBS show last summer, and DCBS member Kirk Jackson had the opportunity to interview him. Excerpts from that interview and Kirk's blog (BBP) article (<a href="http://beldonsbluespoint.blogspot.com/">http://beldonsbluespoint.blogspot.com/</a>) follow:

Guitarist/harmonicist Kenny Neal has the beginnings most musicians only dream about. He was born and raised in Louisiana, the cradle of American blues and jazz. His father Raful — a well-known harmonica player and singer in his own right — kept regular and casual company with some of the most influential blues musicians in history. As a toddler, Neal received his first harmonica from harmonica legend Slim Harpo. As a teenager, Neal played bass for blues icon, Buddy Guy.

Now 53, Neal has spring-boarded himself from those beginnings to make his mark on the music world. He has shared the stage with some of the world's most influential musicians, among them B.B. King, Bonnie Raitt, Muddy Waters, Aaron Neville, and John Lee Hooker.

Neal began forging his identity while working as a young musician out of Toronto, where he and brothers Raful, Jr., Noel, Larry and Ronnie formed the Neal Brothers Band to back up touring blues stars. He returned to Baton Rouge and in 1988 began releasing albums through Alligator Records. Those recordings, which showcased the Louisiana sound he had grown up with, drew praise from critics.

In 1991, Neal appeared on stage in another medium: acting. He took the lead role in "Mule Bone," a 1930's play written by Langston Hughes and Zora Neale Hurston. Neal's run featured music written by Taj Mahal, and he himself would later set two Hughes poems to music.

Neal then began releasing albums through Telarc Records, collaborating with fellow harmonicist Billy Branch in 2004 to record *Double Take*, which won the W.C. Handy award the following year. He relocated to California in 2004, where he launched "Neal's Place," a cable television program that features him jamming with national and local musicians. The troubles he endured afterwards, including the loss of his father, a brother and a sister, and his treatment for hepatitis C, inspired one of his most critically-acclaimed albums, 2008's *Let Life Flow*.

Neal discussed his life last August (2010) while in the Washington, DC area to play a fundraiser for the DC Blues Society. We started the conversation by asking Neal about his then soon-to-be-released album, *Hooked on Your Love* (issued in September 2010).

**Neal:** I'm very excited about the new album.. You know my last CD was Let Life Flow, so I got a couple of years out of that and now I'm back again with a new one.

**BBP:** Is there something about this CD that's taking you in a different direction?

**Neal:** Well this CD here, I just wanted to keep in mind some of the guys that I come up with that a lot of the folks don't know about. I wrote, you know, seven or eight songs on the CD, but also, people like O.B. Wright, Bobby Bland, Little Milton. I wanted to hit a little bit of that blues style as well, because on my circuit you don't hear it that often. And I grew up with it. So I just want to share that with my fans. And I'm really happy about the way it turned out.

**BBP:** I heard a rumor that when you were three years old Slim Harpo put a harmonica in your mouth to keep you quiet.

**Neal:** I was a little older than three (laughing). But he and my dad Raful Neal, Slim Harpo from Baton Rouge, they were all friends. And he was coming over to the house one day and they was unloading the trailer and he told me—pickin' on a little kid—to go inside the trailer and see if any instruments were left. I went in and he closed the doors on me and I freaked out. I got a phobia. And it freaked him out so bad, to cheer me up he got a harmonica and gave to me and said. "Son, I'm so sorry I didn't mean to..." But I never thought I'd end up playing that thing...

**BBP:** What were some of the lessons you learned from your dad? What were some of the most important things you learned from him?



**Neal:** To make sure I get all of my residuals (laughs), like he didn't get. No, but I learned from my dad to enjoy the music and I don't know, just treat everybody the way you want to be treated and that's one of the main things I really carry with myself.

**BBP:** So how does it feel to be in a family that has a musical tradition? I mean that's something that the average person can't really understand. **Neal:** Well the music just makes us closer, 'cause normally you have to have a meeting and reunions to get the family together. But all I do is get a gig (laughs), call everybody up, and that's all the time, you know what I mean? So that music keeps us together and keeps us under control and keeps the love in the family as well. Because we're always together doing something that we love.

BBP: Buddy Guy, what was it like to play bass for him?

**Neal:** You know Buddy is from Baton Rouge and his brother Phil and Sam Guy and all of them and his sister down south, she still lives in Baton Rouge, so they've always been family to me. It was a pleasure to play for a guy who used to play for my dad, because Buddy was my dad's guitar player back in the fifties before he left home. So it was like, wow, man, I'm part of the crew now. So it was all good...

**BBP:** Who are some of your influences, and I know you play several instruments: the trumpet and the piano, and uh, bass I believe and the guitar. Who are some of your favorite musicians of all time?

Neal: Well, Muddy Waters, Jimmy Reed, Howlin' Wolf, Little Walter, Son House. Man, they was all the folks I come up listening to and then I had a chance to play with Muddy Waters and had a chance to know John Lee Hooker and all of these guys that my dad used to talk about. I ended up being close friends with them. I just did a documentary called "American Blues Man" on growing up in Louisiana and my life's story. So I'm happy to share that but I just grew up with a lot of the folks and all of my great guys are gone. So I'm just trying to carry that legacy...

# Big Bill Broonzy Biographer Bob Riesman Coming to Politics and Prose

On Thursday evening, July 7, Bob Riesman, author of "I Feel So Good: The Life and Times of Big Bill Broonzy" (2011 University of Chicago Press) will be appearing at Politics and Prose bookstore to discuss his biography of the Chicago blues legend who passed away over half a century ago, but whose music and life still influences the blues world of today. He is scheduled to speak starting at 7:00 pm.

On its website, Politics and Prose (<a href="www.politics-prose.com/event/book/bob-riesman-i-feel-so-good">www.politics-prose.com/event/book/bob-riesman-i-feel-so-good</a>) notes "Riesman's life of Big Bill Broonzy (1903–1958) encompasses the bluesman's many pivotal roles. From melding the traditional, rural blues of his native Arkansas Delta region with the urban sound in 1930s Chicago, to influencing the resurgence of folk music after World War II and inspiring the blues-rock musicians of the 1960s, Broonzy was a key figure for 20th-century popular music."

Riesman, in compiling this biography, did considerable research as well as interviewed countless people including blues man Billy Boy Arnold (who was mentored by Big Bill and is scheduled to have an album of Broonzy's music released); members of Broonzy's family; Bill Randle, who produced the last interviews of Broonzy; Studs Terkel; David 'Honeyboy' Edwards; B.B. King; Eric Clapton; Pete Seeger; Rambling Jack Elliott; Jody Williams; Jimmie Lee Robinson; and Ron Sweetman. He also explored the archives of Yannick Bruynoghe, and Jim O'Neal provided tapes of an interview with Blind John Davis and a transcript of one with Memphis Slim.

In his research of Broonzy, Riesman was able to ascertain that Big Bill Broonzy's real name is Lee Bradley and he was born in Jefferson County, Arkansas on June 26, 1903, the fourth and last boy of Frank and Mittie Bradley. The Bradley Family lived in Jefferson County outside Pine Bluff from the 1880s through the 1920s. Riesman traces Broozy's musical and recording career, including his prominence in the Chicago blues from the thirties until his death, the significant role he played in establishing the folk music circuit, and his pioneering tours of Europe.

In a May 2 review of this book, which is posted on my blog, <a href="http://inabluemood.blogpsot.com">http://inabluemood.blogpsot.com</a>, I concluded "I Feel So Good was a compelling read and a biography worthy of the subject, whose blues are timeless. # **CD Review** Grady Champion Dreamin'

In the liner notes of his new Dreamin' (GSM), Grady Champion recalls the year that followed his winning the 2010 International Blues Challenge presented by the Blues Foundation. It was a year that brought him recognition, both locally and internationally. Dreamin' is a follow-up to Back In Mississippi Live at the 930 Blues Cafe which was rereleased on Earwig last year. This recording was produced by Zac Harmon and Christopher Troy who provide most of the backing for Champion on this.

About the earlier record, I wrote "The albums strengths include the fact that Grady is a terrific vocalist who exhibits considerable personality and enthusiasm as he sings. He is an effective, credible harp player if not a virtuoso, with Rice Miller being an obvious influence." These comments apply (although I might suggest Detroit's Little Sonny is a similar harp stylist to Champion) to the present recording opening with a strutting "My Rooster Is King" where he forcefully sings, backed by his overdubbed harp, about the rooster that spreads his wings and rules the roost. The title song, has an effective employment of a vocal chorus, as he sings about dreaming of loving his girl like no one before. There is some effective tremolo-laced guitar backing his vocal.

"Weight of the World" is an attractive soul ballad with Troy adding accordion sounding fills on his keyboards. "Guilty As Charged," with an emphatic accompaniment, has an intriguing lyric about proclaiming his love while cheating and breaking his woman's heart as a harp riff punctuates his vocal. Harmon and Champion collaborated on "Same Train" with an urgent vocal of waiting at the station for the train to bring his baby back. "Make That Monkey Jump" is a simple dance number while "Cross That Bridge" is a southern soul number about a couple sneaking behind their spouses and knowing it's wrong but unable to stop. A straight down in the alley groove frames "Thank You For Giving Me the Blues," with a strong vocal. Harmon is striking on guitar here. The backing vocals detract from the country flavor of "Laugh, Smile, Cry Sometimes" (whose melody suggests Ray Charles' "I Got a Woman"). Zac Harmon takes a spoken vocal on the closing "Walk With Me Baby," that sounds like a funky 2011 equivalent of "Scratch My Back," as Champion's harp adds atmosphere.

Grady Champion brings an animated, fervent style to his music and with a varied program of material. If not a world class harp player, his playing does complement his strong singing. Dreamin' will undoubtedly please his fans and make him new ones.

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# Tinner Hill Blues Festival: Not Just Another Day in the Park





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
