

King Biscuit Blues Festival

The King Biscuit Blues Festival (the Delta's premier free blues festival) will be October 4-6, 2001. Music will be on several stages which include stages for electric, acoustic, and gospel acts. The lineup includes: Bobby Rush, Anson Funderburgh & The Rockets w/Sam Myers, Marcia Ball, Robert Jr. Lockwood, Guitar Shorty, Billy Branch, Pinetop Perkins w/Rusty Zinn,

Snooks Eaglin, Sam Carr, Alvin "Youngblood" Hart, Eddie Cusic and more. The D.C. area's Westcott Brothers Band featuring Black Magic, are scheduled to perform on the open mike stage at the opening of the festival on Saturday.

Dave Myers

Sad word was received in early September that David Myers, the last surviving member of the seminal Chicago blues band. The passed away Aces. complications related to diabetes. A Mississippi native, Myers with his brother Louis, drummer Fred Below, and Junior Wells formed the Aces which at one time rivalled Muddy Waters' Band as the top blues group in Chicago. When Little Walter left Muddy Waters after the success of his recording Juke, Junior Wells replaced him in Waters' band and the Aces, renamed the Jukes, became Walter's backing band. Dave Myers stayed with Little Walter for a few years even after brother Louis left after a money dispute and was replaced by Robert Lockwood, Jr. Dave Myers played electric bass lines on a regular guitar before becoming among the earliest bass guitarists in Chicago and was highly influential. He

and was highly influential. He recorded as a sideman on countless sessions with a who's who of Chicago blues of the past half century including Muddy, Otis Rush, Little Walter, Sonny Boy Williamson, Otis Rush, Charlie Musselwhite, Robert Lockwood, Jr. and Jimmy Rogers. A few years ago, Black Top issued a fine disc that was his first and only album as a leader. He was

scheduled to perform at this year's Chicago Blues Festival but was discovered in a coma a few days before. With his passing there is now one living link to the golden age of Chicago blues.

Mighty Sam McClain

Since his "rediscovery," the former deep soul legend Mighty Sam McClain has slowly developed a following with a number of very fine releases, the latest of which, Sweet Dreams, has been recently released on Telarc. McClain certainly stands as one of the finest singers working in the soul-blues vein. with a delivery and voice that should appeal to fans of Bobby Bland. McClain also wrote many of these tunes, exceptions being the soulful transformation of the title track which is one of the tunes country legend Patsy Cline is best identified with and the Staple Singers' hit Respect Yourself. With a solid band anchored by Bruce Katz on piano and Barry Seelen on the B-3 and a solid horn section. McClain belts out a variety of tunes with standouts including the country-flavored ballad Learn How to Love You Again, and Nothing But a Feeling, a nice slow blues with nice solo breaks for tenor saxophonist Chuck Langford and pianist Katz. While capable of belting out a lyric with the best of them, what makes Mc-Clain so special is that he delivers the songs so soulfully without shouting the lyrics except for emphasis. Perhaps some of the tunes are somewhat generic shuffles and slow blows

and the horns play somewhat generic riffs, but McClain is one of those vocalist that one would not mind listening to sing about anything.

Steve Freund

I'll Be Your Mule is Guitarist Steve Freund's second

Delmark album as a leader, and showcases his talents very well. Freund has played with the late Sunnyland Slim and Big Walter Horton, along with James Cotton, and his years working with these legends provided him with insight into these older blues styles that is hard to develop simply from listening to recordings. How adept and capable Freund has become is evident, whether listening to his originals or the cover tunes. He certainly has graduated blues guitar college. One can hear echoes of Otis Rush on his stinging playing on the title cut and the influence of B.B. King is evident on the rocking updating of King's, Fine Lookin' Woman. Freund also evokes the forgotten Willie Lacey on the closing Tampa Red number, Rambler's Blues. Freund is surprisingly good as a vocalist with a natural and relaxed delivery. If he perhaps can't pull-off the remake of Lowell Fulson's morose Hung Down Head, he is more than convincing singing the title track and Bill Broonzy's "Ramblin' Bill. Freund also scores

with a relaxed, somewhat reflective rendition of Guitar Slim's Something to Remember You By. In addition to his strong vocals and playing, Freund benefits from a terrific studio

band that includes Mark 'Mr. B' Braun on piano, Harlan Terson or Bob Stroger on bass, and Kenny Smith on drums. Smith, son of long-time Muddy Waters drummer, Willie 'Big Eyes' Smith, is particularly impressive, playing with taste and a touch not heard enough of on recent blues recordings. Steve Guyger adds some fine harmonica to three tracks, one of which *A Dollar A Mile*, a lament on the traveling blues musician's life, employs the melody of Big Bill Broonzy's *I Feel So Good*."

Ronnie Earl

Guitarist Ronnie Earl has a new release available on Telarc, And Friends, that has the guitarist leading an all-star session with Luther' Guitar Junior' Johnson, Levon helm, David Maxwell, Irma Thomas, James Cotton and Kim Wilson on a collection of blues mostly done in the Chicago blues vein. Given his very interesting fusion of jazz and blues in some of his recent recordings, its a nice change of pace for him to return as to his blues roots with a excellent band that includes piano from Dave Maxwell and drums by Levon Helm of The Band fame. Vocals are spread between Kim Wilson, Luther 'Guitar Junior' Johnson and Irma Thomas with a harmonica duet by Wilson and Cotton, Dave Maxwell's strong evocation of Otis

Spann on the piano feature *Marie* and two instrumental features for Earl, one being the short closing rendition of Magic Sam's *Lookin' Good.* The level is quite high with Luther Johnson doing a top notch version of his Magic Sam's *All Your Love,* Irma Thomas doing a wonderful rendition of Bobby Bland's *I'll Take*

Care of You which seques into Ray Charles' Lonely Avenue, as well as New Vietnam Blues, a reworking of Junior Wells' Viet Cong Blues, reflecting the changes of the past three decades. Kim Wilson gets several places to shine including a fine vocal on Rock Me Baby and James Cotton's One More Mile, another of the three titles that have both Cotton and Wilson on harp. There is some terrific playing throughout, whether the fabulous interplay between Cotton and Wilson on Mighty Fine Boogie, Earl's evocation of Mel Brown and Buddy Guy on the two features for Irma Thomas and David Maxwell's consistently solid piano. There are a couple places where Earl's playing strikes me a bit too busy (particularly All Your Love, but his playing never overwhelms the vocal in part because of the restraint used in his volume and tone. And Earl is guite capable to play a completely supportive role as on the tracks with Cotton and

Wilson, playing some nice fills behind them. This is a wonderful recording which should have much appeal.

Li'l Ronnie & the Grand Dukes

Li'l Ronnie (Owens) and the Grand Dukes have been fixtures of the Richmond, Virginia, and Mid-Atlantic blues scene for years. Young & Evil is the group's new disc for Planetary Records and is a solid, rocking collection of blues that blend Gulf Coast and Chicago Blues styles with a pinch of rockabilly. Owens' laid back singing style suggests the choice of covering Slim Harpo's I've Been Your Good Thing was no accident. He and the Dukes perform solid covers of the afore-mentioned Slim Harpo blues, two George 'Harmonica' Smith songs, and the closing rendition of Amos Milburn's Chicken Shack Boogie. Owens' relaxed, soulful singing along with his careful crafted, swinging harp also enhance his wry original blues. Anson Funderburgh adds his guitar to several tracks including I've Been Your Good Thing and Think Big. This latter number is an instrumental that also includes some embellishments by guitarist Mike Dutton of Owens' harp playing. Funderburgh's presence perhaps raises the profile of this disc, but the discs considerable appeal arises from the consistently strong, swinging ensemble playing and imaginative, concise solos by the Grand Dukes, as well as

Owens' warm vocals and assured harmonica playing.

The Ford Brothers Band

Robben Ford and the Ford Brothers Blues Band have a new disc on Blue Rock'lt that should be self explanatory from its title, A Tribute to Paul Butterfield. The disc contains a dozen songs that were recorded from various permutations of the Butterfield Blues Band. One does not have to agree with Patrick Ford's nonsense that a list of Butterfield's band members reads like a who's who of modern blues to agree that Butterfield left a very distinguished legacy of recordings that helped introduce a number of folks into the blues. Harp duties are shared by Mark Ford and Andy Just, while both Volker Strifler and Robben Ford are both present on guitar throughout. These four gentlemen also handle on the vocals. Patrick Ford is on drums and horns and keyboards are added on differing tracks. Butterfield alumni Mark Natfalin plays keyboards on the reworking of Good Morning Little Schoolgirl. Most of these songs stick close to the Butterfield recordings, but one can feel the love and enthusiasm for these songs. Of the vocalist, Mark Ford stands out with his reworking of such latter Butterfield Blues band songs as in In My Own Dream and No Amount of Loving from the post-Mike Bloomfield edition of the band. Andy Just and Ford both remarkably suggest Butterfield's distinctive harp attack while maintaining their own musical personalities. If not an essential release, this is a nice remembrance of a distinguished musical legacy.

J.C. Burris

The late J.C. Burris was a nephew of Sonny Terry who moved to san Francisco in 1959 after a breakdown of a stormy marriage. Arhoolie has just issued **Blues Professor** which makes available Burris' hard-to-find vinyl album augmented by eleven new titles. Burris is unaccompanied

on harmonica and vocals, although on one track he does the Hand Jive, patting his chest, legs, arms and hands in a melodic fashion while on Mr. Jack's Dance, he taps on Mr. Jack, a homemade wooden dancing figure he fashioned from bits and ends of wooden crates, humming an scatting while one can hear Mr. Jack dancing away in a highly rhythmic fashion. Other songs feature his crying harp, very much showing his uncle's influence along with his very heart felt vocals on a collection of mostly original blues. The one exception is Hold Me Tight, a retitled version of the R&B rocker, Don't Let Go. Burris though is guite a songwriter whose lyrics have as much heart as his performances. River of Life has been recorded by Bernice Reagon. The original album came from live performances recorded in 1975 while ten of the eleven new recordings came from a self-recorded cassette by Burris for which the sound is perfectly acceptable. You probably will want to listen to this a few tracks at a time rather than straight through, but this disc certainly has great rewards for those who give it a fair listen.

The barbershop has been a haven for all who love the blues since it opened for business in 1959, a place where everyone from

Blues Festival where they conducted one of the workshops. The Foundation has held numerous guitar and harmonica workshops and sponsored music related excursions for kids

and senior citizens.

The release of a new recording by Archie Edwards is certainly going to be of great interest to all of lovers of acoustic blues. Fred Litwin, head of NorthernBluesMusic, is hopefully going to be in attendance for the concert.

DCBS Welcome to Kansas City Bluesmen Patrick Recob & Kurt Crandall

Some of you may remember a note posted on our bulletin board last year from Kansas City blues and jazz bassist Patrick Recob. Patrick introduced himself to area musicians by way of a bulletin board message asking for e-mail contacts to help him get acquainted with the DC blues scene prior to his relocation here. A number of local area musicians responded to Patrick, and many of us have had the pleasure of getting to know him by e-mail for the past year. Now the time has finally come, and Patrick will have madehis move here on September 1. Along with Patrick will be another KC blues musician named Kurt Crandall, who is a blues harp/vocalist that has also worked the KC blues circuit for a number of years.

Patrick spent 5 years as the bassist for the Midwest blues band Dangerfield/McNally, with whom hereleased 2 independent recordings Blues From Kings, and Extra Fine Vibe. In 1995, Patrick joined up with Black Top recording artist Gary Primich and toured the U.S., Canada, and Europe as the bassist for the "American Harmonica Battle" package tour. In 1996, Patrick formed his own band (the Recob-Bourne Band), then rejoined John McNally to play traditional jazz. In 1998, Patrick joined up with The Mistreaters, which was led by his friend Kurt Crandall on vocals and harp.

Kurt will also be a welcome addition to our local blues family and is no stranger to the DC area. Kurt first got the blues when he was a grad student down at James Madison University. Kurt found himself broke, unemployed, and to make matters worse, his girlfriend had just broken up with him. To help him get through his blue days, Kurt turned to the music of Muddy Waters and made the decision to give




Let's all throw out the welcome mat and give these guys a warm welcome to the DC blues community.
