Good Luck to DCBS Reps at International Blues Challenge

The 32nd International Blues Challenge (IBC) is set for Jan. 26–30, at numerous venues in the Beale Street Historic District of Memphis, TN. It is five days filled with music and music competitions involving (at last count) 120 bands and 94 solo/duo acts, plus 41 Youth Showcase entries. The largest increase from last year's entry is in the Youth Showcase, which jumped from 31 entries in 2015 to 41 this year—a good sign that more youth are getting involved in the Blues?

This year's IBC begins Tuesday, Jan. 26 with the International Showcase. Quarter Finals are Wednesday and Thursday, Jan. 27–28. The Youth Showcase and Semi Finals are Friday, Jan. 29, and on Saturday, Jan 30, the IBC concludes with the Finals in the Orpheum Theater.

Venue Updates: Zoo Bar Closes, new Villain & Saint Offers Blues

Yes, music venues sometimes come and go, but it's especially sad when a very long-standing venue closes its doors. On Dec. 5, Big Boy Little, harmonica player, Thursday night blues jam host and long-time performer at the Zoo Bar 3000 Connecticut Ave., NW, DC, announced on his Facebook page:

"Zoo Bar News: The bar is in the process of being sold and is in a legal limbo right now, therefore it is closed until further notice. This includes tonight, so the Big Boy Little Band will not be playing.

"If and when it reopens, I will post something right away. But at this time, I think it is safe to say that until you hear anything else, the bar is closed. Those of you who have standing gigs, or have been booked in January. please get in touch with me either here or by email

DRINK, DINE & MUSIC

The Zoo Bar's owner Steve McKinney passed away from cancer on Aug. 4, and it was hoped that his daughter would be able to keep this long-standing DC blues bar open. Stay tuned for more information if and when it becomes available.

On an up-note, in 2015, several new or existing venues did begin booking blues acts. One such new venue that opened in 2015 was Bethesda's Villain & Saint restaurant, at 7141 Wisconsin Ave., Bethesda, MD. Their website describes the venue as follows:

"On the surface, Villain & Saint—a Haight-Ashbury-inspired rock 'n' roll music hall

in downtown Bethesda, Maryland—might represent the polar-opposite vision of veteran DC chef Robert Wiedmaier's flagship Marcel's, the ultimate in fine-dining refinement, yet there is so much more than meets the eye and palate with Robert. Over the years, many have become aware of Robert's enthusiasm for motorcycles; but his true identity is exposed here at V&S as he pays homage to the freewheeling lifestyle of the rock 'n' roll era, with a preferred repertoire ranging from Blues and Jazz, to Indie Rock, Sixties and Heavy Metal... As the name suggests, Villain & Saint is a cultural gathering spot that accommodates rockers of all stripes: young and old, with a taste for the conventional or radical, looking for frivolity or hard-core. V&S is destined to become an essential depot in the rock 'n' roll circuit for aspiring artists, a coveted outlet for up-and-coming rock stars previewed by Robert with his booking agent, Phil Kominski, before hitting the center stage. It will play host to some of the best-known house bands performing regular gigs in the Washington, DC tri-state area..."

Blues Society.



The Blue Ridge Blues Society entry in the Band category is In Layman Terms, which includes Logan and Cole Layman and their mother, Sandy, plus harp player Carson Diersing. If

you've been attending DCBS events for the past several years and/or reading the newsletter, than you may recall that In Layman Terms first performed at a DCBS event at the 2012 Fish Fry, when Logan and Cole were 11 and 14 years old, respectively. They were also members of the band UnXpected, which represented DCBS in the Youth Showcase at the 2013 IBC. Since then Logan and Cole have returned to the IBC each year to perform, but this is the first year they will compete in the Band category.

Former UnXpected band member Zack Salsberry, is also returning to the IBC, as the Youth Showcase entrant for the Natchel Blues Network, Norfolk, VA.

Not Goin' Away

Bey Paule Band

This band is fronted by vocalist Frank Bey and guitarist Anthony Paule and includes keyboards, bass, drums and three horns, which makes for a beefy sound.

Bey has been around for a long time without getting the recognition he deserves. He began

singing in a family gospel group at the age of four in the early 1950's. Like so many others, he switched to the secular side and opened for Otis Redding at the age of 17, where he learned how to stir up a crowd. After a long absence, he returned to the music industry in 1996, releasing several albums.

Possessed of a deep and soulful voice without



the histrionics of too many, he joined veteran guitarist Anthony Paule in 2011, working out of the Bay area. A previous album, *Soul for Your Blues* was nominated for two Blues Music Awards and made a number of critics' lists in 2013.

The album contains all originals by band members and associates, with many flourishes of classic soul in the themes and arrangements. It opens with "Black Bottom," tracing Bey's origins in rural Georgia and what he learned there. It continues with "Kiss Me Like You Mean It," an uptempo number described as "about the fizzle in the sizzle."

"Right in Front of You" forcefully describes his love for someone who only thinks of him as a friend and features a strong solo from the guitarist. "Next to My Heart" is a slow soulful ballad that tries to bridge the gap that has driven him apart from something he has done to his woman.

"Someone You Use" revisits the theme of being someone who can be turned to in times of trouble without a return of affection. "This Party's Done" was inspired by a friend who was told by the doctor that his hard-partying days were going to kill, but returned to finish it out. "Nobody's Angel" is the story of a young woman trying to fill her needs but ending in places where it is better not to be.

The title track is a forceful number described as, "The guy is fickle. First he is gone for good and never coming back! Then, wouldn't you know it! He's coming back for more."
"Ballad of the Lover Man" describes his fall, "In darkness he stands." "Noel's Haze" is an instrumental paying tribute to Booker T & the MGs." In "Don't Ask Me How I Feel," Bey warns that he'll give an answer detailing his misery and is highlighted by a concise guitar solo. "If I Could Reach Out" and help somebody, then it would be a good day.

This is a very solid entry from an excellent band that pays tribute to classic soul and blues. The album shows a variety of themes, arrangements, moods and tempos. They deserve far wider recognition.

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As One Headline* Put It, "Blind Pig Records Entrusts Legacy to The Orchard"

In March 2015, BILLBOARD reported that The Orchard had acquired the master recording catalog of independent American blues and roots music label Blind Pig Records. The deal included five new albums (for Zac Harmon, Albert Cummings, Cash Box Kings, Victor Wainwright, and Andy T & Nick Nixon) which The Orchard planned to release in 2015 in conjunction with Blind Pig.

In December 2015, the following message was released from Edward Chmelewski and Jerry Del Giudice, Co-Founders of Blind Pig Records:

"Blind Pig Records got its start in a very small basement blues club called the Blind Pig Café in Ann Arbor, Michigan in 1977 and grew to become, as BILLBOARD magazine put it, 'one of the pre-eminent specialty labels in the world.'

"Now, after a very great, rewarding, and

challenging 38-year run, we are closing down the San Francisco and Chicago offices and turning the keys to the Pig Pen over to The Orchard, a fine, forward-looking organization that will care for the legacy of the label.

"It's been a great privilege to work with so many

uncommonly gifted artists and to document their music. We're proud to have produced recordings from traditional blues masters such as Big Walter Horton, Hubert Sumlin, Johnny Shines, Roosevelt Sykes, Otis Rush and, of course, the inimitable Magic Slim, who represents better than anyone the very DNA of the label and why we started it. And we're proud to have preserved recordings from blues legends such as James Cotton, Muddy Waters and Charlie Musselwhite.

"It was also very gratifying to have introduced

a new generation of blues stars to the world stage—talents like Tommy Castro, Big Bill Morganfield, John Németh, Damon Fowler and Victor Wainwright. And, we were pleased to have the opportunity to work with music notables such as Bill Wyman, Ray Manzarek, Jeremy Spencer and Commander Cody.

It's been a great adventure, producing and preserving music that people get excited about. Just as nearly four decades ago we were changed by the music, we'd like to imagine that 38 years from now there will be a moment when a young person listens to one of our recordings and it will change his or her life.

To all our friends, allies and compatriots in the media and music biz who offered us support and encouragement for our endeavors, we, and the artists, thank you."
