DC Mudd Escapes DC Snow, Makes it to Memphis for IBC

Whether it was hiking out of unplowed neighborhoods, bouncing between airports or driving 12+ hours, DC Mudd summoned up its collective mojo to overcome "Snowzilla" and reach Memphis.

It was the experience of a lifetime to represent the DC Blues Society at the International Blues Challenge on Beale Street. This was about far more than the rush of performing in such a storied location, in venues packed with fellow musicians and hardcore blues fans. This was about a pilgrimage to American music's holy land—a region with a long and painful history.

We were one of 255 acts from around the world. We played two nights and didn't advance, but were happy with our performances and represented DCBS well. We got to hear terrific bands and fantastic music. The level and breadth of the talent was astonishing and humbling.

It was wonderful to see how folks worldwide are carrying the torch and moving our music forward. Among the best bands we saw were a hot blues combo from the Philippines and a rockin' soul group from the Netherlands.

It was almost as fun listening as it was playing.

Nah, not really—it was a lot more fun playing—to a full house including family and friends. The sound system was great, the Blues Foundation organizers did a terrific job running this huge event, other musicians were encouraging and supportive, and the people in Memphis and the surrounding area were as friendly as could be.

We all explored the city and its unique heritage: Sun Studios, where magic was created; Stax Records with Albert King's purple "Flying V"; the new Blues Hall of Fame museum—c'mon, Otis Spann's piano! And the extraordinary National Civil Rights

DCBS Ticket Giveaways: March Blues Nights at The Hamilton Live



Blues Hall of Fame Class of 2016

The Blues Foundations has annouced that five legendary blues performers, two individuals who were instrumental in the creation of blues music, five single blues recordings, one blues album and an important piece of blues literature will be inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame on May 4 in Memphis.

Elvin Bishop, Eddy Clearwater, Jimmy Johnson, John Mayall, and The Memphis Jug Band will each take their places beside performers who have been deemed to be the Best in the Blues. Each has carved his place in blues history.

Bishop's beginnings with the Paul Butterfield Blues Band to his more recent recognition for the 2015 Blues Music Awards "Song of the Year" have elevated him to the highest stature in blues music.

Clearwater, Johnson, and Mayall each boast careers that have spanned more than a half century, they each continue to produce music and to perform for devoted audiences.

The Memphis Jug Band's music crossed the racial divides of the early 20th-century and inspired many to follow in their footsteps.

Non-performer individuals to be recognized for their behind-the-scenes contributions are Malaco Records partners Tommy Couch, Sr. and Wolf Stephenson, whose label's first big hit was Dorothy Moore's "Misty Blue" in 1976, and who produced such blues greats as Bobby Bland, Little Milton, Z.Z. Hill, Denise LaSalle, Latimore, Johnnie Taylor and Tyrone Davis. Malaco remains an active player in the music world today.

The book Early Downhome Blues: A Musical and Cultural Analysis, by Jeff Todd Titon is this year's literature entry. It is one of the most important analytical studies of the blues published.

The classic album *Blues in the Mississippi Night* (Nixa, 1957: United Artists, 1959) is being honored as are the singles, "Crazy Blues" by Mamie Smith (OKeh, 1920), "That's All Right" by Jimmy Rogers (Chess, 1950), Billy Boy Arnold's "I Wish You Would" (Vee-Jay, 1955), Johnny Moore's Three Blazers' (Charles Brown, vocal and piano) "Merry Christmas Baby" (Exclusive, 1947), the first Yuletide song inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame, and "Blues Before Sunrise" by Leroy Carr and Scrapper Blackwell (Vocalion, 1934).

Museum which tells the story that underlies all of the music we love.

Road trip highlights for Howard Moss were the marker near Big Walter Horton's birthplace in Horn Lake, Mississippi and a visit to Helena/West Helena. Arkansas, still home to the King Biscuit Time radio show which put Sonny Boy Williamson II ("Rice" Miller) on the map. It airs from The Delta Cultural Center, which contains treasures like Sonny Boy's harmonica case.

No Graceland tours this trip, but David Jackson found the building where a young Elvis lived with his parents in a thirdfloor walk-up.

David Oziel found fried chicken and biscuits with gravy. And the next time you see Phil Schaeffer, he may be sporting a shirt from

the same folks who outfitted the top blues and soul stars and, oh yeah, Elvis.

Adam Oppenheim and his wife drove to the Arkansas Delta village of Dyess, where Johnny Cash's boyhood home has been lovingly restored. In nearby Tyronza, they discovered the fascinating Southern Tenant Farmers Museum. On the Mississippi Blues trail, they followed Highway 61 to Clarksdale—site of the Delta Blues Museum, the infamous Crossroads and the Riverside Hotel where Bessie Smith died. They also stopped at Stovall Farm, home of Muddy Waters, and Friars Point, home of Robert Nighthawk

For Adam, the highlight was the time spent in the presence of The Rev. Al Green, at the Full Gospel

Tabernacle Church in Memphis:

"Words cannot describe the power and emotion of the music and singing in that room. Nothing else mattered. Hammond-B-3, drums, bass, guitar, piano, full choir, and Rev. Al Green. My spine tingles at the memories. If we did nothing else in Memphis, this would make it all worth the trip."

And from the sacred to the slightly profane: On Howard's way home, the 1953 Sun tune "Baker Shop Boogie"—Willie Nix with James Cotton—was playing over the airport PA.

Where else are you gonna hear something like that?

Jammaster Sam'i Nuriddin made sure that the music kept going all evening, even though



The Chicago Way

Toronzo Cannon

After his two superior albums on Delmark, many were pleased to learn about Alligator Records signing Toronzo Cannon and now we have his label debut *The Chicago Way*. Those who enjoyed his prior releases will not be disappointed with this, and it is likely to raise his profile, not simply in the blues world.

Cannon wrote all 11 songs on The Chicago Way and is backed by his band The Cannonball Express. The band consists of Brother John Kattke.



Kattke,
Hammond B-3 Organ, Piano and
Keyboards; Pete Galanis, Electric and
Acoustic Rhythm Guitar; Larry Williams,
Bass; and Melvin "Pookie Stix" Carlisle,
Drums. Kattke also arranged the threepiece horn section on a few selections.

This is hard-hitting music that might superficially be compared to Son Seals. Certainly Cannon's searing buzz-kill guitar bears a similar intensity to what the late Seals brought to his music. And like Seals, Cannon is all business. His music though is a bit more urban and soul-rooted than Son.

Like Son Seals' music, Cannon's music reflects his own life and experiences from growing up in the shadows of the Chicago projects to working as a bus driver and listening and observing the city life around him.

The tightly performed and hard-hitting playing on *The Chicago Way* provides a

frame for his telling social commentary like the opening, "The Pain Around Me." Starting off in a funky manner, it



has a lyric about six kids on the corner, six broken homes, and Toronzo not wanting his kids to go outside because of the


thugs hanging around. Furthermore, he doesn't want to sing this, but this is what he, in fact, sees. There is plenty of fire in his playing and vocal with his band tightly backing him.

In contrast to the serious opening track, one hears plenty of humor in his lyric about a marriage gone bad on a funky shuffle, "Bad Contract." This bad contract is the one where

you sign on the line and only get half back when its over. The driving shuffle "Fine Seasoned Women," has Toronzo fending off a flirting lady who is trying so hard to catch his eye. Cannon, however, prefers a lady with a touch of gray or wrinkles, who wants a man, not a fool. There is nice use of horns on this along with his crisply played guitar.

The humorous "Midlife Crisis" is another number that speaks to those of us who have put more than a few years (and it has a great line about hair on the chest turning gray). Perhaps this writer's favorite track is a wonderful slow blues, "When Will You Tell Him About Me?" with Toronzo complaining about being tired of the secrecy with which he and his woman must keep their affair.

As a songwriter, as well as a singer-guitarist, Toronzo Cannon brings grit and passion. His playing is varied ranging from blues-rock to jazzy flavored, while his singing is robust resulting in the mostly compelling performances here. *The Chicago Way* is one of the most striking recent new blues releases.

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
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
