Soulful Blues on Tap at 28th Annual DC Blues Festival

Area blues fans know that on the Saturday of Labor Day weekend, the only place to be is the Carter Barron Amphitheatre, where the **28th Annual DC Blues Festival** takes place on Sept. 3. This free Festival, produced and presented by the DC Blues Society, is a family-friendly event, with acts performing on the main stage. as well as the side stage located on the path near the Amphitheatre entrance. Plan to spend your whole afternoon and evening here or come for the acts that most interest you, but please do attend! You won't be disappointed.

Here's a look at the main stage acts:

DC Mudd, with special guest Gayle Harrod, opens the Festival. This local band won the opportunity to perform by winning the 2015 DCBS Battle of the Bands. "DC Mudd, Righteous Blues, Rhythm and Roots Music from Washington, DC" is how the band describes itself, and they ooze authenticity. Showing their sense of humor, they also

describe themselves as a "new band of old guys with 'young fashioned ways." Closer to the Potomac than the Mississippi, their hearts are in the Delta, Chicago and Detroit—striving to find the essence of the music that moved America and finding ways to bring some of that magic to today's audiences.

For the Festival, they will be joined by Blues, Rock and Soul singer Gayle Harrod, who is making a name for herself in the Baltimore, DC and VA areas. She is the lead singer for the band Shakedown and invokes the spirits of such divas as Koko Taylor, Tina Turner and many others.

Jackie Scott & The Housewreckers are sure to rock the Carter Barron Stage. They come from the Hampton Roads area of Virginia and their varied backgrounds and influences make for a hot combination of Blues and R&B packed with Soul. Jackie has spent the last few years honing her craft as a vocalist, and her quest led her to the steamy

Chicago Blues scene. It was in Chicago that Jackie received her baptism into the Blues. Musicians and performers, great and small, all freely shared in their wealth of skill,

The Countess & Royalty Blues Band is

the second act in the lineup, and they are coming to DC from Chicago. The Countess will also be performing this summer at the 6th Annual Chicago Women in the Blues Festival in the Windy City. Countess became fascinated with music at an early age, inspired by her grandmother's singing and music. Her style is one minute sexy and seductive and downright rough a minute later. Her style pays tribute to some of the best: Nancy Wilson, Billie Holiday, Gladys Knight, Aretha Franklin and more. She has performed with the Mike Wheeler Band, Carl Weathersby, Charlie Love, and was a finalist for Chicago Blues Divas at BLUES on Halsted. Lauren Mitchell hails from Sarasota, FL and is known as a soulful singer and a tour de force with a stellar Blues band. In a few short years, she has crafted a singular, unmistakable voice in the world of Blues, performing around 250 dates per year, nationally and internationally. They perform in concert halls, venues, historic honky tonks and festivals. Lauren grew up listening to Aretha Franklin, Diana Ross, Gladys Knight, Fatz Waller and Jelly Roll Morton and cites Etta James as profoundly influencing her sound. "People recognize the Etta influence," says Lauren. "Our music is definitely more soul than straight blues."

The Festival headliner, Slam Allen, is viewed as one of the most dynamic and original blues and soul artists on the scene today. More than just a singer, writer, and guitar player, Slam Allen connects with his audience like entertainers from a bygone era. Think, Otis Redding, and B.B., Albert and Freddie King, with a blend of Wilson Picket, James Brown, Sly Stone and a little George Benson and Jimi Hendrix thrown in to make a unique musical experience. Slam spent nine years (2001 through 2010) as the lead singer, lead guitarist, and band leader for James Cotton, and he is also credited with writing and singing on Cotton's 2011 Grammy nominated comeback album, Giant.

As a solo performer, Slam received the prestigious Master Blues Artist award from

the New York Blues Hall of Fame, was a 2016 Blues Music Award Nominee and is the proud sponsor of custom guitars made by Gerhards Guitarworks, Windham, NY.

Internationally recognized as a seasoned touring veteran with seven original albums under his belt, Slam is dedicated to forging his own legacy in the Blues and Soul world.



Sizzlin' Blues in Silver Spring

A near perfect summer day, a boisterous crowd and some of the best blues east of Chicago's fabled Southside made the 8th Annual Silver Spring Blues Festival sizzle for nearly 1,000 fans on Saturday, June 18 in Downtown Silver Spring.

Again this year, the Festival was presented by the hardworking staff and volunteers at the Silver Spring Town Center Inc. They brought some of the region's finest Blues acts to its main Fountain Stage, as well as to the Festival's acoustic Market

Stage, which was held in the late morning/ early afternoon hours. A host of amazing acts illustrated that the DMV is brimming with blues talent.

At the new Silver Spring Library, the Market Stage presented a variety of acoustic music:

Lil' Bit of Blues featuring Walter Williams, Eleanor Ellis, Chris Yakopcic, Conjure Women and the Archie Edwards Blues Ensemble.

The bands that rocked the Fountain Stage with electrified music were introduced by emcee Ida Campbell from WPFW, and included School of Rock Doin' The Blues, Built 4 Comfort, Full Power Blues, the Shirleta Settles Band, the Mike Wescott Band featuring Tommy Lepson, and the Silver Spring All-Stars, a lineup of veteran road players, including members of the Nighthawks, who got the crowd dancing and boogying into the night.

Despite the fact that a number of venues, including the Zoo Bar and Bohemian Caverns have closed, the DMV is fertile ground for top notch blues, as witnessed at one of the region's finest blues shows. "This lineup really showcased the depth of sizzling blues acts that we are lucky enough to have in the DMV," said Lisa Martin, Festival producer and SSTCi Executive Director.

That organization, along with sponsors, including the DC Blues Society and the always jumping Bethesda Blues & Jazz Supper Club, provided the backing for the show that from the first downbeat was in high gear.

It was easy to see that lots of Festival-goers, some wearing the gritty and one-of-a-kind DC Blues Society t-shirts, were in their element. As the sun baked a swelling crowd, the Fountain Stage acts became musical tour guides, sharing New Orleans boogie woogie with the powerhouse Daryl Davis, Chicagoborn but long-time Maryland resident, and the gospel-filled vocals of

Deletta Gillespies, a Baltimore native, to pumping Chicago Southside shuffles with the likes of Full Power Blues and its smoking vocalist Mama Moon and seasoned harp player, David Harris. If you closed your eyes you might think the iconic Magic Dick was on stage.

The evening's closing performance was a showstopper. Daryl Davis, a veteran Blues boogie woogie impresario on the piano along with a jam band aptly named The Silver Spring Blues All-Stars had the crowd wanting more. The jam band

included Deletta Gillespies, Patty Reese, Keith Grimes, Johnny Castle, Mark Stutso and Chris Watling. Mark Wenner was a surprise addition to the jam. Davis and the All Star band's set straddled musical genres from Professor Longhair to the iconic music of the godfather of modern Blues, Muddy Waters, and it raised the musical temperature so it felt like a steamy summer day in the Mississippi Delta. Davis launched into a red hot rendition of "Let the Good Times Roll," the masterful classic whose lyrics really were what the all-day festival was all about.

Curtis Salgado — The Beautiful Lowdown

Curtis Salgado has been around for a long time and done a lot of things. Like so many others, he was inspired as a kid by the classic Chicago blues. He formed a group in the '60s and then produced a festival in his native Oregon which brought him into contact with many of his idols. He also met John Belushi at that time, introduced him to the blues and supposedly was the inspiration for the character "Joliet Jake" Blues. Many of the Blues Brothers's songs were learned from Salgado.

Following that, he met Robert Cray and sang lead and played harp for his band's first album that was just breaking out. Salgado left after that album. He put in stints with Roomful of Blues, The Steve Miller Band and Santana, before relaunching his own band, the

Stillettos in 1995. They released several albums to no great notice. In 2006, Salgado was diagnosed with liver cancer and underwent a transplant, from which he successfully recovered. In 2012, he was diagnosed with lung cancer, from which he also recovered. In 2013, he won three Blues Music awards from the Blues Foundation, B. B. King Entertainer of the Year, Soul Blues Male Artist of the Year and Soul Blues Album of the Year for Soul Shot, his Alligator debut. In 2015, he won Soul Blues Male Artist again. He has been nominated for many others.

Although I have never seen him live, where he is supposed to be a dynamic performer, this reviewer has always been more impressed with his biography than his music. His new Alligator release, *The Beautiful Lowdown*, features all songs written or co-written by

Salgado and his horn charts, which are not on every track. His throaty vocals, although soulful, are not that more, and often less, than those of many others. Mostly, the harp stays at home. The styles vary from acoustic guitar based ballads, through straight blues, a detour into quasi-reggae and finally horn-backed soul blues. The backing is competent, but not noticeable.

The songs mostly are within the limits of the male-female relationship and few stick in the mind, even after repeated hearing. A few deal with the hard times that he has had and earned a right to use in song. The opener, "Hard to Feel the Same About Love" is a plaintive meeting with his first girlfriend and how their relationship forever changed his view of life, not necessarily for the better. "Walk a Mile in My Blues" emphasizes the hard times



and tells the world not to judge him. "Your Healing Love" is the acoustic ballad tribute to the woman's quality that saved him. "Is There Something I Should Know" is a soulful duet with an unidentified (at least on the review copy) female vocalist about their relationship. "My Girlfriend" is the artist telling her that she runs his weekend, not his life, she is not his wife.

If you like this artist, you will like the album. If you haven't heard him or are agnostic, probably not so much.
