
Jim O'Neal Benefit Is Another Example of Blues Musicians/Fans Giving Back

On Saturday, January 7, the Wheaton American Legion will be pulsating with the sounds of blues musicians who have lined up to perform and show their support for Jim O'Neal, who has been promoting the blues since he co-founded Living Blues magazine, America's first blues magazine, in 1970 in Chicago. Jim O'Neal was diagnosed with lymph cancer in June 2011. At the time, he had no health insurance. He has subsequently had back surgery and chemotherapy.

O'Neal and his ex-wife Amy van Singel started the Living Blues magazine when they were studying journalism at Northwestern University in Chicago. O'Neal had expected to go to work for one of the four daily newspapers published in Chicago, but got interested in the blues when he realized that there was no American blues magazine. To find out what was happening in the Chicago blues scene, fans were reading magazines from England. Jim and Amy set out to change that. The first Living Blues issue was 40 pages, black and white, and featured Howlin' Wolf on the magazine cover. The magazine was produced in O"Neal's basement, and distribution was initially via old-fashioned networking. Bruce Iglauer, Alligator Record's founder, was one of the early editors of the magazine. O'Neal and van Singel received some funds to kickstart the project from Robert Koester, founder of Delmark Records. A distribution deal with Charles Levy increased the circulation to a peak of 15,0000 copies. In 1983, O'Neal and van Singel sold the magazine's publication rights for \$1 along with an archive of 20,000 LPs, clippings, and photographs to the Center for the Study of Southern Culture at the University of Mississippi. O'Neal remains as a consultant to the magazine. A 2002 inductee of the Blues Hall of Fame, O'Neal also co-founded Rooster Blues records and his more current projects have included his Stackhouse Recording Company and BluEsoterica Archives & Production. O'Neal, most recently, has also been research director and text writer for the Mississippi Blues Trail, a project funded by the National Endowment of the Arts. However, his medical condition has made it difficult for him to pursue his many interests as actively as he would like.

Blues musicians are rallying to help Jim, whose love for and commitment to the blues has been so critical to shaping so many music careers. There was an earlier benefit held in the DC area in the fall of 2011, and another benefit held in Chicago. The January 7 Jim O'Neal All-Star benefit at the Wheaton American Legion promises to be a terrific event, with a host of blues acts scheduled (Memphis Gold, Charlie Sayles, Michael Peck, Cathy Ponton King, Linwood Taylor, DCBS Band, Bret Littlehales, and more), door prizes, a raffle of an autographed guitar, a meet and greet autograph session, and more. Tickets/donations are only \$15. The benefit is scheduled for 7 to 11 pm, and the Wheaton American Legion is located at 11225 Fern St., Wheaton, MD 20902, near the Wheaton Metro Station.

Blues Foundation Gears Up for the Annual Blues Music Awards

The Blues Foundation has announced that the 33rd Blues Music Awards will be held on Thursday May 10, 2012 at the Cook Convention Center in Memphis, Tennessee. Close to 100 nominees are expected to attend, and the night will be filled with their appearances and performances in a cabaret/dinner setting in the Convention Center's ballroom. The Blues Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and Charter Members' Dinner will be held the night before on Wednesday, May 9.

The Blues Music Awards are recognized as the highest honor given to Blues artists, and indeed, it is an honor even to be nominated. Leading with four nominations each are Sugar Ray & the Bluetones with their *Evening CD*, Louisiana artists Tab Benoit with his *Medicine* release, and Johnny Sansone and his *The Lord is Waiting and the Devil is Too*. Susan Tedeschi and Derek Trucks, the Tedeschi -Trucks Band and their *Revelator CD* combined for four nominations. Tommy Castro, his band and the various artists on *The Legendary Rhythm & Blues Revue--Live!* CD also combined for four nominations.

Three nominations each went to Eugene Hideaway Bridges, Lazy Lester, David Maxwell, Ana Popovic and Johnny Rawls.. More than thirty first time nominees are also on the list, including blues-rock performers Joe Bonamassa, Warren Haynes and George Thorogood. A number of past winners of the International Blues Challenge also made the nominee list, including Eden Brent, Grady Champion, Diunna Greenleaf, Zac Harmon, JP Soars, Trampled Under Foot and Lionel Young.

Voting is currently in process; however, voting is limited to Blues Foundation members. Members also receive seating preference at the Awards show. 

In November and December, We Said Good-Bye to These Terrific Musicians

RIP Whop Frazier: Aug. 31, 1943 - Dec. 22, 2011



On December 22, DC bluesman William (Whop) Frazier passed away at Fairfax Inova Hospital. He was 68 years old. Whop, a DC native and friend of DCBS, had been singing the blues and playing bass guitar for more than 35 years. As a full-time musician, he had gigs all over the United States and Europe, and he played with some of the greats of Blues and R&B lore. Frazier, a fixture on the regional music scene throughout the '90s, was known for his band's rollicking takes on Chicago-style shuffles and soulful, down-home covers as well as funfilled originals. His blues style was driven by his whopping bass sound and his vigorous, soulful singing.

Whop grew up around 14th & U Streets in Washington, DC and spent a lot of time around the clubs in the Howard Theater area. In a 2008 interview for the DCBS newsletter, he recalled running errands, like picking up and delivering sandwiches, for the musicians who played there. When he started trying to play the guitar as a young teenager, he got tips from "Skip" Pitts, a guitarist for Isaac Hayes. It was Skip who apparently told Whop his fingers were too long for the guitar and suggested he take up electric bass. K.C. Jones (Marvin Gaye's bass player) helped teach him how to play bass. Whop was gigging by the time he was 14 and by age 17, he went on the road with Dee Clark ("Hey Little Girl (in the High School Sweater)", "Raindrops"). Locally, he played with Jesse Yawn, Eddie Daye & the 4 Bars. When he was in his early twenties, he gigged with Little Royal ("Jealous (Kind of Fellow)"), Wilson Pickett, and Pookie Hudson (lead singer and songwriter for the doo wop group, The Spaniels). He got into the Blues when he began working with DC Blues Legend Bobby Parker, and he played and toured with Bobby for over 10 years in the late 1960's and early 70's. He also played with numerous other musicians, including James Cotton, Junior Wells, and Carey Bell. When he tired of playing behind other singers/musicians, he started his own band (1993-94).

In 1993, Whop was featured on a Bad Influence Band album, providing vocals and playing bass (*Live at the Bad Habits Café* featuring Whop Frazier, Mapleshade #03152). His own band's first album was *Doing It On My Own* (1995), and he later released *Bathtub Blues* (1998), and *Here I Go Again* (2002), which included the song "Hand Dance." Whop wrote and produced these albums under his own label, Barn Yard Blues Productions. His last album was *Live at the 17th Annual Bluebird Blues Festival* (Rising Sun Music, 2010).

When asked how he got the name "Whop?" he explained: "Well, it came about for a couple reasons. I started out using a pick on the bass that made a whopping sound. But as a teenager I also was known for exaggerating. The guys laughed and talked about me telling whoppers of tales. One of 'em suggested they call me Whop. The name stuck."

Whop is survived by his wife, Delores "DeDe" Frazier, 4 daughters, 3 sons, 9 grandchildren, and 2 great-grandchildren. For more information on Whop, visit www.whopfrazier.com. Photo above from website.

RIP Hubert Sumlin: Nov. 16, 1931 - Dec. 4, 2011

Hubert Sumlin passed away on December 4 from a heart attack, after a long bout with respiratory illness. He was 80 years old. Sumlin was considered to be among the greatest guitarists of all time, and was best known for his extraordinary guitar work on the 1950s and 1960s recordings of Howlin' Wolf. Despite his health problems in recent years, he had continued to tour. He was born in Greenwood, MS and raised in Hughes, AK. When he was a young boy, he snuck into a nightclub to see Howlin' Wolf perform, and Wolf was so taken with Hubert's enthusiasm that he took the young boy in and developed a father-like mentoring role with Hubert. When Wolf moved to Chicago in 1953, a year later, he called for Hubert to also move and join his band. Hubert eventually became the star guitarist and his innovative rhythmic techniques and wild bursts of lead guitar became integral to Howlin' Wolf's sound. When Howlin' Wolf recorded the London Sessions in 1970, Hubert began a life-long relationship with UK blues artists like Eric Clapton and The Rolling Stones. In 1976, when Wolf died, Hubert drifted about, playing with different groups. He worked with Eddie Shaw & The Wolf Gang, Andrew McMahon, Sunnyland Slim, Louisiana Red, Carey Bell, Little Eddie, Big Mac, and others. He also recorded numerous albums under his own name for various music labels. Eventually, under the guidance of manager Toni Ann Mamary, Hubert began to get his due as the guitar legend he was. Hubert played major festivals; had his historic bio, Incurable Blues, published; and was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in 2008. RIP Coco Robicheaux: Oct. 25, 1947 - Nov. 25, 2011

Coco Robicheaux (nee Curtis John Arcineaux), New Orleans hoodoo bluesman, passed away on November 25. He collapsed that day at the Apple Barrel on Frenchmen Street, and was pronounced dead at Tulane Medical Center. He was 64. Robicheaux was known for his gravelly voice, a swamp-blues guitar style and a fascination with subjects of a spiritual and/or mystical nature. A familiar figure in the Frenchmen Street entertainment district in New Orleans, he was also a regular performer for the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival. He recorded some 45s in the 1960s, but his first album (Spiritland) wasn't released until 1994, when Orleans Records offered him a record deal. Spiritland was well-received, especially in Europe, where Robicheaux performed to appreciative crowds in the 1990s. He subsequently released Louisiana Medicine Man (1998), Hoodoo Party (2000), Yeah U Rite (2005 on his own Spiritland Records), and Revelator (2010). Robicheaux was also a visual artist, sculptor and painter. Information from www.nola.com

RIP Sam Rivers: Sept. 25, 1923 - Dec. 26, 2011

Sam Rivers, a pioneering jazz saxophonist and composer, died on December 26 of pneumonia, in Orlando, FL. He was 88. Rivers helped define the avant-garde jazz scene in the '60s and '70s, and he also played with great musicians across several musical genres, including blues musicians T-Bone Walker and John Lee Hooker, as well as jazz icons such as Dizzy Gillespie and Cecil Taylor. Born in El Reno, OK, raised in Chicago, IL and Little Rock, AK, he moved to Boston in the late 1940s and studied at the Boston Conservatory of Music and Boston University. He also performed with Herb Pomeroy's big band, an ensemble that included future music producer Quincy Jones. In 1964, he moved to New York, where he was hired by Miles Davis. In the 1970s, his Studio Rivbea was the hub of the avant-garde jazz scene in Lower Manhattan. When he relocated to Orlando, he joined a number of notable musicians working at Walt Disney World to take part in a booming jazz scene, and he subsequently became and remained a long-time fixture on the Orlando music scene. Until September 2011, Rivers continued his weekly open rehearsals with his powerful big band, the Rivbea Orchestra, at the Orlando musician's union hall.
