- represent the DC Blues Society at the 28th Annual International Blues Challenge (IBC), Jan. 31 Feb. 4, 2012, in Memphis, TN

Ronnie Baker Brooks - "One of Today's Top Live Performers" Is Coming to the Surf Club

"In Ronnie Baker Books' powerhouse hands, blues-rock never sounded so outrageous. Soul never sounded so delicious. And blues never sounded so profound... one of today's top live performers..." Art Tipaldi, *Blues Revue*

On August 25, DCBS will proudly present Ronnie Baker Brooks at a show at the Surf Club Live in Hyattsville, MD. See information on the right for details. Put this on your calendar and bring your friends for what promises to be a great show.

Ronnie Baker Brooks grew up steeped in American music tradition yet his focus remains resolutely on the future. "I grew up among the best of the best," Brooks says. "Every time I play, I feel like I've got to do it with the authenticity and passion that I saw in guys like Buddy Guy, Muddy Waters, B.B. King and my father (Lonnie Brooks). But I also have to put my twist on it. None of those guys repeated what came before them."

Brooks' twist involves enlivening blues-rock with deep soul and modern hip-hop vocals and funk rhythms. Working with Minneapolis producer Jellybean Johnson, a veteran collaborator of Prince and Janet Jackson, Brooks takes roots sounds and transforms them into something that spans the ages.

"I like to think of how Muddy Waters took the Mississippi blues he heard in his youth and modernized it for his times by making it electric and harder," Brooks explains. "That's what I'm trying to do for my generation. I want to take what's authentic and powerful about the music I grew up loving and bring in other influences without losing the heart and conviction of it."

Brooks has earned his spot on the front lines. He spent a dozen years backing his father, watching how the master entertainer drew enthusiastic responses night after night. For years, the younger Brooks put his lessons on stage every night, opening his father's show to great response. With his father's blessing, he left the band to strike out on his own shortly after releasing his own debut album, Golddigger in 1998 (followed by Take Me Witcha' (2001) and Torch (2006)). Like his father before him, Brooks became a Chicago blues mainstay, playing regularly in Chicago area clubs. (He also travels extensively nationally and internationally.) 

Labor Day weekend in DC means it's time for the Annual DC Blues Festival at the Carter Barron Amphitheatre. This free event on Saturday, September 3 provides a full day of Blues music and activities that include vocal and harmonica workshops. The lineup for the main stage includes:

Preston Shannon - Hailed as the reigning "King of Beale Street," Memphis' own Preston Shannon is a powerful guitarist with a compelling and soulful voice.

Grady Champion - This winner of the 2010 International Blues

Challenge (IBC) is a native of Jackson, MS, and his electrifying performances showcase his harmonica and guitar playing, vocals, songwriting, and charisma.

Nadine Rae & the Allstars - Nadine captivates whenever she performs. This Baltimore, MD native has performed with some of the Nation's top blues and R&B artists, and she's know for her rugged, soulful delivery.

Anthony "Swamp Dog" Clark - Harmonica player, singer, and songwriter, Anthony Clark resides in the DC area. His band plays a funk-tinged version of the Blues and won the 2010 DC Blues Society Battle of the Bands and competed in the 2011 IBC in Memphis.

DC Blues Society Band - The group of talented local musicians play at various DCBS and public events and often showcase special guest performers.

Living Blues Magazine Announces 18th Annual Living Blues Awards

Living Blues magazine issued the following press release regarding their Annual Living Blues Awards, and noted that Buddy Guy was the big winner with five awards.

The winners in the 2011 reader's poll are:

Buddy Guy - Best Blues Artist of the Year (Male), Most Outstanding Musician (Guitar), Most Outstanding Blues Singer, Best Live Performer, and his album *Living Proof* won Best Album of 2010.

Blues Artist of the Year (Female) and Most Outstanding Musician (Keyboard) went to Marcia Ball.

Charlie Musselwhite won Most Outstanding Musician (Harmonica).

The Best Blues Album of 2010 (Historical Recording) was Dinah Washington's *The Fabulous Miss D! The Keystone, Decca, & Mercury Singles* 1943-1953 and Best Blues DVD, *In Session*, Albert King with Stevie Ray Vaughan.

The winners in the 2011 critics poll are:

James Cotton - Best Male Blues Artist of the Year & Most Outstanding Musician (Harmonica).

Mavis Staples - Best Female Blues Artist of the Year (Female) & Most Outstanding Blues Singer awards.

Lurrie Bell (guitar), Pinetop Perkins (keyboard), Bob Stroger (bass), Kenny Smith (drums), Major Handy (other) and Eddie Shaw (horns) were the recipients of the Most Outstanding Musician awards.

Lil' Ed & the Blues Imperials, James Kinds, and the Relatives were voted Best Live Performer, Comeback Artist of the Year, & Artist Deserving More Attention, respectively.

The following releases won in the Best Blues Albums categories:

James Cotton's *Giant*, Denise LaSalle's **24** *Hour Woman*, James Kinds's *Love You From the Top*, Eric Bibbs's *Booker's Guitar*, Kenny Neal's *Hooked on Your Love*, and Junior Wells's *Live in Boston* **1966**.

Blues Book of the Year went to Scott Barretta & Ken Murphy for State of the Blues.

Ben Wiley Payton Provides DC with a Double Shot of Mississippi Acoustic Blues

Washington got a double shot of acoustic blues in late May when Ben Wiley Payton visited town to play same-day concerts to large crowds at the Library of Congress American Folklife Center's Homegrown Concert Series and The Kennedy Center that evening. The Mississippi native brought a unique style, combining Delta, Piedmont, Gospel and folk traditions, with a splash of electronic blues influence on the side under the sponsorship of the Mississippi Arts Commission.

Like DC Blues Society founder John Cephas, Wiley has an easy-going style, combining a little history of the blues with his solid playing skills, sweet voice and gentle humor. He was backed by the Thundering Harps, which ironically had no harp player, but who provided solid but unobtrusive support from Cyndi Clark (Conga drums), Steve Chester (rhythm guitar), and 18-year-old Kindrick Hart (electric bass).

Although Wiley was born and spent his early years in the hill country of the Delta, he didn't start playing until he moved to Chicago in his late teens. Beginning on the bass, he played for soul groups before seriously taking up the guitar, moving up the chain playing for a number of popular national groups, including Bobby Rush, Joe Evans and the Supersonics and as a house band member in local Chicago blues clubs backing national musicians coming through town.

He got the acoustic bug while on a six-month gig in Morocco, where he would hang with the locals who played indigenous instruments without amplification. Returning to Chicago, he played for The Wolf Gang, Howlin' Wolf's back-up band, subbing for the legendary Hubert Sumlin, who was ill. In the late 70's he heard his first Robert Johnson recording which cemented his musical future in pre-World War II acoustic blues.

Payton's sets feature a combination of acoustic classics, like "Dust My Broom" and "Crossroad Blues," but with his own interpretation, and a number of his own songs that bring the Delta to life in a contemporary, yet classic way. His first album, Digging Up Old Country Blues, features 11 original songs ranging from a tune about mule plowboys to lost love to gathering for a barn dance. Although he plays in the $20^{\rm th}$ century genre, he adds $21^{\rm st}$ century licks and clever lyrics that evoke working-man's poetry.

Payton (photo at right) was also in town to record new material for a Sirius satellite radio exclusive and is working on a new album to be released later this year. Waiting to speak to him after his concert, I was surprised by the number of Mississippi residents who came to chat-up the congenial singer/songwriter, including Mississippi Senator



Roger Wicker and Congressman Gregg Harper. He certainly knows how to play to a home crowd, while drawing in first-timers alike.

"I prefer to play in venues other than clubs, like churches, auditoriums and places where people come to listen," Payton said. "I'm as much a historian and teacher as a performer, and I like to tell stories both about the songs and the lyrics. When I'm not performing, I love to teach either in schools or in guitar classes."

Payton carries two Taylor guitars with him while on tour, one is standard tuning, the other in an alternate tuning. "I like the feel of an acoustic guitar and the sound it provides," he said. "It also matches well with the intimacy of the lyrics from that era."

This was Payton's first trip to the DC area and he likes what he sees, saying that he would like to return this fall if he can find the right venues. You can listen to his concerts online at:

In Memoriam

RIP Lil Greenwood - Lil Greenwood died on July 19 at the age of 86 in her native Alabama. She had been in declining health since the fall of 2001, when she suffered a stroke. Lil sang with the Duke Ellington Orchestra, spent three years with Roy Milton and His Solid Senders, and recorded for the Modern and Federal labels, Her first release was with Roy Milton, the June 1950 issued blues song "Heart Full Of Pain," that was coupled with the up-tempo "Boogie All Night Long."

RIP Clarence Clemons - This longtime saxophone player for Bruce Springstein's E Street Band died June 18 from complications from a stroke. He was 69 years old. Clemons had also branched into acting and a solo career, and contributed to releases by other artists, including Lady Gaga.

RIP Benny Spellman - Spellman was a singer whose hits "Fortune Teller" and "Lipstick Traces" helped to define the sound of 1960s New Orleans R & B. He was also the low voice of Ernie K-Doe's smash hit "Mother In Law" He passed away in Florida on June 3 at age 79, following a long illness.

CD Review: Revelator - Tedeschi Trucks Band

Having successful solo careers, spouses Susan Tedeschi and Derek Trucks have put that part of their careers behind them for a period to co-lead a band. Each has developed into established and focused performers who often joined each other on stage when possible, so this new combination is not surprising. The Tedeschi Trucks Band has recently issued *Revelator*, on Sony Masterworks.

In addition to the co-leaders, Kofi Burbridge from Derek's band is on keyboards, while his brother Oteil from the Allman Brothers handles the bass. Mike Mattison, Derek's vocalist is aboard for harmony vocals (and he contributes to some of the songs, which are all originals). Tyler Greenwell and J.J. Johnson are on drums, while Mark Rivers, David Ryan Harris, and Ryan Shaw are on harmony vocals. There is also a horn section that includes Kebbi Williams on saxophone, Maurice Brown on trumpet, and Saunders Semmons on trombones. The horns add some punch and atmosphere, but with one exception little else.

Few will be surprised with the music here. There is plenty of Trucks' piercing, vocalized slide guitar, and

Tedeschi certainly has matured to a superb singer. Certainly, she is equal to others in the blues-R&B-roots-pop vein, able to move from a honey-toned straight-ahead to a church-rooted shout, always sounding natural. It's easy to simply sit back and listen to the solid, tight performances here, and certainly one should expect that the live performances equal, if not surpass, the level of the music on the CD.

This is not to say that everything is perfect. There is some sameness to some of the material, and some of the material on closer examination is not as strong as the band's execution. "Bound For Glory" seems like a stringing together of hooks, and the entire lyrics do not cohere, although "Simple Things" is a gem, with Tedeschi's vocal acknowledging that she has not been giving enough in the relationship and maybe that's why one has the walls around himself.

The groove of "Until You Remember" evokes classic Memphis soul and has another of the better lyrics here, as Tedeschi sings it ain't right to be holding on too tight "until you remember you are mine." There is a nice suggestion of the Memphis Horns or Bar-Kays at the opening, while

Derek's guitar builds upon the intensity generated by Susan's vocals. An intriguing performance is "These Walls," with its addition of sarode and tabla to the musical mix to a tune that has a melody similar to "Angel From Montgomery," with lyrics about a woman whose man has left town and whose times have been hard praying that the walls don't fall down and "thinking 'bout you baby for such a long, long time." The interplay between the sarode and Truck's very restrained slide-work here is very nice.

In addition to the uneven songwriting, this writer wishes that the horns might have been given more than the supporting role they generally are used for. Maurice Brown, for example, is an especially gifted soloist with considerable warmth and originality and certainly would have further spiced up the performances. The horns on "Love Has Something Else To Say" provide a hint of this point with a dialogue between guitar and tenor sax.

Of course, these are minor criticisms at most and *Revelator* certainly will be on many lists of the best recordings of 2011. Incidentally, after the conclusion of "Shelter," there is a hidden performance of an instrumental "Ghost Light."

Bangkok Blues, a music club/restaurant treasured by many blues fans, has posted the above notice to its website (www.bangkokblues.com) along with the following additional message: 'It is with great sadness that we announce that Bangkok Blues has officially closed. We had a great time, listened to some great music and met a lot of great people. Thank you to everyone for your years of support and we wish everyone well!"

The Falls Church News Press (www.fcnp.com) reported that the closing was apparently for financial reasons. The FNCP also provided the following information: "The Thai restaurant and live music venue was founded by internationally known Thai musician Chai Siribongkot and his family, who sold it to Sue Ann Nguyen and Johnathan Vu in the mid 2000s. Despite significant renovations, including the creation of a guitar shaped bar, Nguyen and Vu were unable to grow the business and (sold) it to Darrell Taylor and Sharon Kline. The iconic club located at 926 W.


Broad (Falls Church, VA) has been known for the mural of musicians (at right) on its exterior wall as well as its performers and menu."
