On Saturday, August 30, the DC Blues Society again provided what attendees described as "an awesome free music event," a "terrific celebration of the blues," and "just a fun-filled, family-friendly, fantastic day of music and dancing in a great setting within the city."

The six bands that performed on the Main Stage were a great mix of local talent plus international touring

acts. The John Cephas Workshop Stage welcomed attendees at the gates of the Carter Barron grounds and provided a second lineup of workshops and performances.

First up on the Main Stage was the Stacy Brooks Band. Being first on the lineup is never an easy spot since the audience is typically light at this time, and many are just arriving at the Amphitheatre grounds. However, that didn't stop Stacy and her band from belting out the songs, engaging those eager early


If you believe the many unsolicited comments about the 26th Annual DC Blues Festival,

Mosby Territory kicked off the first installment in the **DCBS Blues in the Community** series with a session called Blues on the Block. "Wild" Will Williamson and his wife, Alona, presented an entertaining facts-packed, fast-paced multi-media history tour. The presentation took us from itinerant Blues men, who played on street corners to Delta Bluesmen migrating the music to Chicago and elsewhere to the many women of the Blues, who led the recording revolution. "Wild" Will and Alona added thoughtful, well-researched narration to the photos depicting Blues-makers from the 1920's through WWII. They highlighted the fortunes, legacies, tragedies and comedies of the Blues men and women who played and shaped the Blues forever. Mosby Territory interspersed photos and narration with live renditions of period Blues and demonstrations of picking and sliding styles.

Look forward to more educational sessions like this one. Check it out. You might learn something.

arrivals, and basking in the realization that 'Yes," they were actually performing on that very large stage at this Washington, DC landmark. Stacy's Facebook post that morning shouted out: "I thank everyone that's had a part in my blues journey. Today I get to live the dream I've had since I went to a concert at the Carter Barron for the first time one summer when I was a teenager." Stacy's band won the honor of performing at the Festival when they won the 2013 DCBS Battle of the Bands. Performing with her at the Festival were Jeremy Boyle on guitar; Walter Tate, Jr. on sax; Barry Brady on keys/guitar, Charles "Red" Adkins on bass, and Calvin J. Newbill on drums.

The Hardway Connection is a long-standing DC area band that won the 1994 Blues Foundation competition (now called the International Blues Challenge) and has a strong following in the DC Metro area for their Southern Soul, old-school R & B and blues. When the Hardway Connection plays, their music pulses with danceable beats and the lead singers Robert Owens, Jerome MacKall, and Toni Love bring terrific energy to the stage, as they did at the Carter Barron.

Shirleta Settles and Friends were up next, and Shirleta's most enthusiastic fans were seated up close and loudly supported her entrance on the stage. Shirleta was joined by band members Jay Alan Thompson, Wes "Sugar" Biles and Ron Compton. She commanded the stage, sang with her heart, and given the intense heat of the afternoon, shed her jacket, hat, and hair (!) as her set progressed—all to the cheers of the audience.

DCBS was pleased to welcome Eddie Turner back to the Carter Barron (Eddie last played the Festival in 2009). His band the Trouble Twins included the very tall and stunning Anna Lisa on bass, and Christopher Rose on drums. Eddie is known for his fiery guitar playing and he really drove the music and showed pure enjoyment as he interacted with his band members and the audience.

Selwyn Birchwood and his band didn't hold back when they played their set, including

music from his recently released hit CD Don't Call No Ambulance, which is enjoying very high rankings on the Blues charts. Selwyn's swamp blues reflects his Florida home and the crowd loved it. He mixed his high energy songs with some slower Delta blues-type tunes which he played on the slide guitar while sitting down. As the winner of the 2013 International Blues Challenge, Selwyn clearly knows how to work it. The highlight of his Carter Barron performance was when he and his sax player, Regi Oliver, walked through the audience playing their instruments and doing a little hip-shaking with the crowd. The band also included Curtis Nutall on drums and Huff Wright on bass.

Shakura S'Aida took to the stage as the final act, and her bright red dress with a long front-slit made not only a fashion statement but also

ensured your attention was drawn to her as she belted out the blues. She was supported by a strong band, including guitarist Paige Armstrong who was front and center with her, Lance Anderson on keys, Roger Williams on bass and Tony Rabalao on drums.

While all the above music was happening on the Main Stage, there was also considerable action on the John Cephas Workshop Stage. Nadine Rae's vocal workshop gave the audience the opportunity to take the microphone, try out their own vocals and create a blues ballad under her tutelage. Sol Roots accompanied on the guitar and Dave Jackson played bass. Butch Grant conducted a guitar workshop with his wife, Nicki, on keyboard. The kids gathered around Dave Harris for his harmonica workshop as each tried out a free harmonica. The closing performance was the Archie Edwards Blues Heritage Foundation Ensemble.





The Nighthawks

EllerSoul records

reviewed by Ron Weinstock

It has been a couple of years since The Nighthawks had a new recordings and EllerSoul has just issued **444**. This

is the second CD since drummer Mark Stutso joined original Nighthawk Mark Wenner (harmonica), Paul Bell (guitar) and Johnny Castle (bass) and is a nice mix of blues and real rock and roll that continues the band's four decades plus musical journey.

The music is a mix of originals and forgotten musical gems such as The Du Droppers "Walk That Walk" that kicks this disc off on a rocking groove followed by a solid rendition of the Tracy Nelson-Gary Nicholson "Living the Blues" that showcases Wenner's



formidable harmonica playing along with the crisp instrumental and vocal backing. Castle wrote "444 A.M." which provided the album with its title with Bell adding some rockabilly touches on his solo (reminiscent of Castle's one-time employer, Bill Kirchen)

on a bit of kick-ass rock and roll. Stutso takes the vocal on the impressive bluesy reworking of "You're Gone," a bluegrass original borrowed from Stutso's brother-in-law.

Wenner's "Honky Tonk Queen" comes off as a cross of early seventies Rolling Stones and honky tonk country followed by the hot rockabilly reworking of "Got a Lot of Livin" from Elvis' movie "Lovin' You." In contrast the rendition of "Crawfish" from the film, "King Creole," has a swampy feel. Castle sings "High Snakes," a moody lament of lost love, that he co-wrote with Bill Kirchen. Stutso provides a forceful vocal on a Gary Nicholson's "Nothin' But The Blues." Wenner does a straight cover of the Muddy Waters classic, "Louisiana Blues," before the album closes with Castle's lovely country-folk number "Roadside Cross" that closes this recording on a different musical tenor.

444 is more of a roots recording with country and rock influences mixed with the band's blues foundations. Solidly played and performed, the appeal of 444 will extend beyond the band's existing fans to those who love American roots music.

Good Food, Blues, and Friendly Atmosphere Win Votes For Joining the Republic

Republic is an eclectic place. Of course, since it's located in Takoma Park, its inclusion of old and new, refined and funky, shouldn't come as a surprise, but the ease with which this venue blends all the pieces makes it a welcome addition to the local culinary and music scene.

If you go on a Monday night, you can enjoy Blues Monday, which showcases a different local blues band each week. On a recent Monday night, Hard Swimmin' Fish performed its quirky mix of original blues and blues songs so old that people think they're originals. Other bands on the schedule include the Smokin' Polecats, Jonny Grave, and Eleanor Ellis. There's also an open mic night on Sundays and weekend shows.

There is no cover charge. The absence of a cover charge helps bands "build their fan base," according to Catherine Rytkonen, Republic's booking manager. She said the restaurant, which opened late last year, started having music in March.

In warm weather, the bands perform outside on the back patio. Otherwise, they perform along the windows at the front of the restaurant, which enables the audience to watch as pedestrians on the sidewalk outside stop to listen and then get lured inside.

Republic does not have an official dance floor, but the floor is made of wide wooden planks that are

easy to dance on. While Hard Swimmin' Fish played, dancers commandeered the floor space between the tables and the band. When that space filled up, some determined dancers turned the space at the back of the restaurant into an impromptu dance floor, and the friendly servers good-naturedly walked around them.

The audience got a special treat on Aug. 18, when current D.C. Council member and former longtime D.C. Mayor Marion Barry joined Hard Swimmin' Fish to sing "Stormy Monday." Barry, who has been sighted



in the restaurant more than once, sang with a bluesy gusto honed in his hometown of Memphis.

Unlike many restaurants that book local bands, Republic isn't a dive. It's primarily a trendy restaurant that features creative dishes made from fresh local ingredients. It also has an extensive selection of oysters and a lengthy cocktail list.

The tab can get expensive if you try some of the menu's more inventive offerings. This reviewer spent almost \$40 on an appetizer (soft shell crab, bacon, and spinach) and entrée (quinoa risotto) without dessert or

alcohol, but the food was high-quality and interesting.

For those who don't want to order dinner before the music starts, there's a less expensive late-night menu that serves fried foods and sandwiches. For Blues Mondays, Republic is offering a special that consists of a burger, fries, bourbon, and beer for \$15, Rytkonen said.
