

DC Blues Society Joins Cultural Alliance

For those who aren't familiar with the Alliance, their mission is to work on behalf of artists, cultural arts organizations, and the community to increase support and resources for the arts. More than 300 local arts-related organizations and 700 individuals, including musicians, composers, dancers and filmmakers, are members of the Alliance, which is located at 1436 U Street in Northwest Washington, DC. It can be found on the web at: www.cultural-alliance.org, and the phone number is 202-638-2406.

The Alliance makes group health insurance, including dental, from Kaiser Permanente and Optimum Choice available to its member organizations and individual members. Blues Society members can also obtain discountedtickets to shows from TICKETplace, an outlet run by the Alliance and the Kennedy Center in the Old Post Office Pavilion that provides discounted, day-of-show tickets for performing arts events in the Washington area.

DCBS Members have free access to the Alliance's JOB bank, an online listing of employment openings in the arts in the metropolitan area. In addition, DCBS members who choose to become Alliance members can get discounted memberships to some of the other member organizations.

The DCBS itself can also take advantage of the Alliance's Business Volunteers for the Arts program. In this program, business professionals volunteer their expertise to non-profits arts organizations to help them improve their business practices. Through this program business professionals have benefitted thousands of arts organizations in the DC area.

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


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
One of the area's better singer-guitarists, Chris Polk, finally has a recording available, Live at Zigs, recorded at the Alexandria club and available from Polk at his performances. Polk has several urban blues influences with perhaps none so obvious as Buddy Guy, a fact in part suggested in Polk's use of a polka dot guitar. It is also evident in the songs included here which does not indicate the breadth of Polk's repertoire. However renditions of Got My Eyes On You, I Got a Problem/I Feel So Bad, Midnight Train. Nobody Understands Me But My Guitar and the cover of Stormy Monday suggest how much an influence Guy is and listening to his vocals on disc as well as playing I am struck by this influence more than I have been watching Chris live as his playing is characterized by serpentine phrasing that evokes Guy as does Polk's expressive vocals. Polk does avoid some of the excesses that can mar Guy's performances. He plays and sings with a controlled intensity that serves the material well. The band includes some of his regular musical compatriots, quitarist John Sterling, bassist Willie Hicks and drummer Morgan Norris with special guest, Steve Johnsen contributing the keyboards here.

Daryl Davis

Daryl Davis is a fixture on the DC music scene, and arguably one of the finest blues and boogie woogie pianists anywhere, not just here. Influenced by many of the greats of jazz and blues piano, Davis was fortunate to have been taken under the wing of Chuck

Berry's pianist, Johnnie Johnson, and the legendary Pinetop Perkins, who helped him mature into a master of blues and boogie woogie piano. Additionally, as those who have witnessed his performances at clubs, festivals or swing dance, he is no slouch on a guitar. While it has taken some time, he has put together an album, American Routes on the British Armadillo label. Put together at several sessions in the area, the disc displays Davis' versatility and is certainly a lively album which is at its best when his piano is at the fore. Comprised of originals, some like the rollicking I'm a Boogie Man display the pumping piano and Daryl's energetic vocals although the backing vocal chorus is dispensable. As many know, Daryl often works with Chuck Berry, and We All Owe a Debt is a tribute to his sometimes employer. Other tunes evoke other legends of blues and rock'n'roll including Little Richard (Let Me Boogie With Your Woogie) and Jerry Lee Lewis (Going Back to the Country), although Lewis seems more of an influence on Davis' playing. Phil Wiggins adds his harmonica to this selection. With a variety of backing musicians present, the level of the groups varies, with some of the rhythm sections are more workmanlike than others. Bob Margolin lends his guitar to a rocking Broadminded, one of two selections on which Ron Holloway adds his

authoritative saxophone. Two piano features, Double "D" Blues, a tribute to Johnnie Johnson, and the closing Y2K Boogie, dedicated to Pinetop Perkins display his terrific piano playing while I'm Coming Back is a terrific slow blues that suggests that davis could produce a killer straight blues album. Some of the material may be a bit lightweight, but this is in keeping with Davis' ability to get people up and dancing with his music. And his playing is never insubstantial. This should be available from Daryl at his gigs and if you have trouble finding it in stores, you can try mail order stores.

Eugene 'Hideaway' Bridges

Another new album on Armadillo is Eugene 'Hideaway' Bridges, Man Without a Home. This writer is not familiar with Bridges but this is apparently his second album, but he is among the younger bluessoul singer guitarists and I suspect he is from around Memphis. Produced by Bridges with former Blues Society President Michael Roach, this is a terrific disc that merits wider exposure as he writes and sings about the heartaches and joys of the male-female relationship. With bright brassy horns backing his vocals and his clean, fleet guitar playing Bridges recounts how he Used to Sing Love Songs but now all he sings is the blues, the rocking shuffle that opens this disc. If I was going make comparisons to other bluesmen I might suggest Bridges is a bit more vocally intense version of the late Mighty Joe Young or Fenton Robinson. One can hear more than a touch of Sam Cooke in his gospel rooted singing. You're Gonna Miss Me is a walking tempo blues with a

down home groove, Bridges' declaration he is a *Bluesman* borrows a bit from the Isley Brothers' *Fight the Power*, while he takes the tempo into the alley on the slow blues where he feels so alone like a *Man Without a Country, Man Without a Home. Movin' and a Groovin* is one of two numbers associated with Sam Cooke, the other being the ballad *I'm Fallin' In Love*, and Bridges' vocals evoke the legendary soul giant. He is that good a singer. I'll skip the track by track analysis except to note that the band is really solid, Bridges' fluid fretwork is a delight throughout and the horns add punch and musical coloring behind his powerful performances.

Jimmy Cavallo

A new release on the Blue Wave label is a delightful surprise featuring Jimmy Cavallo, **The Houserocker**. Cavallo is a veteran saxophonist and singer who has been playing jumping rhythm and blues since 1948 and still whaling. The back cover suggests he is the first white rock and roll artist, and he played with many early greats and was part of Allen Freed's shows in new York city in the fifties. This album has him rendering renditions of songs from Wyonnie Harris, Fats Domino, Louis Jordan and Roy Brown

with an original rocking instrumental. Cavallo sings with a natural, unforced approach and has a big-toned sax sound. He is backed by Ron Spencer & Jumpstart who do a solid job in supporting him. In addition to the twelve strong jump blues performances, the album concludes with a lengthy oral history by him, which can easily be skipped by those who just want to listen to the music. But it is a nice bonus on a disc that will hopefully provide Mr. Cavallo with some deserved recognition of his contributions and the fact he remains a vital performer today.

Tom Principato


It was in the late 80s that I first caught Tom Principato and his band at the original incarnation if Twist & Shout. Principato, long a fixture on the area music scene was among the most popular singer-guitarists working in the blues and rock veins. While not a great singer, he rarely strained and could be quite effective within the limitations plus he was among the area's most inventive guitarists adding swing, rockabilly and rock elements to his blues guitar inventions producing a highly popular sound that also led to him gaining an international audience. Live in Europe 1988 (Powerhouse) was recorded most likely in Scandinavia where Principato, bassist Steve Wolf and drummer Clark Matthews found enthusiastic audiences after the release of Principato's Smokin' album. The tunes are pretty typical of what tom and the band was playing including staples of his repertoire as Tiny Bradshaw's Well Oh Well, Mack Rice's Cold Women With Warm Hearts (a big record for Albert King), and Sonny Landreth's Congo Square as well as originals

like *Try to Reach* you and the instrumental *Blue Lights*. Highlights have to include *Congo Square* which Principato was among the first other than the composer to interpret and provides him to take a rocking solo as well as his inventive use of effects and tone on *Blue Lights*. Those that remember this band will want this as a souvenir of the era, but it stands up well nearly 15 years later as a testament to the music this group made.

Sleepy John Estes

The late Sleepy John Estes (he passed in 1977) was among those blues artists who recorded prior to World War II whose career was resurrected after being rediscovered as part of the folk boom in the sixties, and received some recognition until his death in 1977 Estes was among the finest folk blues poets whose songs were often derived from his own experiences. he penned some classic blues themes like *Someday Baby* which was the basis of a later Muddy Waters recording as well as *Worried Life Blues*. Delmark recorded Estes after his rediscovery resulting in several superb and classic albums. They have just issued **Newport Blues**, which is first new Estes album on Delmark since

1969, and was recorded after a Newport Folk Festival appearance in 1964. On it he is joined by Hammie Nixon, a remarkable harmonica accompanist and jug blower and Yank Rachell who provided mandolin, guitar and piano support. Both Nixon and Rachell do get a chance to sing but it is Estes who is at the front. Listening to Estes, one is struck by the crying vocals as Estes is heard recreating his pre-War recordings. Secret Agent along with Airport Blues. The later tune's melody would be appropriated by John Lee 'Sonny Boy' Williamson (who knew Estes and Nixon from growing up in Tennessee) for the well known Good Morning Little School Girl. Estes also provided new songs including Newport Blues. Estes was a rudimentary guitarist but Rachell provided a firmer rhythm and some fills on guitar or mandolin, while Hammie Nixon's harmonica playing is greatly under appreciated and was an influence on John Lee. His vocals on NYC Breakdown and Worried Mind Blues are highly moving. The music has a rawness reflecting its lack of artifice, but the level of the performances are ar above, some of the celebrated modern grunge blues. This is a terrific new release.

Eddie Burns

Delmark has also issued **Snake Eyes**, the latest album by another under recorded blues veteran, Eddie Burns. Burns is a veteran of the Detroit blues scene, including playing with John Lee Hooker on a number of Hooker's finest band recordings. He shares some influences with hooker including Tommy McLennan but in addition to being a fine rhythmic guitarist he is a

capable harmonica player indebted to John Lee 'Sonny boy Williamson. Delmark, who has issued a couple of albums by his younger brother Jimmy has just issued Angel Eyes. On it Burns is joined by brother Jimmy on guitar along with pianist Roosevelt Purifoy, bassist Nick Charles (brother of Magic Slim) and drummer Larry Taylor (one of the legendary Eddie Taylor's sons), in an album of postwar ensemble blues. Playing both acoustic as well as electric guitar and harmonica, Burns' simple, effective playing and his straightforward plaintive singing result in some delightful traditionally oriented blues. There are echoes of classic Muddy Waters' stop-time grooves on Night Shift, while the rollicking Papa Likes to Boogie evidences the influence of Williamson. A spirited remake of the Drifters' Your Cdash Ain't Nothin' But Trash is joined by a tasteful cover of Memphis Slim's Lend Me Your Love, while Going to New Orleans, is similar to recordings by Otis Spann and Lonnie Johnson, while the two Burns play acoustic guitars on the shuffle Treat Me Like I Treat You. The backing band is wonderful and with Burns' honest and heartfelt performances, Snake Eyes is a gem.





fused with souls singer Johnnie Taylor, had one of the biggest urban blues hits with *Part Time Love* for Galaxy which is available on a reissue on one of the Fantasy labels. later he scored hits for Jewel with *Everybody Knows About My Good Thing, It's My Own Fault* (covered by professor Longhair) and other songs. He also recorded a strong album with the late Ted Taylor, no relations.

Clarence Samuels was a shouter who recorded for a variety of labels and his most famous song was *Lollypop Baby* also recorded by his friend Roy Brown.


