The DC Blues Society rings in the New Year with Severn Records' newest recording artist, Ursula Ricks. On Wednesday, Dec. 31 from 7:00 pm–12:30 am, the "Queen of Baltimore Blues" will provide the groove to dance into 2015 at American Legion Post 268, 11225 Fern St., Wheaton MD, 20902.

The Dinner Dance Party includes a traditional southern-style dinner, party favors, midnight champagne toast and a very reasonable cash bar. Seating is limited and tickets are hot! Ursula Ricks: Bringing Out the Sensual Side

DCBS President Felix McClairen interviewed Ursula Ricks for the **CBM** and as a lead up to her star performance at the DCBS New Year's Eve Dinner Dance Party at the Wheaton American Legion. Ursula is a Baltimore-based artist who recently released her first CD, **My Street**, on the Severn Records label. The Ursula Ricks Project revs up the funk in Blues with an intensity that will make you wanna holler—and dance, of course. Tickets and more info at **www.dcblues.org.**

CBM: It's been written that you grew up on the music and stories from your grandmother. What kind of music and stories?

Ricks: When my grandmother was young, she sang opera. She was good enough to audition for and be accepted by a New York opera house and get the opportunity to study under masters. But at 14 years old she was forced into marriage by her parents. My grandmother loved classical music, Hollywood and Broadway music. Grandma would sing along and talk about the music. For instance, she talked about Rodgers & Hammerstein's music and was particularly fond of Hammerstein, for


RIP DC Blues Society Band, Bless Full Power Blues

Society Band and left it as Full Power Blues—a public rechristening.

Damn! That beats set and costume changes hands down.

The band remains the same but they're roaring onto the

writing about the mistreatment of others and the many "isms," including racism, sexism and classism.

CBM: What effect did it have on you growing up under the musical influence of your grandmother?

Ricks: Musicals go to the imagination. When I was very young I sang everywhere I went. I would make up songs---whimsical songs. I learned from my grandmother elegance and dignity.

My elegance comes through my delivery--the theatrical part of singing. [That delivery helps] open our minds. It's the ability to express oneself in other than words---like in Broadway musicals.

CBM: What cultivated your interest in the Blues?

Ricks: My mother exposed me to the Blues. She listened to Bessie Smith, Billie Holliday, Ma Rainey and John Lee Hooker, for example. The Blues helped me get in touch with my sexuality. It brought out the sensual side of me in a bigger way. [It excited me, for instance] to hear her break out in a heartfelt rendition

of Big Fat Woman---with meat shaking on her bones. It showed how the expression of Blues songs is very powerful.

CBM: What kind of music did you do starting out?

Ricks: I formed an all-girl band, called Arjuhei. The name was formed from the members' names. I was around 23 years old when the band started getting popular. We were compared to Wilson Phillips [A charttopping 90's vocal group]. But we soon had band issues and broke up.

CBM: So, how did that experience lead you to the Blues?

Ricks: My band was playing the Full Moon Saloon [in Baltimore's Fells Point] when White Lightnin' Hopkins asked if I did the Blues. I wrote it off until a week later, the band folded. I contacted Hopkins, who asked me to learn some Doobie Brothers tunes. He said pick some bluesy ones. I fell in love with the Blues. I knew a little from my mom. But performing the Blues brought out my personality, improved my self-esteem, confidence. The more I sang, the better I felt. I said: "I was born to do this!"

CBM: Now that you've been performing Blues for a while, where are you trying to take it?

Ricks: I'm trying to figure out what is modern Blues. What to talk about? The ability to communicate certain things you can only say with the Blues: keeping it real, honesty, sincerity.

CBM: Who are some of your vocal idols?

Ricks: I don't have any. I sing the way I do because of pain in childhood, adolescence and as a young adult. I sing because of the mother I had. She was the most brilliant person in the world. My mom sang only to me and my sister—in the house. I learned then that Blues conveys good, bad and angry feelings.

CBM: Speaking of communicating, what have you got to say?

Ricks: I have a lot to say about living in this society...what surrounds me, inside me... feeding one of the two wolves inside. I have light/kind and angry/dark (the two wolves) the one I feed lives; acknowledge the dark, feed the light.

I sing about what moves me. It took a long time for me to become radical about the Blues. It's America's original music. Blues helps me help someone else. I want to make the Blues more relevant than it is without taking anything away.

CBM: What's your favorite cut on the newly released CD, *My Street?* Why?

Ricks: "Right Now," because I spent so much time pondering the past. It's about practicing understanding and dealing with the right now.

CBM: You wrote most of the tunes on *My* **Street.** What's coming up with you and the Project? And future gigs?

Ricks: I'm reassessing what to do with my time and music. I'm thinking about becoming a booking agent to help talented acts get work. I'll keep writing songs and looking at collaborations. I want to be part of re-creating the Chitlin Circuit.

CBM: I call it the neo-Chitlin Circuit. We look forward to you funking up the house with that chitlin flavor on NYE. Thanks for your time!


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


