President's DRUM

The Moss/ Morris Show

If you weren't in the house on April 18 for the Nick Moss

and Reggie Wayne Morris show, you missed a rocking, funky good time. Reggie, a Baltimorebased international artist, heated up the stage with a white-hot set, grooving between a Jimi Hendrix guitar ferocity and a down-home funky brand of Blues.

Nick demonstrated his versatility over the range of Blues and further cemented his reputation as a passionate and virtuoso guitarist. Some of the more soulful tunes were led by guitarist and vocalist Michael Ledbetter. Michael brought down the house with his alternately crooning and screaming, to the delighted howls of a mesmerized audience.

As I often say, DCBS puts on some of the best shows too many folks miss. I heard many positive comments and raves from attendees new to Moss and Morris, and the photos on page 1 tell the tale, too. You, too, could be pleasantly surprised. Get outside your comfort zone and check out an act you've never seen or heard of before. Stars didn't start out with world-wide name recognition. The accumulation of new fans make it so.

Mother's Day Blues

Mother's Day is Sunday, May 10. I mention it because mothers are one

thing we all have in common. And in honor of Mother's Day, DCBS is sponsoring a Blues in the Community (BITC) event on May 8 at the



Charles Houston Recreation Center's senior program. The senior program is featuring a pre-Mother's Day event, entitled "Crowns. . . A Hat Affair and Luncheon." Singer, guitarist, folklorist and educator, Ayaba Bey, former lead singer of the now defunct DCBS Band, will present a lunchtime session that fuses gospel and Blues. Ayaba is sure to entertain with her deep repertoire of both music genres, her prodigious vocal and guitar talents, and her gift for storytelling. This BITC presentation is paid for by DCBS as all such events and provided free to the Charles Houston Recreation Center seniors. The Recreation Center is located at 901 Wythe St., Alexandria, VA.

No one (mostly no one) wants mothers to have the blues, but the lexicon Blues does acknowledge mothers. There's much talk in the Blues about mothers and mamas, but they're not always talking about their birth mothers or things that you would do with them.

However, mothers in the Blues are often called upon for advice and consolation. For instance, Ruth Brown tells her mom: "Mama He Treats Your Daughter Mean." Jerry Butler in "Only

> The Strong Survive" gets his mother's advice about a woman leaving him. She tells him, don't go around with your head hanging down. Etta James urges (a man I suppose) to "Tell Mama." While her meaning may not be particularly motherly, the fact that the song was written by Clarence Carter makes it eligible as a tribute to mothers as he wrote: "Tell me what you need, what you want, tell Mama. And I'll make everything alright."

Sometimes a mother's advice is ignored with bad consequences. In "Take Time To Know Her," the late Percy Sledge took his

girl home to Mama, who cautioned him to "take time to know her. It's not an overnight thing. Don't rush into this thing." But he didn't listen

to Mama, and came home early one night to find her kissing on another man. [Percy became an ancestor April 14.]

I'll also mention Paul Simon's "Loves Me Like A Rock" as a paean to



mothers because he had help from the famous gospel-folk Dixie Hummingbirds.

Finally, in a skeptical take on mothers, B.B. King sings "Nobody Loves Me But My Mother and she could be jiving me, too."

Farewell to Yummy Tyler

WPFW Volunteer, Music Enthusiast, Lover of Life + Person Extraordinaire!

RIP Alwilta Yummy Tyler (Dec. 23, 1956–March 31, 2015)

On April 8, at Westminster Presbyterian Church, a Blues band played and more than 250 people shared stories and reflected on the joy that was Yummy. The following includes portions of the eulogy given by Rev. Ruth Hamilton and from the program written by her family. We are grateful to them for sharing her story.

Yummy was born and lived most of her life in DC except for a few childhood years spent in Hartford, CT. It was evident at an early age that she "... was a natural teacher and loved to explain things. She was seven when her youngest sister, Tina, was born and Yummy secretly took a book to school to show the other children how babies were made. It didn't go over that well with the nuns... She would bring home anything that breathed. They had two dogs, birds, turtles, groundhogs—the

basement was (her) little zoo." With her mother (for whom she was named) working and going to college, Yummy, at age nine, took charge of the household and her three siblings.

A natural athlete, she enjoyed gymnastics, tennis, dancing, rock climbing and whitewater rafting. She was an MP in the US Army and when her plan to join DC's Metropolitan Police Department derailed due to a vision problem, she became "...a fitness instructor and all around celebrant of the human body. For the next 30 years, she lived life on her terms. With forays into Santa Barbara, West Hollywood and Jamaica, from cheerleading (NBA & USFL), to beauty pageants and modeling, to cable TV and radio...." Her own terms also included making "Yummy" her official name.

Her career as a fitness/aerobics instructor and program director spanned more than three decades. A certified member of the American Fitness and Aerobics Association, Yummy designed programs for USDA, SEC, the Washington Seniors Wellness Center and other recreational centers. She was also a motivational speaker on breast cancer and chronic disease management. Her commitment to community projects was acknowledged with numerous awards, trophies and certificates. A volunteer during WPFW's pledge drives, Yummy eventually joined the other Gatorettes as a studio assistant to Da Gator and Texas Fred, The Zydeco Cowboy. She accompanied Fred and dozens of cowboys and cowgirls on trail rides, attended zydeco dance parties and rode in several Cherry Blossom parades.


Many of us met Yummy through the Friday Night Jazz program held at Westminster Presbyterian Church. When Rev. Brian Hamilton began Blue Monday Blues, she was there, too, at the register in the church hall, ringing up the dinner sales, making friends and, when

possible, dancing.

Yummy's first diagnosis of breast cancer came several years ago and she was in remission when the jazz program began. A second diagnosis, about six years ago, was followed with one for bone cancer. Many of her friends and co-workers were unaware of either until she was forced to curtail her physical activities and leave a job that she loved. No matter how exhausted she was from her medical treatments, Yummy never ceased to lend emotional support to her family and an everwidening circle of friends. If she couldn't do it in person or by phone, she texted messages of encouragement whenever possible.

In a recorded interview, Yummy said, "I'm a simple person. The only thing I require a lot of is fun. I know not everything is fun—but if I can make it fun, I will." She reveled in the joys of life and eagerly embraced new experiences. She seldom discussed her illness, preferring instead to celebrate each day as a gift. In the words of Rev. Ruth Hamilton, "She never belonged fully to any of us though she cherished something of each of us. She was as free a dancing spirit as there ever was. She only and always belonged to God. But how wonderful, how grateful we are to have danced some of this amazing journey with her."




