

Annual DC Blues Festival Offers Something for Everyone!

Saturday, Sept. 3 promises to be a soulful blues day in DC, when the **FREE 28th Annual DC Blues Festival** is held at the Carter Barron Amphitheatre. This family-friendly event offers five bands on the Main Stage, plus several workshops, performances, and an instrument petting zoo on the newly named Dr. S.O. Feelgood (aka Chet Hines) Workshop Stage, located along the path right before you enter the Amphitheatre area.

Year after year, blues fans return to this annual event to enjoy a full day of listening and dancing to music performed by a mix of local bands and national/international-touring blues performers. Grab your friends, pack your sunscreen and a snack or two, and head to the Carter Barron Amphitheatre at 16th St. and Colorado Ave., NW. Parking is free; food, beverages, Festival t-shirts, CDs and other DCBS merchandise are available.

This year, singer, writer and guitar player Slam Allen, right, headlines the Festival. Allen and the other Main Stage performers represent an outstanding, well-rounded group of musicians:

DC Mudd with special guest Gayle Harrod kicks off the Festival. DC Mudd is a local band and winner of the 2015 DCBS Battle of the Bands. "DC Mudd, Righteous Blues, Rhythm and Roots Music from Washington, DC" is the band's selfdescription, and they ooze authenticity. 28th Annual FREE DC Blues Festival

The DC Blues Festival is a DC Labor Day weekend tradition and an event enjoyed by a wide range of DMV residents, as well as visitors to the area. DCBS has been committed to keeping this Annual Festival as a free event, but to do so means that fundraising before, during, and after the Festival is essential.

There are three main ingredients that go into the musical mix that the DC Blues Society (DCBS) presents at the FREE 28th Annual DC Blues Festival and at other DCBS events throughout the year.

In Memory of "Da Gator"

"It's Blues Time with Da Gator" was a familiar refrain all across the DMV when Rick Bolling took to the airwaves every Saturday on WPFW (89.3FM). Rick "Da Gator" Bolling's voice was silenced by his passing on Aug. 2.

Frederick (Rick) Bolling was born on March 23, 1934 in New Orleans, raised in Jacksonville, FL and moved to Washington, DC after serving in the military. By day, he worked for the U.S. Postal Service, and by night, he frequented DC's jazz clubs. He said his nickname was bestowed on him by his grandmother because "he would eat almost anything, like an alligator." His interest in the Blues? He got that as a child, too, when he heard three neighbors playing music on a guitar, washboard and soda bottle.

It was his love of jazz that brought Rick to WPFW. In time, he was recruited by General Manager Lou Hankins to host a Blues show, as well. In addition to established Blues musicians, Rick included music by lesser known artists and introduced his audience to southern soul, contemporary and adultthemed Blues by Chick Willis, Miss Jody, Clarence Carter, Mel Waiters, Lee Fields, Little Milton and others. He also played music by local favorites like Bobby Parker, Memphis Gold, The Hardway Connection, Charles "Big Daddy" Stallings, Jim Bennett and Lady Mary.

For many years, Rick was Master of Ceremonies on the main stage of the Annual Bluebird Blues Festival held at Prince George's Community College. For several years, he was honored at "Da Gator" Appreciation Day, an annual event at Lamont's Entertainment Complex in Pomonkey, MD. Rick is survived by his wife, Edith, several children and grandchildren, and of course, a vast number of friends and fans in the DMV. Information about funeral arrangements will be posted on the DC Blues Society's Facebook page when finalized.

are in the Delta, and in Chicago and Detroit—striving to find the essence of the music that moved America and finding ways to bring some of that magic to today's audiences. For the Festival, they will be joined by Blues, Rock and Soul singer, Gayle Harrod. Gayle is the lead singer for the band Shakedown and invokes the spirits of such divas as Koko Taylor, Tina Turner and many others.

The Countess & Royalty Blues

Band is the second act in the lineup. The Countess comes to DC from Chicago and she will be accompanied by a band of musicians from the DC area. Countess became fascinated with music at an early age, inspired by her grandmother's singing and music. Her style is one minute sexy and seductive and the next, down right rough and pays tribute to some of the

best: Nancy Wilson, Billie Holiday, Gladys Knight, and Aretha Franklin. She has performed with the Mike Wheeler Band, Carl Weathersby, Charlie Love and was a finalist for Chicago Blues Divas at BLUES on Halsted. Her promo material says "she will leave you on the edge of your seat waiting for her next performance."

Lauren Mitchell hails from Sarasota,

FL and is known as a soulful singer and a tour de force with a stellar Blues band. In only a few short years, she has crafted a singular, unmistakable voice in the world of Blues, performing around 250 dates per year, nationally and internationally. Lauren and her band perform in concert halls, venues, historic honky tonks, and festivals. She cites Etta James as profoundly influencing her sound. "People recognize the Etta influence," says Lauren. "Our music is definitely more soul than straight blues."

Jackie Scott & The Housewreckers

are sure to rock the Carter Barron Stage. They come from the Hampton Roads area of Virginia and their varied backgrounds and influences make for a hot combination of Blues

and R&B packed with Soul. Jackie has spent the last few years honing her craft as a vocalist and her quest led her to the steamy windows of Chicago's Blues scene where musicians and performers freely shared in their wealth of skill, time and talent to help her grow

as a Blues entertainer. She has since opened for B.B. King, Keb' Mo', Taj

> Mahal, Lyle Lovett and others. Jackie's onstage style is big, bold, sassy and infectious!

Festival headliner, **Slam Allen,** is

viewed as one of the most dynamic and original blues and soul artists on the scene today. More than just a singer, writer, and guitar player, Slam Allen connects with his audience like entertainers from a bygone era. Think Otis Redding, and

Originally from Buffalo, NY, Seals was exposed to all varieties of music from classical to country, and soul to heavy metal. He was drawn to the harmonica, but his parents wouldn't allow one in the house. As an adult he stumbled across one in a store, first learned on his own, and then began taking lessons. He relocated to Virginia in late 2007 and has played with local bands, performing music from soft rock to down home blues. He teaches beginner harmonica classes at the Archie Edwards Blues Heritage Foundation, at 4701 Queensbury Rd, Riverdale, MD 20737.

The Archie Edwards Blues Heritage Foundation (AEBHF)

Ensemble represents the AEBHF, which was formed in 1998 following the death of Piedmont guitarist/ vocalist, Archie Edwards. Archie's barbershop (aka Alpha Tonsorial Palace) in Northeast DC was a meeting place for Blues musicians. The AEBHF continues Archie's musical work through weekly acoustic jams, workshops, and performances, most occurring at the AEHBF's current location in Riverdale Park, MD. The AEBHF Ensemble miniconcert will feature Piedmont- and Delta-style acoustic blues with an explanation of the styles.

Remembering Blues Master Jesse Yawn

Jesse H. Yawn, a fixture in the Baltimore and Washington area blues scene for more than 25 years, passed away in Florida on July 5.

Born in Florida on Sept. 4, 1937, Jesse cut his teeth on Gospel music. Later he was recruited by National touring acts such as The Violinaires and The Trumpets of Joy. Jesse moved to Rochester, New York in the early 1950's to join the Traveling Six Spiritual group and later formed his own group, The Flower City Gospelaires.

Turning to the blues scene, Jesse worked with giants such as Jack McDuff, George Benson, Grant Green and Albert King. Drafted in 1962, he served in the military and earned a spot with the 77th Army Band as lead vocalist, entertaining at military and civilian functions. He later recorded demos for Golden World Studios in Detroit and Chess Records in Chicago, but none were released.

In the 1960's Jesse performed as lead singer for Bill Doggett, Bill Black Combo and the Ohio Players. When he moved to Baltimore in 1971, he brought with him a successful construction business and blues took a back seat, until his performance at the club 8x10 in Baltimore made it impossible for him not to be noticed. He was back into the music

scene full time in 1989. Jesse went on to front guitarist Rick Serfas' Band, The Soul Providers, and they won the DC Blues Society's Battle of the Bands Competition. They travelled to Memphis representing the DCBS at The Blues Foundation's International Blues Competition.

Jesse regularly played Baltimore's New Haven Lounge, T.T. Reynolds in Fairfax, VA and other area venues. He also performed at the DC Blues Festival, the Baltimore Blues Festival and the Pocono Blues Festival. He played with a who's who of area musicians, and for several years his band featured DC legend Jackie Hairston on keyboards and the criminally underrated Harold Flood on guitar. Jesse was regarded by many, including fellow blues artists, as the best male blues vocalist in the Baltimore-DC area.

A live recording of Jesse was issued as part of Wayne Kahn's *The Blues You Hate to Lose Anthology*, and in 1997 Horseplay Records issued the critically acclaimed *Forevermore*. Jesse subsequently recorded a live album during an Italian tour that he sold at performances.

I believe he moved to Florida in 2006 or 2007, and resided the rest of his life there. At the time of his death, at the age of 78, he was a resident of

Bradenton, FL. He was still performing in Florida and in Europe, and had returned to the Baltimore-DC area at least once. I understand that he recorded another album, for Full Tilt Productions, with Ron Holloway, Harold Flood and Bernard 'Pretty' Purdue among those playing on it. Fans of this late blues master eagerly await its release.
