Honoring Dr. S.O. Feelgood (Chester "Chet" Hines)

February 24, 1946-May 24, 2016

On Tuesday, May 24, the DC area Blues community lost a local Blues icon and a loyal volunteer and supporter of the DC Blues Society. Chet Hines (aka Dr. S.O. Dr. S.O. Feelgood: The Doctor is In

It is Sunday afternoon at the American Legion Post in Silver Spring and a jam hosted by the D.C. Blues Society is in full swing. Among the musicians that come and go, a steady presence holds sway on the drums.

Studied and serious, Chet Hines holds down the bottom through a number of well-known blues standards. But he later shows us another side of

himself when he takes the mike and—behind a slow blues crawl from the band—slides into "I'll Drink Your Bathwater, Baby" a boisterous romp of a song about the virtues of drinking your woman's bathwater. A burly man, it is personality rather than size that allows him to take control of the stage and the house. Men guffaw and ladies squeal as he uses a barrage of slurping noises to emphasize his point that drinking a woman's bathwater is the only way a real man can show his love.

Better known as Dr. S.O. Feelgood, Chet Hines is a one-man entertainment package. A drummer since the age of 12, Hines is now lead singer for the Dr. S.O. Feelgood Band and Show, a Washington-area based group that plays an average of 140-150 gigs a year in the East and Midwest.

"Well, the Doctor I believe is out of the Mississippi Delta and he's got a lot of those roots in his singing and in his feeling, and it is what he brings to the table," says guitarist Bill Bates, who plays in Hines' band along with bassist Kenny Johnson and drummer Mike Elam. "And what we try to do is back him up to the best of our ability. We're always keeping an eye on what he's doing."

But Hines can also serve as a deejay and master of ceremonies, roles he frequently adopts for the DC Blues Society. In October the DC Blues Society tapped him to host the "Battle of the Bands," an annual event held to determine which group will represent the DC area at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis next February.

The Pascagoula, Mississippi born Hines admits his love for the blues but adds that his tastes are "all over the map." With more than 10,000 CD's and 7,000 albums covering every genre of music, his record collection reflects that statement. "I'm still one of those people with eight tracks and cassettes and reel-to-reel because I listen to where my mood is," he said. Still, he has a special love for the singers of the 1960's and 1970's. "Simply put, they were characters musically in and of themselves," he says. "Unlike—and I'm not indicting every musician today—but many musicians today are cookie cutter musicians. An artist comes out today with a hit song, and immediately the record companies feel like their artists have to do that same thing, follow that same track. And I understand the economics of why they do it, but it doesn't add anything to developing and creating an artist. Whereas those people like Otis Redding, like a Joe Tex, Solomon Burke (who died in October 2010 at the age of 70), Teddy Pendergrass, these people had musical signatures in terms of their sound, their personality."

He uses some original material, such as "Jump Down, Turn Around, Kick a Hole in the Wall," a lively crowd pleaser which recently drew audience participation when he performed it during Blue Monday, a blues show held weekly at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Southwest Washington. "I tell people you may not know it, but you're not going to come and see me and sit around and watch me, okay?" he says. "You're going to get involved in what I do."

"Bathwater Blues" is not a Dr. S.O. Feelgood original, he says. "Some people come back to me, you know, and say 'Oh, I bought a copy of that, but it didn't sound anything like what you did.' I say 'well, that's because, you know, I've rearranged it and done some things with it that made it my own."

Hines doesn't use a set list when he performs. "Literally ninety per cent of the time, I don't know

Elegy for Dr. S.O. Feelgood (Chester Hines)

I gladly knew Dr. S.O. Feelgood (Chet) for over 15 years. From my first sighting at the defunct Taliano's in Takoma Park, I knew Dr. Feelgood was a force with whom to reckon. The ensuing years proved the acuity of my first impression. I saw him that first time, big and inscrutable towering over the drum kit. He was as casual as taking a Sunday morning walk, beating out frantic and tranquil rhythms alike with the same composure. Chet had done it a thousand times. The beats were a part of him, the soul of him.

Like the eternal rhythms of Mother Earth, Dr. S. O. Feelgood's rhythms will throb within us forever.

While we may miss his fleshly presence, I hope we'll remember songs that only he could sing with the authority of a Howlin' Wolf. Signature tunes like "Big Fat Woman" and "Making Love to the Garbage Man" rang with soulful exhortation. His voice was marinated in the sweet force of skyreaching Mississippi magnolias. Chet enraptured audiences and made them laugh uproariously.



Dr. Feelgood was part of the nucleus of a group that would become, after incorporation, the DC Blues Society. He continued to support the 30-year old DCBS nearly up to his final drum lick, so to speak.

He was the Blues-in-the-Schools (BITS) program, reaching out to schools in the challenged parts of

Washington, DC and bringing to the classroom his own historical perspective on the culture of Blues and lively performances by himself and other prominent artists in the DMV. Since his

declining health stalled his BITS efforts. we haven't found a replacement. Of course, such a force defies replacement. Even with health



challenges, he continued to perform, deejay and run sound at the DCBS 1st Sunday Jams. He also coordinated and emceed the side stage at the Annual DC Blues Festival for 20 years.

There were few things asked of Dr. S.O. Feelgood that he didn't deliver. I relied on him so intensely, that his was the only DCBS related phone number I've ever memorized. When DCBS edited a cookbook, Dr. S.O. Feelgood contributed Hush-Yo-Mouth Ribs with Junkyard Dog Sauce. Check it out.

Chet was honored by DCBS a couple of years ago for his unstinting and perpetual service to the organization. His hometown of Pascagoula, MS lost a big man back in the day. We gained a creative giant in all aspects of Blues and Soul music, its performance and the perpetuation of the Blues tradition.

Please come to our 1st Sunday Jam on June 5 and help us honor and remember Dr. S.O. Feelgood.



what I'm going to do until the moment that I'm doing it," he says. Johnson and Elam figure out what song is coming next by listening to Hines. "And we pick the wrong one," laughs Johnson. "Most of the time, I can hear the dialogue, and I say 'okay, this is what we're going to do.' And usually I can pick it up through the dialogue." When they do get it wrong, "he'll cut it, and we'll start all over again," Elam adds.



After leaving Mississippi at the age of ten, Hines finally came to Washington in 1959 after stints in Greenville, North Carolina and Richmond, Virginia. At 14 he bought his first drum set, a Kelly Green four-piece,

from "Quick Cash Kelly's," a pawn shop near the Navy Yard in Southeast Washington.

He began playing professionally at 18. "Up and down 14th Street, H Street, Kennedy Street, I mean young guys could go and ply their trade and learn," he recalls. "And that was a significant learning ground, unlike the jam situations of today. I went in as somebody who thought they were a young hot shot, knowing what they were doing and the reality was I didn't know squat. And they were very quick to let you know that you didn't know squat. But they were just as quick to train you."

A bass player named Fat Fanny who was well-known around the D.C. area paid him particular attention. "Fanny was a kind of kick-butt, take-no-prisoners type of person," Hines recalls. "But when you sit down behind a drum kit with him, in a few minutes he knew whether you had any chops at all and he could run you through crapola that you'd never heard of, and demand that you find a way to keep up, find a way

to lock into the groove. As soon as you'd lock into the groove, he would change the groove, send you someplace else, and ask you 'what's your problem?'"

Hines went on playing the local D.C. club scene: the Blue Angel on 14th Street,

the Coco Lounge on H Street. He joined bands with names like Eddie King and his Court and the Royal Tones.

He adopted the "Dr. S.O. Feelgood" persona about 20 years ago. There were other "Dr. Feelgoods" on the scene at the time, and Hines took a couple of extra steps—or, more accurately, added a couple of letters—to make his stage name stand out.

"The S-period, O-period is what separates me, as far as identity is concerned, from the rest," he explains. "And the 'S' does have its significance. But as I often

say, when people ask me what does the "S" and the "O" stand for, I only tell women and woman want-to-be's," he adds with a laugh. "So, in this particular case, it remains anonymous." Once he adopted his stage name, he initially stayed on the drums, but eventually picked up a mike after club owners told him "we would much prefer to have you out front than sitting back there behind a kit."

In addition to performing and hosting events, Hines coordinates the DCBS Blues in the Schools, a program designed to foster appreciation of blues

among young people. As coordinator, Hines visits area schools, often accompanied by musicians, some of them nationally known.

But, to Dr. S.O. Feelgood, the stage brings a special passion. "I want to live out the life of Elmore James," Hines says. "Elmore James declared that, when he died, he wanted to die on stage. He thought that was the ultimate way to go. Just coincidently, he died on stage. Had a heart attack. But, hey, listen, what better way to go?"

The Hotter Than-July Fish Fry & Show Is Almost Here!

Join other blues fans at the DC Blues Society 12th Annual Hotter Than July Fish Fry & Blues Show on Saturday, July 9. This is a popular DCBS annual event, held at the American Legion Post 41, 905 Sligo Avenue, Silver Spring, MD 20910. Save the date now and plan to burn up the dance floor, bask in the sunny courtyard of the Legion, or even volunteer



for a shift to help make the event a success. Area Blues artists play from 4pm to 11p.m. Food will be served from approximately 4:30 to 9pm. Entrance to the American Legion is on Fenton Street near the public parking lot (free parking all day Saturday).

Currently, seven bands have volunteered to play—see the list and band bios below. The \$20 admission gives you up to seven hours of music, a fish sandwich and one side dish. There is a cash bar and other food will be available for purchase, so bring your appetite and some extra cash.

DCBS needs volunteers to help at the event. Please contact Margo Hope at **volunteer@DCBlues.org** if you are available to volunteer for a time shift or to bring a dish (e.g., sides, dessert, casserole, etc.). The bands that will be performing and thus, also volunteering their time and talents, are listed below in alphabetical order.

Cadillac Jump Blues Band

The Cadillac Jump Blues Band is a relatively new Baltimore-based band, but members of the band have been playing together in other bands for decades. Matt Coffman on guitar, vocals, Curt Lawrence on bass and vocals and Dale Mauck on drums and vocals first played together in Totally Confused (a large band with a horn section, which sometimes featured Blues Brother Dan Aykroyd) and later in The Jumpin' Hailstones. Steve Levine on harp and vocals played with Matt in a couple of different projects (including one with the current band's rhythm section) from 2002-2003. The four members reunited in 2012 to occasionally play some private events. In 2015, they decided it was time to get out and start playing more. Their first bar gig was at Szechuan Inn in Severna Park, where a raucous audience filled the dance floor. The band now has a semi-regular gig there, and they are branching out to other venues, including Baltimore's infamous Holiday House. Cadillac Jump plays a variety of Blues styles, from the down home and raw Blues

of postwar Chicago, to lively, up-tempo Swing and Jump Blues. They even have a few bluesy Rock tunes in their repertoire. If you like to dance, or just dig the Blues, The Cadillac Jump Blues band will satisfy!

Cooking With Gas

Cooking With Gas (CWG) serves fine music featuring generous portions of blues seasoned with jazz, swing, gospel and folk. They play fingersnapping, head-bopping, toe-tapping tunes that are sure to bring a smile to your heart. CWG has played at local Metro DC restaurants and pubs, etc. such as El Golfo in Silver Spring, The Potomac Grill and Branded 72 in Rockville, Clyde's of Chevy Chase, The New Deal Cafe in Greenbelt, Roofers Union in Adams Morgan, as well as recent Silver Spring Blues Festivals, Takoma Park Street Festivals, Folklore Society of Greater Washington's Midwinter Mini Fest, and the 2013 National Cherry Blossom Festival. CWG is also the house band at the Hell's Bottom Open Mic Blues Jam every Tuesday night in Takoma Park, MD. Formed in spring 2011, CWG includes David "Takoma Dave" Rothman on vocals and blues harp, Roy Brooks on guitar, Jim "Cookie" Cooke on bass and Mike Custer on drums. Come hear them. Fast Eddie & The Slowpokes

Fast Eddie & The Slowpokes are guaranteed to get you up on your feet! The Slowpokes' playlist is inspired by classic blues material from Chicago to West Coast Swing, Motown to Muscle Shoals, and all the rock n' roll in between. Fast Eddie & The Slowpokes have performed throughout the DMV, from Senate Caucus rooms to festivals to roadhouses. They have shared the stage with Victor Wainwright (2016 BMA Entertainer of the Year) and The Nighthawks. They won the 2012 DC Blues Society Battle of the Bands and represented the DC Blues Society at the 2013 International Blues Challenge in Memphis! The Slowpokes bring varied musical histories to the stage. Ed Crowley on harp and vocals has shared the stage with Al Chesis (Delta Sonics), Bad Influence and The Nighthawks. Dave Gorozdos on keys and vocals has shared the stage with local favorites such as Ronnie Dove, Jonny and the Stingrays, The Lady Rose Blues Band and many others. Scott Chadwick on drums has played with Lady Rose Band, Big Money Band, and the Walker Blues Band to name a few. "Cookie" Cooke on bass has played with US Military bands, Cooking With Gas, and many others. Scott Mattern on guitar has played with the fabulous Ursula Ricks, Cherry Gasoline, and many other great Baltimore and DC artists.

Ida Campbell & Eclectic Soul

Ida had not provided her band bio when the

newsletter went to print; however, Ida is well known as the host of the Friday "Don't Forget the Blues" show on WPFW 89.3FM radio and is also known for her spirited, invigorating and soul-shaking stage presence as a performer. She has also been singing throughout her life. In 2008, she put together her Blues Nation Band, a select group of musicians and her vision for a distinct sound of Blues and R & B. The band placed second in the 2008 DCBS Battle of the Bands competition. DCBS is pleased to have her and her Eclectic Soul band among the acts performing at the 2016 Fish Fry.

Ron Hicks Project

The Ron Hicks Project is viewed as one of the best blues/jazz bands in the Metro area. The varied vocal and musical talents of the band members give it the distinctive and aggressive flavor that is recognized over the DMV. The Music is Spiced in the South, Cooked in Chicago, and Served in the DMV. The band includes Ron Hicks on vocals and guitar, Herbie Wheatley on vocals, congas and saxophone, Glen Alexander on vocals, guitar and bass, James Anderson on drums, Rob Rutherburg on bass, and Vadim Levy on keys.

Three Song Sadie

Three Song Sadie started as a mission to infiltrate the DC Open Mic scene, introducing rockin' blues to the millennials, three songs at a time! To do this, Guitarist Dick Culp and Bassist Holly Culp joined with Drummer Gary Ehlers to create high energy, head-banging blues, utilizing variation in sound and tempo, and a touch of psychedelia. Whether it's an Open Mic, jam, multi-band line-up or opening for another band, Three Song Sadie hammers out attention-grabbing sets sure to get the crowd grooving. Three Song Sadie, longtime supporter of the DCBS, has a special treat in store for Fish Fry attendees. Joined by John Potts on guitar and vocals, Three Song Sadie will turn out a beat to fill the room, and let loose screaming guitar solos that will leave the crowd hungry for more. Three Song Sadie: not just another shuffle!

Twelve Bars on Monday

Twelve Bars on Monday is a blues band you can boogie to, any day of the week. "Twelve Bars on Monday, as the name of the band suggests, "The Blues" and well, they rehearse on Mondays! Leading the way for TBOM is longtime Maryland guitarist Vince Vigliotti and his soaring lead guitar work, which gives the band a blues/rock edge. Vince has played with many different bands over the years, notably with local legend, pianist Daryl Davis, no stranger to the DC Blues Society. Eric Marks on bass and Larry Hale on drums create the wall of sound that makes you realize that "any day of the week is a good day to hear Twelve Bars On Monday."

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
Keith Richards: "Under the Influence" His Documentary Tribute to American Music

Keith Richards of the Rolling Stones is the star of a Netflix documentary, "Keith Richards: Under the Influence," that focuses on American music and how it has influenced his life and career. Fans of the Rolling Stones will enjoy hearing about the early days of the band, seeing some classic songs being recorded and watching Richards record songs for a new solo album.

The highlight for me and what DCBS members will enjoy is hearing Keith describe how much American music — especially the blues — has impacted his life. Some of the many highlights include hearing him discuss:

Meeting Mick Jagger on a train after seeing him carrying Muddy Waters and Chuck Berry albums and then starting their band.



- ▲ The mission of the Rolling Stones in the early days was to turn people on to the blues and how they ended up turning America back on to the blues.
- Experiencing the segregated South U.S. and getting to meet and travel with black soul and R&B stars.

- Recording a classic album in Chicago on Chess Records and meeting Muddy Waters who said, "Thank you for what you guys are doing."
- Seeing a video of young Buddy Guy, and then Buddy and Keith tell stories while playing pool.
- ▲ A clip from the Shindig TV show that the Stones got Howlin' Wolf on for his first national TV appearance.
- Walking around the Ryman Auditorium in Nashville and describing how early country music also influenced him.
- ▲ The 1981 Stones appearance at the Checkerboard Lounge in Chicago with Muddy and Buddy; how it felt like he died and went to heaven.



▲ Going up to Muddy's old house in Chicago, reminiscing about how Willie Dixon took him to a party there one night and how he somehow woke up at Howlin' Wolf's house.

After all of these years, Keith Richards is still enjoying life and playing music. This movie is a must for any Rolling Stones fan and a treat for all blues fans to see Richards' loving tribute to his musical heroes and influences.
