#### Ray Kaminsky & Jack Fretwell.

Ray Kaminsky performs traditional blues on vintage Martin and steel-bodied guitars. He grew up in Chicago and has been performing since the mid-1960's in nightclubs, concert venues, festivals, radio and television performances from the Midwest to the Mid-Atlantic. He features the music of Robert Johnson, Blind Blake, Reverend Gary Davis, Mississippi John

Hurt and other blues legends from songs primarily rooted in the 1800's through the 1930's that are part of the current rediscovery and popularity in acoustic circles. Ray has studied Piedmont blues guitar with John Cephas and Paul Geremia, and Delta style with slide masters Lonnie Pickford, Scott Ainslie and Steve James. He was also highly influenced by the late John Jackson and has recorded several albums including **Ghosts of the Blues** which was a WAMMIE co-winner for 2001 Blues Album. Ray is a marvelous guitarist, especially in the Piedmont tradition and will be joined by Jack Fretwell a marvelous harmonica player.

#### **Pat Donohue**

The 1983 National Finger Picking Guitar Champion, Pat Donohue blends blues and folk, and he has performed at major music festivals including the Newport Folk Festival, Telluride Festival, and the Philadelphia Folk Festival, and performs regularly in concerts and clubs around the country. Pat has five albums on Bluesky Records. His extensive travels for A Prairie Home Companion and his solo performance engagements, enable him to conduct in-person group workshops throughout the nation. He participates in teaching camps, including the Augusta Heritage Workshops in Elkins, West Virginia, where he has taught advanced swing and blues.

#### **Mary Flower**

Mary Flower is a soulful singer, a consummate fingerstyle guitarist, and a master of lap slide guitar. She draws on traditional, contemporary, and original material that remains true to the power of the blues. She is also a highly respected teacher of

blues, and teaches as well as performs internationally. Mary also taught guitar at the Denver Folklore Center Music School and its successor, the Swallow Hill Music School. The turning point in Mary Flower's breakout from a local career began with her appointment, in 1993, as visiting guest artist during Blues Week at Augusta Heritage Center in Elkins, West Virginia. She's been back nearly every year since. It was her experience at Augusta, one of the nation's leading centers for preserving roots music, that inspired her to go back on the

road in pursuit of a very-quickly-found national career.

Mary was a prizewinner at the National Fingerpicking Guitar Championship in 2000— the second woman in 27 years to place in the top three! She has four CDs to her name, the most recent **Ladyfingers**, was released last year. She has also recorded two instruction videos, Mary appeared at the Herndon Blues Festival a couple years back and gave a wonderful performance. More is expected this month.

#### **Scott Perry**

Scott Perry's guitar showcases stinging delta slide, lilting Piedmont fingerwork, tough Chicago shuffles and swinging west coast vamps and is paired with a vocal attack that draws you in with a whisper, stirs your soul with it's resonance,

then exalts you with a gritty roar.

Scott now lives southwestern VA. A fulltime musician and Blues-in-the-Schools educator, he has opened for, or shared the stage with many legends of acoustic blues including Taj Mahal, John Hammond, "Big Boy" Henry, John Jackson, Catfish Keith, Steve James, Drink Small, and Ann Rabson as well as electric acts including "Chicago" Bob Nelson, Big Joe and the Dynaflows, and Anson Funderburgh and the Rockets Featuring Sam Myers. Scott's most recent album is reviewed in this month's record reviews. This is I believe his first appearance in the DC area, and having heard some of his recordings, your editor is looking forward to hearing him.

#### Eric Freeman and Jeffrey Scott

Two of the younger generation of young Black acoustic blues artists, both Eric Freeman and Jeffrey Scott were heavily indebted to John Jackson. With Jeffrey Scott who hails from Culpepper, there was a family connection as Jeffrey is a nephew of the late John Jackson and captures some of the mannerisms of his legendary uncle. He has become a skilled guitarist and singer and quite a storyteller as well. He has a wonderful self-produced cd that hints at how good he will become. I met Eric Freeman at John Jackson's funeral where he introduced himself to me and mentioned how he

studied under John. I heard Eric performing at the Tribute to John that the Institute of Musical Traditions put on in February and was impressed by his wonder-

ful guitar playing and vocals, doing a couple of the most accomplished interpretations of Blind Boy Fuller numbers that I had heard in a long time. The continuing of the blues tradition is in good hands with the likes of these two performers.

#### **Cephas & Wiggins**

Internationally known, John Cephas & Phil Wiggins are amongst the most accomplished and celebrated acoustic blues musicians alive today. Cephas, a master of the pied-

mont blues guitar, grew up in Bowling green Virginia and was exposed to the music through house parties and the like while Phil Wiggins learned harmonica growing up in D.C. playing with the likes of the late street singer Flora Molton.

There first issued recordings were made as part of a series of field recordings on the German L&R label and since they have recorded critically acclaimed and award winning albums as well as performed at clubs, concert halls and festivals around the world.

#### **Hoffman Returns To Air**

Steve Hoffman, who hosted a popular blues program for many years on the late WDCU-FM, will be returning to the airwaves with a regular show on WPFW. Hoffman is expect-

> ed to host one of the daily Blues Plate Specials, which air Monday through Friday from 12:30 to 1:30 pm (please note the later starting times). Additionally, Hoffman may be utilized as a substitute host at other times. Hoffman is quite happy to be back on the airwaves, saying "I'm honored and glad to be back on the radio. I am gratified that the new management team at WPFW has seen fit to find a spot for the kind of blues programming I presented successfully for 15 years on WDCU." While Hoffman will be playing some contem-

porary blues (what he considers the best of the new), his shift will focus on vintage blues, especially from the 1940s, 50s, and 60s.

#### **New Blues CDs**

Veteran Texas-born bluesman, Philip Walker, has finally recorded a new album. Walker has been through some rough times recently as his wife had a stroke and his step son passed away leading him to cancel several tours. The new album, recorded for M.C. Records is a live album done at Biscuits and Blues in San Francisco and featured special guests featured special guests Angela Strehli and Rick Estrin. Philip and Carpentieri of MC Records were both pleased with the recording which should be available in September. I believe it is Philip's first recording since **Lone Star Shootout** which he recorded with Lonnie Brooks and Long John Hunter a few years back.

Alligator Records has started work on Shemekia Copeland's new CD, produced by Dr. John with a mid-September release date. Work is also under way on a new CD from Cephas & Wiggins for release in fall 2002. #### Scott Perry

I should probably start this review out by apologizing to both Mr. Perry and my editor for waiting so long to review this cd. But it is appropriate for the review to appear in this month's newsletter, since Scott will be performing at the Herndon Blues Festival in July.

I'm Happy Now is Perry's first cd, recorded while he was living in Charleston, SC (he now lives in Floyd, VA.) As the title implies, most of the tracks here are upbeat, toe tappin' songs. Perry plays a resonator guitar on all tracks, and sings on all but one. Four tracks are solo, and the rest feature a backing band. Nine of the thirteen tracks on the cd are originals.

The solo pieces include originals I Got A Woman and Go Ahead Baby, and covers of Charlie Jordan's Keep It Clean and Lonnie Johnson's No More Troubles Now (which contains the lyrics that name the cd, "I'm happy now.") The most interesting solo piece is Payday/Steel Guitar Rag, which starts out as the classic Sylvester Weaver instrumental and segues into the Mississippi John Hurt standard. Both are songs that have been recorded by blues and country players.

On most of the band tracks Scott is backed up by the very tight rhythm section of David Cooper (upright bass) and Gene Taylor (drums.) On two tracks they are joined by washboard player Shrimp City Slim. Juke Joint Johnny adds his flashy but tasteful harmonica (somewhat reminiscent of Phil Wiggins' sound) to over half the tracks on the album.

There is a nice mixture of traditional blues styles on this cd, from the Delta bottleneck of I Got A Woman to the gospel tinged What'cha Gonna Do, to the ragtime/hokum Rub It Boy'til It Shines. The melodic guitar/harp instrumental Benediction is a nice ending track for this cd.


Perry is a very talented singer, songwriter and guitarist, and sounds great both as a soloist and with a band. Fans of acoustic blues can order the cd on http://www.ohpapa.com/, and I'm sure they will on sale at the Herndon Blues Festival.

#### Steve Levine

#### John Mooney

John Mooney's Blind Pig album, All I Want, is another solid effort that displays his distinctive blend of Mississippi Delta blues and classic New Orleans R&B. Mooney, as some of you are aware, was among the last individuals to learn the delta blues style from the legendary Son House while residence in New Orleans helped him incorporate the second-line rhythms and the music of Professor Longhair and others into his music. The Crescent City flavor is helped by the presence of drummer Bernard "Bunche" Johnson and the fabulous Alfred "Uganda" Roberts on congas and percussion (Roberts was a longtime member of Professor Longhair's band) in addition to Jeff Sarli, Mooney's longtime bassist. The eleven performances include classic delta blues from his mentor Son House (Son's Blues) along with Willie Brown's (Future Blues) and a stirring rendition of Fred McDowell's You've Got to Move. There is also a rocking version of Hey Little Girl, credited to Professor Longhair but I believe originally performed by Paul Gayten. Mooney converts the rhumba piano boogie by adeptly playing his guitar in a percussive manner while singing vigorously. The title track as well as the following Baby Please both showcase his passionate singing along with solid downhome guitar blues playing while the band lays down a strong New Orleans groove. This is an album that will not disappoint the fans he already has and is as solid an introduction to his music as any of

his albums. Mooney will be appearing at this year's Hot August Blues benefit concert just north of Baltimore.

#### **James Cotton**

It has been thirty five years since James Cotton left the Muddy waters band to start his own career as a starring performer. Telarc has marked the occasion with the latest James Cotton album 35th Anniversary Jam of the James Cotton Blues Band. Cotton has not been singing in the past few years because of throat problems but still plays incredible harmonica, and with a backing band that includes pianist Dave Maxwell and bassist Noel Neal is joined by (among others) Kenny Neal, Lucky Paterson, Koko Taylor, Bobby Rush, Shemekia Copeland, Syl Johnson, Jimmy Vaughan, Kim Wilson, Maria Muldaur, Ronnie Hawkins and Tab Benoit to recreate songs that Cotton has recorded. So we get Kenny Neal handling the vocal for Don't Start Me Talking the Rice 'Sonny Boy Williamson' Miller song Cotton recorded for his first Verve-Forecast album, while Lucky Paterson takes the lead for Cotton Crop Blues, a song Cotton first sang for Sun records and later recorded as part of the Chicago The Blues Today series. Shemekia Copeland sings How Long Can a Fool go Wrong while Syl Johnson sings (with Jimmy Vaughan taking the lead guitar on Rocket 88. Cotton's classic instrumentals, the rocking The Creeper and the moody Blues in My Sleep are given slightly updated reworkings. It is a spirited and lively album that shows that James Cotton can still produce, with the help of many friends, a wonderful collection of blues performances

#### Lou Pride

One can really admire David Earl's refusal to allow the music on Severn Records to be easily categorized. He has put together a catalog of distinctive 'roots' releases but has shown considerable eclecticism in the blues and jazz he has issued. Among his latest issues is Lou Pride's Words of Caution. Pride produced a couple of

soul-blues albums a few years back that unfortunately became very hard to find. A warm soulful singer, his voice is not that different from Big Jesse Yawn's although perhaps a little cooler in delivery. Pride wrote much of the songs here although there are a few interpretations included. With a band that includes Dallas guitarist Jon Moeller, bassist Steve Gomes and Benji Porecki on keyboards (Bill Heid guests on the Hammond on three tracks). The tone of the album is set with the opening title track that was co-penned by Pride and David Earl as Pride sings about being a changed person but his woman is now playing the games as he walks in the front door and she walks out the back with the band capturing the groove that marked so many classic Al Green recordings. You Were Never Mine is a ballad where Pride sings about a romance that he wanted but as he sings, "I never lost you, you were never mine." The sophistication of the lyrics are matched by his singing as on the latin-tinged and jazzy Love For My Baby, and the reggae groove on Don't Blame The Man has him cautioning fellows not to blame the man who steals your woman because it would never happen unless she lets him. Livin' a Lie is a urban blues about his woman going downtown to party and pride saying about time he starting moving on and features a really fine solo from Harold Flood in an Albert King vein. Flood is Jesse Yawn's guitarist and this is his first recorded solo to my knowledge. A varied selection of soul and blues moods are caught here with pride delivering his adult lyrics in strong style with some strong idiomatic backing. Words of Caution is another impressive addition to the Severn catalog.

## Johnny Shines & Sunnyland Slim

It was the summer of 1968 or 1969 when I went to The Electric Circus in New York's East Village to catch a show by Willie Dixon's Chicago Blues All Stars and pianist Otis Spann. Dixon's band, which recorded an album for Columbia, included Walter Horton on harmonica, guitarist Johnny Shines, pianist Sunnyland Slim and drummer Clifton James. It was the first time I would have the opportunity to see Shines and Slim who both would perform for over twenty more years. Some of their vintage recordings have been issued in England by Westside with US versions scheduled for release on Fuel by the time you get this issue.

Johnny Shines' disc Evening Shuffle, The Complete J.O.B. Recordings 1952-1953, collects every recording Shines made for the small, pioneering J.O.B. label. Many of the 14 tracks were issued on a Flyright/Paula album devoted to Shines and Robert Lockwood, but this disc also includes tracks previously released under Sunnyland Slim's name that feature Shines as a vocalist including one previously unissued alternate take. Three sessions are represented here. There was Shines' brilliant coupling of Ramblin'/ Fish Tail, his interpretations of Robert Johnson's Walking Blues and Terraplane Blues. Another session was split with J.B. Lenoir and Sunnyland Slim and included his reworking of Big Bill's I Had a Dream, Livin' in the White House. The final session had Shines backed by Walter Horton's harmonica whose playing on Evening Sun (an its alternate take, Evening Shuffle) and Brutal Hearted Woman was among the most inspired playing Horton ever laid down on a recording. Shines himself possessed one of the blues most compelling voices. The choice of the two Johnson titles for his first J.O.B. session should not be a surprise as Shines may have been Johnson's closest travelling companion and probably picked up the elements of Johnson's style better than anyone else. With bass and a drummer (who basically stays on the bass drum on Ramblin'),

Shines just overwhelms with the forcefulness of his performances here. Shines would recreate Fish Tail as Dynaflow Blues for the Vanguard collection **Chicago The Blues Today**, although none of his later solo recordings of Walking Blues would quite capture the intensity of Ramblin'. It should be noted that there are only nine songs here, the other tracks are alternate takes or a rehearsal take. Still, the music here is first rate, and several of these tracks are among the finest examples of Chicago blues of the fifties.

Sunnyland Special, by Sunnyland Slim & Friends also includes tracks by friends Floyd Jones and Robert Jr., Lockwood. It is subtitled The Cobra & J.O.B. Recordings, 1949-1956. He would continue to perform for nearly four decades include a solo piano show the DC Blues Society presented in September 1987, the Society's first concert after our initial fund-raising benefit that launched the society. Slim was a well seasoned veteran when he first recorded as Dr. Clayton's Buddy and had already recorded for Aristocrat when he recorded for the small J.O.B. label. Despite the album's subtitle, the earliest tracks here, including Down Home Child, Leaving Your Town and Sunnyland Special, date from 1951. They also include Robert Lockwood who also recorded his second version of Dust Mv Broom (he had waxed it previously with Slim on piano for Mercury). Floyd Jones was also present for one of these 1951 sessions and recorded his hauntingly brooding Dark Road. Slim was a powerful pianist with a booming voice that perhaps lacked in subtlety what was made up in passion. A session with Johnny Shines produced When I Was Young, along with Bassology which was a feature for J.T. Brown's distinctive nanny goat

tenor sax. Slim joined Floyd Jones again in the studio in 1953 for several more brooding blues including the marvelous *Rising Wind* and *On the Road Again*. Slim would back Lockwood for a 1955 session which produced *Aw Aw Baby*, a rendition of Robert Johnson's *Sweet Home Chicago* that was coupled with the odd lyrics of *Sweet Woman From Maine*, a song that displayed the modernistic elements of Lockwood's guitar playing.

Westside also has a Snooky Pryor & friends disc that is part of this series and it is equally good to these two. There is also a double disc collection, **Rough Treatment** that has some duplication with these albums but also includes tracks by Memphis Minnie, Little Hudson, J.B. Lenoir and Eddie Boyd who also recorded for J.O.B. Even for the time, J.O.B. was not exactly high tech production, but the mastering is the best that this vintage and classic material has received. I wish full personnel had been provided, but the liner notes are literate and authoritative. Highly recommended, whether you get the US releases or the West Side originals.

#### **Wallace Coleman**

Wallace Coleman was part of Robert Lockwood Jr.'s band through the sixties and until recently where his Little Walter inspired harp was a delight to those who caught him with Lockwood. His new album is Live at Joe's (Pinto Blue) a recording done live in the studio, not a club. There is nothing fancy about the music here as Coleman displays his stylistic indebtedness to Walter on a program of mostly classic blues including Juke, One More Chance With You, and Tell Me Mama," as well as songs associated with Jimmy Rogers, You're the One and My Last Meal, and Muddy Waters Young Fashioned Ways. Throw in a few originals including the slow Hard Life with some nice chromatic harp playing and the jazzy Love Spell, and one gets a nicely sung and played set of performances that are centered on Coleman's very likeable, unforced vocals and fluid harp playing. The band provides a steady, swinging

foundation. The guitarists get their solo spots but their playing does not intrude when Coleman is in the fore. Nothing startlingly original here perhaps, but Coleman and band do a solid job in evoking the classic Chicago blues sound which certainly should appeal to those who love the classic Chicago blues sound.

#### **Percy Mayfield**.

Percy Mayfield is best known as the Poet laureate of the Blues for his many classic blues songs. A singer of considerable sophistication as well as feeling, Mayfield enjoyed a lengthy recording and performing career. Unfortunately many of his classic recordings, apart from his Specialty sides, are not easy to find. The British Acadia label has remedied this in part by reissuing Mayfield's Walking on a Tightrope. These eleven performances range from remakes of his Specialty sides like P.M. Blues and the immortal Please Send Me Someone to Love to then new songs like the title track along with Danger Zone and My Pain Is Here to Stay, with its caution that alcohol is not an answer. Carl Davis who produced so many classic Chicago soul recordings of the sixties supervised the session with its modern, brassy sound that complements the intimacy of Mayfield's vocals. Its really nice to have this available. Maybe we can get lucky and the two albums he did for Ray Charles Tangerine label will be made available. You may have to check mail order outlets to find this, but this is well worth seeking despite the short playing time.

#### BluesWorks

BluesWorks celebrated their tenth Anniversary with a concert at the Institute of Musical Traditions last November. The concert was recorded and the group has released it, **One Step - Live at IMT** on their own Cashew Blue Records label. The center of BluesWorks is Judy Luis-Watson and husband Paul Watson. Judy ran the DC Blues Society jams when we first conducted them at Takoma Street Tavern where Paul was a regular participant, at that time often playing with then Blues Society President Michael Roach.

It was not long after the jams stopped being at Takoma Station that BluesWorks began with Judy and Paul accompanied by different guitarists. In 1992, BluesWorks played at the 4th D.C. Blues Festival, the last one that was held at Langdon Park.

In the intervening years we have been able to watch them grow as musicians and performers. They have grown from interpreting a wide range of classic blues material to also writing and performing original material. Judy has developed into a wonderful pianist while Paul has become an accomplished mandolin player in addition to being a strong harmonica player. While Mark Puryear has perhaps become the guitarist who most regularly plays with them, Ralph Fortune is another guitarist who adds a distinctive quality to the music when available.


Both Puryear and Fortune appeared at the Tenth Anniversary concert along with percussionist Jaamin' Tempo. The 17 songs pair Paul & Judy with differing combinations of the guests and while Judy and Paul handle the bulk of the vocals, Puryear and Fortune also step to the mike. Material ranges from a rollicking mandolin feature for Paul, Howard's Boogie, (from Howard Armstrong) and the rollicking instrumental Ridin' on Sunday to a rendition of Horace Silver's jazz classic, Song For My Father. Henry Thomas' Fishin' Blues is the opening number and among several fine vocals from Paul. Paul's original, *Pressure*, inspired by someone mentioning to Paul feeling pressured by his financial situation combines a nice vocal and lyric. Puryear sings a nice rendition of Tampa Red's It Hurts Me Too (miscredited on the disc to Elmore James), while Fortune revives Sleepy John Estes' Floatin' Bridge with nice guitar from him while Paul adds some wonderful mandolin accompaniment. Judy has become a wonderful pianist with a fluid touch and a very likeable and expressive singer . She pays tribute to Otis Spann on It Must Have Been the Devil, handles Julia Lee's jivey Oh Chuck It (In a Bucket), and performs a wonderful medley of A Virus Called the Blues & Black Night. The mix of originals as well as their interpretations of older blues that generally have not been overdone to death, along with strong musicianship and ensemble playing, result in an album that is sure to please acoustic blues fans.

#### **Muddy Waters Biography**

Memphis writer Robert Gordon has written a gem of blues biography of the legendary Muddy Waters, Can't Be Satisfied: The Life and Times of Muddy Waters tracing his background in the delta through his emergence as the King of the Chicago blues scene in the fifties to the up and down fortunes of his career as musical tastes shifted and as his music reached new audiences until his death almost two decades ago. Gordon integrates materials from the interviews that Muddy did for various specialist publications (like DownBeat, Living Blues) with his own interviews and other material from Muddy's relatives, band members, managers and others for a book that is one of the better recent musical biographies I have read.

Muddy and his music is brought to life. Unlike another Muddy Waters biography, Gordon provides some blood and flesh, including the warts, to Muddy as opposed as rendering him simply as some legendary icon. Gordon also brings the music to life and provides some thoughtful commentary on the music. There are extensive end notes as well, and as I write this should be relatively easy to obtain at local stores.






