Generation Blues - Attention Young Blues Musicians (and Their Parents and Teachers)



The Blues Foundation expanded its longstanding Blues in the Schools youth education efforts with a new initiative that began in 2010 entitled Generation Blues. This scholarship program allows qualified applicants under the age of 25 to study their instrument of choice at reputable camps, seminars and workshop programs (see some examples below). seminars and workshops attended by Generation Blues scholarship recipients generally take place throughout the year in

the recipients' choice of locations. Participants are awarded the scholarships on an annual basis, and participation is open to anyone under the age of 25 interested in the blues. Applicants must write a letter of intent and provide letters of recommendation. Video submissions are also accepted. The next deadline for submissions is April 1, 2013, and the application form and information is available on the Blues Foundation website, www.blues.org.

In 2012, the third year of the Program, the Generation Blues Scholarship Program was able to offer scholarships to 25 young Blues musicians, ranging in age from 10 to 21. One of the 25 recipients was Bear Hutchinson, who had been the DC Blues Society representative to the 2012 International Blues Challenge's Youth Showcase. Bear, 16, is from Annapolis, MD and his Generation Blues Scholarship allowed him to attend the Berklee Summer Programs - Piano/Keyboards Workshop. Bear provided the following summary of his experience, which is posted to the Generation Blues website:

"I learned so much more than I ever thought. The teachers at Berklee are all such accomplished musicians and their love of music was really inspiring. But what was even more fun was meeting the other piano players attending Berklee, who came from around the world. Their talent was humbling! We stayed in the Berklee dorms which had studios on the first floor filled with music equipment and we stayed up really late jamming. It was incredibly fun! A bunch of us also brought melodicas and harmonicas and we played on Newbury Street and made enough money to pay for dinner."



CD Review: Grady Champion Shanachie Days

Grady Champion definitely has the blues cred. Born in Canton, MS, he was the youngest of 28 children. He worked the family farm as a youth, sang in the church choir and sang gospel. The family eventually moved to Miami, FL, and he tried his hand at various things, including boxing (how could he not with a name like Champion), being a radio DJ and a rapper. In the late 1990s, he settled on the blues. He released two albums, Payin' for My Sins and 2 Days Short of a Week, which garnered good reviews and poor sales, but fell out of print. The highlights of those albums are combined into this release. His career did not take off and he played around Mississippi for a decade. Things revived when he won the Blues Foundation's International Blues Challenge in 2010. Local fans may remember that the DC Blues Society presented performances by Grady Champion in July 2010 at the Silver Spring American Legion and at the 2011 Annual DC Blues Festival at the Carter Barron.



Champion is a vocalist/harp player/occasional guitarist/songwriter. He relies primarily on original material in this album. He covers a variety of subjects, often with a fresh perspective and some humor. Of course, the most common theme is the "Payin' for My Sins" is a tale of repentance for cheating that the singer convinces us is true. "Let Me Be" is the familiar situation that "Don't you pressure me no more...We have had this conversation one too many times/I'm sorry your conclusion just don't jibe with mine." On one song, he hangs the repetitive chorus, ""Wine and Women" don't mix/ Leave you with a terrible fix," probably all that needs to be said. On another, "Stop Chasin' Me," he is pursued by the Devil, but it isn't Robert Johnson's, it's a woman. On "You Got Some Explainin' To Do," he questions his woman's reasons why she never seems to be at home at night. "Troubled Mind" expresses pain at constant troubles, women, family and life in general, with some stinging slide guitar. Sometimes, he ventures into areas of social concern. "Policeman Blues" deals with racial profiling and how the police have near-absolute control over the person when they stop him/her. "Children of the Corn" raises the question of why children would bring a gun to school.

Champion is a rough-hewn, but expressive singer. His harp playing is fairly rudimentary, but his limited use of it emphasizes the points he wishes to make. His workmanlike bands get the job done. The sound mix puts the voice up front, making it easy to follow the lyrics. Grady Champion is a likable artist, although you can't see his dynamic performances on a CD. If you want to hear how he started as a bluesman, this album is a worthwhile acquisition, available at www.gradychampion.com.

Editor's note: Shanachie Days was released in 2012 and followed Grady Champion's successful 2011 release, Dreamin'. His next CD is scheduled to be released February 5, 2013, and is titled Tough Times Don't Last.

Congratulations to The Newly Announced Blues Music Award Nominees!

The Blues Foundation has announced the nominations for their annual Blues Music Awards, which will be presented at the Cook Convention Center in downtown Memphis, TN, on May 9, 2013. The Blues Music Awards are universally recognized as the highest accolade afforded musicians and songwriters in Blues music, and the annual Blues Music Awards ceremony is considered a premier event, with almost every nominee not only attending but also performing.

The full list of nominees appears below (with the exception of a few additional categories, such as DVD and Historical Album). Several artists garnered a number of nominations, and the President, Jay Sieleman, addressed that issue as follows: "It is not uncommon in any arts genre for beloved artists with strong releases to pull in a number of nominations, and that is one of the factors at work this year. Yet there are also more than a dozen first-time nominees, plus the six Best New Artist nominees. It is gratifying to see both groups rewarded—those who have been near the top for a while and those who are getting the recognition they have been long seeking."

Online voting is open for Blues Foundation members until March 1, 2013, and ticket sales are also open. Individual tickets cost \$125. Blues Foundation members are the only fans who can vote and also receive seating preference at the Awards show. Anyone can become a member and there are different levels/fees for membership, beginning with Youth (free) and Blues Fan (\$25). Visit www.blues.org for more information.

In Memoriam: In The 2nd Half of 2012, We Said Good-Bye to These Terrific Blues Musicians

RIP Jimmy McCracklin: August 13, 1921 to December 20, 2012

Jimmy McCracklin, a fixture on the San Francisco Blues Scene for over six decades passed away on December 20, 2012, at the age of 91. Raised in St. Louis, his main influence was Walter Davis, the popular recording artist. After a stint in the Navy, he relocated to the West



Coast.. He first recorded in 1945 and later recorded prolifically for a variety of labels, turning out numerous recordings and thoughtful songs on the relations between the sexes including "My Time Is Limited," "Just Got To Know," "Yesterday Is Gone", and others, along with dance numbers like "The Georgia Slop," and "The Walk." Some of his recordings were quite humorous like his adaptation of Memphis Slim's "Beer Drinking Woman," and its sequel "Couldn't Be a Dream." McCracklin's Band became known as the Blues Blasters.

His music was recorded by numerous artists including "Tramp," a hit for Lowell Fulson,, Otis Redding, and Carla Thomas. Lonesome Sundown and Phillip Walker did a cover of "Stepping Up In Class," while Los Lobos revived "Georgia Slop." Freddy King incorporated part of "The Walk" into his classic "Hideaway," while Magic Sam covered "Every Day and Every Night" as performed "I Want To Know" in his live performances. McCracklin was one of the blues strongest lyricists and songwriters, and he was also a marvelous performer. I had the pleasure of seeing him at the 2008 Pocono Blues Festival, where his performance his band, the Nitelifes, were also giving head-turning performances at belied the fact he was 87 at the time. February 8, 1928 to December 12, 2012. RIP Eddie Burns:

Singer/guitarist/harmonica player Eddie Burns was one of the greatest of classic Detroit blues artists. Born in Belzoni, MS, Burns relo-



cated to Detroit in 1948 where he would rise to musical prominence and spend the rest of his life. During the late 40's to mid 1960s, he recorded scores of singles on many labels: Chess, Checker, DeLuxe, Palda, Harvey, Von, and Gotham, and also played harmonica on a number of classic John Lee Hooker songs for

the Sensation label. In 1972 Burns went on a European tour and while in the UK recorded his first full length album titled Bottle Up & Go on the Action label. Later albums followed for Big Bear Records, Black & Blue, Blue Suit and a 2002 collaboration with his brother, Jimmy Burns, called Snake Eyes on the Delmark label. RIP Mickey Baker: October 19, 1925 to November 27, 2012

Mickey "Guitar" Baker was a spectacular guitarist who's in-demand R&B session playing brought the guitar into a wild, frenzied role. He is



credited as being among the architects of rock 'n' roll guitar. Born in Louisville, Kentucky, Mickey Baker took up the guitar originally to play jazz. Inspired and advised by Pee Wee Crayton, Baker soon switched to the more commercial blues and R&B market where he found his niche. He developed a full-toned, edgy, and incredibly fun signature sound that could transform a good song into a hit.

This led to countless recording sessions with a long list of artists; Big Maybelle, Larry Dale, King Curtis, Sonny Terry, Brownie McGhee, and many others, Baker also took center stage, recording numerous instrumentals and joining up with Sylvia Vanderpool to form the duet, Mickey and Sylvia. Their 1956 million selling hit "Love Is Strange," with its signature guitar riff and great harmonizing vocals is what Mickey will best be remembered for. RIP Nick Curran: September 30, 1977 to October 6, 2012

Guitarist, songwriter and vocalist Nick Curran passed away on October 6 at his home in Austin, TX, He was 35 years old. Curran was a



powerhouse performer who drew inspiration from the blues and rockabilly artists of the 50's and was renowned for his uncanny knack of authentically recreating the feel, vibe, and swagger of classic R&B and rock. He cut his teeth playing with rockabilly legends Ronnie Dawson and Kim Lenz. A native of Maine, Curran moved to Dallas and immersed himself in the Texas roots music scene, eventually releasing two albums on the Texas Jamboree label, Fixin' Your Head and Nitelife Boogie. His national debut, Doctor Velvet on Blind Pig, was released in 2003 to critical acclaim. Nick and

festivals and clubs across the country. Doctor Velvet included guest appearances by Curran admirer Jimmie Vaughan (who called him "just a total ass-kicker"). The album won the W.C. Handy Award for "Best New Artist Debut." Nick Curran and the Nitelifes released their second Blind Pig album, Player!, in 2004 but the band broke up shortly afterward when Nick was asked to join Kim Wilson's latest reincarnation of The Fabulous Thunderbirds, just in time to record the band's Painted On release. He toured with the T-Birds for three years, and also worked on side projects such as Deguello, a blues/punk combo he formed with another T-Bird alum, Ronnie James, and a punk/rock 'n' roll band named The Flash Boys. His last album, Reform School Girl, was released in 2010 on the Eclectro Groove label. That year he was also diagnosed with oral cancer, and had been undergoing treatment until his death. RIP Napoleon Brundage: September 14, 1925 - August 2012

The Archie Edwards Blues Heritage Foundation website referred to Nap as the last of the "original" Barbershop "Masters," and AEBHF



representatives performed at his memorial service in recognition of this dedicated Nap was born in Pittsburgh, bluesman. Pennsylvania on September 14, 1925. He was taken to Devereaux, GA at the age of two, and he moved to Washington, DC at the age of 12. Nap played the harmonica with the Barbershop and performed at the Bull Durham Festival, Blues in the Burg, the DC Blues Society Festival, the Herndon Blues Festival, and other local venues. RIP Johnnie Bassett: October 9, 1935 to August 4, 2012

Detroit blues guitarist and vocalist Johnnie Bassett died from complications of liver cancer on August 4 in Grosse Pointe, Mi. He was 76 years old. Born in Marianna, FL, Johnnie and his family moved to De-




troit in 1944. He did his first recordings as a member of Joe Weaver's band who also recorded behind Nolan Strong & The Diablos, and Andre Williams for Fortune Records. He also played and recorded with the Miracles on their 1958 recording of "Got A Job." He emerged as an artist in his own right late in his career, with his great mid '90s recording work including Cannonball Records various artist collection Blues Across America; The Detroit Scene, and his first CD, I Gave My Life

To The Blues (Dutch Black Magic label). After further recordings for Cannonball, he switched to Mack Avenue Records and received many awards and nominations for his work. RIP Ernest Lane: March 16, 1931 to July 8, 2012

Clarksdale, MS native Ernest Lane was a highly respected blues piano player who was perhaps better known by his musical peers than by the general public. Ernest seemed born into blues piano. His father an accomplished player, and at an early age Ernest and his childhood buddy,



Ike Turner, studied under fellow Clarksdalean Pinetop Perkins, Ernest will likely be best remembered for his stirring piano on the late 1940s Robert Nighthawk session that produced "Sweet Black Angel" and "Anna Lee." Ernest also worked with Earl Hooker and Houston Stackhouse in the Southern music circuit. He relocated to CA in 1956, where he performed with Jimmy Nolen and George "Harmonica" Smith before becoming a part of the Ike & Tina Turner Revue. He also made

records with the Monkees and Canned Heat. He quit music for a number of years until rejoining Ike Turner for Ike's musical comeback. Ernest led the band at Ike's 2007 funeral performing classics by his lifelong friend. In recent years Ernest released two CD's under his own name.
