


Reverend Gary Davis

Smithsonian/Folkwavs has issued a cd of previously unissued recordings by the legendary Reverend Gary Davis, If I Had My Way: Early Home Recordings. These informal recordings date from 1953 and predate most of the available Davis' recordings. Davis was among the greatest of all fingerstyle guitarists and influenced countless musicians including Stefan Grossman, Jorma Kaukoken, Roy Bookbinder and Larry Johnson. While he played blues when younger, he largely abandoned blues in the 1930s when he first recorded. He was a gospel street performer, not a gospel blues performer, a label that makes no sense, although he did perform some instrumentals of rags and marches. Included here are performances of several of his most celebrated songs including the title track (popularized by Peter Paul and Mary as' Samson and Delilah), Twelve Gates to the City, You Got to Move and I Belong to the Band. His wife, Annie Davis, joins on several songs including If the Lord Be With you (I Think I've Won a Victory) and There's Destruction in This Land. McKinley (Kinny) Peebles, who played with Davis on the street

and recorded as Sweet Papa Stovepipe, is accompanied by Davis on *He Never Has Left Me Alone*, while Davis joins in on *Got On My Traveling Shoes. Marine Band* and *Civil War Parade* display his remarkable facility on the guitar and his clean, precise delivery of the music. Recorded on a portable tape recorder, sound is quite acceptable and John Cohen has contributed a lengthy annotation that places Davis and his music in its context. This is an essential purchase for fans of the great Reverend Davis and will appeal to fans of the Piedmont fingerstyle guitar tradition.

Joe Louis Walker


Joe Louis Walker has just issued his fourth album in about a year, She's My Money Maker, The Slide Guitar Album (JSP). As the title states, the focus here is on slide guitar which Walker has played throughout the years, however never focusing on it as he does on this recording. Nine of the ten tracks are originals, with the exception of Born in Chicago, which Walker performs as a tribute to his friend, the late Mike Bloomfield. Walker has developed a distinctive style on the slide and combines this with his strong vocals to produce a typically satisfying album ranging from a take on a high performance car that opens this set Slow Down GTO; a medium tempo topical song, Poor Man Blues about it being a mean old world for living under the poor man who have to live under bridges and subsist on food stamps; the rocking Borrowed Time, that has a lyric similar in theme to Memphis' Slim's *Mother Earth*: the exuberant Slide Her Up and Down: the down-in-the-alley. 2:00 AM and where's my baby groove of No Easy Kind of Loving. The instrumental Hooker's Blues suggests Earl Hooker's Blue Guitar and the number is a tribute to Earl and his cousin, John Lee Hooker. Walker puts

down the slide and takes up the harmonica on *Eight Years* of *Lovin'*, with a lightly rocking piano accompaniment that closes this disc. Nobody in the blues has produced so many recordings, and which explore such a range of blues moods at such a high level over the past 15 years as Joe Louis Walker. **She's My Money Maker** is another addition to this distinguished musical legacy.

Big Joe Williams

Delmark has a new release by the late Big Joe Williams, I Got Wild. Williams, whose recording career spanned the thirties to the eighties, was a great Delta bluesmen who played and traveled with many legends, and contributed one of the blues most enduring classics, Baby Please Don't Go.

The selections on this latest release include alternate takes to previously issued songs, unissued tracks and some studio talk. From the opening Coffeehouse Blues to the closing remake of Washboard's Sam Back Door (familiar to some from Little Walter's recording, 'Tell Me Mama), these recordings have Williams fierce, rhythmic nine-string guitar playing and his fervent vocals. Its amusing listening to the studio chat before his rendition of Charlie Patton's Peavine Blues. where a couple of strings are broken so the engineer announces, Big Joe Williams and his six and half string blues. On many of these selections he is ably assisted by bassist Ransom Knowling, Bob Koester's recollections of Williams in the liner notes are also very informative. Big Joe was probably the single biggest influence on David''Honeyboy' Edwards and in all

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fairness to Edwards who is highly revered, his music only occasionally reaches the level of Williams. Big Joe Williams belongs in every blues collection, and if perhaps I would first recommend'**Piney Wood Blues** on Delmark, this music here is excellent and is recommended on its own.

Dr. John

The night before I got married, my friend Mike O'Donohue and I went to New York's Other End to see Dr. John in a solo performance. He even did a medley of Junco Partner with Jailbird at my request. Now the good Doctor has a live release, All By Hisself (Hyena), that captures the spirit of the show I saw. This is the first of a series of live recordings of Dr. John taken from some 600 hours of recordings of live performances that Dr. John has kept. This disc itself captures an 1986 engagement at New York's now-defunct Lone Star Cafe. The medley of Jailbird with Junco Partner is included here, although the number Jailbird that Smiley Lewis previously recorded is not acknowledged in the credits. There is a pretty good representation of classic New Orleans numbers including Swanee River

Boogie (taken from Fats Domino's recording); Archibald's take on a classic blues outlaw theme, Stagger Lee; Chris Kenner's Sick and Tired; and the Mardi Gras number, Iko Iko. Also included are several of Dr. John's compositions including' Average Kind of Guy (co-written with Doc Pomus); Such a Night; Qualified and Something You Got (Co-authored with Chris Kenner). The album closes with a medley of predominantly Huey 'Piano' Smith numbers. Dr. John was in terrific form that night and this splendid live recording kicks off this series on a very high note. This also includes a bonus DVD of Dr. John singing and talking about New Orleans music.

Matthew Robinson

Texas remains home for a number of blues artists, many of whom still play in neighborhood bars, although occasionally do a bit of touring, especially in Europe. The Austin based Dialtone label has issued several albums by lesser known artists that document some fine blues. One is Austin-based guitarist-singer Matthew Robinson whose album **And the Texas Blues Band** combines a nice mix of material to show off Robinson's soulful singing and searing guitar. The album opens with Robinson's take of Marvin Sease's I'm Mr. Jody. This is followed by a guest vocalist, his sister Glenda Sue Hargis, who does her take on *Eee Tee* (I believe Denise LaSalle first recorded) and which features a really hot guitar break. Robinson follows with a rendition of Sonny Boy Williamson's Don't Start Me Talking, with his solo electric guitar accompaniment based on the riff from Howlin' Wolf's Killing Floor. Robinson also does a rendition of Wolf's I Asked For Water, backed by only by the guitars of himself and probably Johnny Moeller. Hargis also has another vocal on her original Bumblebee, a nice slow blues forcefully sung with more stinging guitar in the backing. With the trumpets of Duck Jennings and Ephraim Owens and tenor saxophonist J.W. Davis riffing behind him, Robinson launches into the shuffle, It Takes a Long Time to Break in a Brand New Broom. There are a couple of unusual covers of songs usually

associated with women singers by Robinson. He sings I Got What It Takes that Willie Dixon wrote for Koko Taylor and the Cheatham's Meet Me With Your Black Drawers On. I am not sure who previously recorded *Too Many* Dirty Dishes, with Robinson finding "too many dirty dishes" in the sink "just for us too," which has him asking his wife "who is making dirty dishes with you." Its a nicely delivered blues in the tradition of such songs as Open House At My House. The album closes on a spirited Party All Night, that sounds like a reworking of Little Milton's The Blues Is All Right. Robinson puts a lot of heart in his vocals and plays equally fervently. There are rough edges in his voice, the guitar solos and the horn arrangements, but the performances feel and sound so right and true. Not an essential release but for those who want to hear some modern urban Texas blues, this is well worth checking out. Incidentally, while Robinson grew up playing in R&B groups, when he started getting serious on guitar, he was influenced by the band Storm that at the time included Jimmie Vaughan.

Little Joe Washington

Houston guitarist, Marion 'Little Joe' Washington, has had a noteworthy career

that included playing drums when he was 15 in a band led by Albert Collins. Later he became known as Little Joe because he imitated the late Joe Hughes. He toured with Rosco Gordon, than worked the territory between Texas and Nevada including spending time in El Paso and playing the infamous Lobby Bar in Juarez, Mexico. He made several singles in the mid-sixties though in the past couple decades he often was living on the streets. Often he owned nothing more than a pawn ticket for his guitar but as Roger Wood writes in the liner notes, Washington never stopped playing and has had a personal renaissance in the past few years. Dialtone has just issued, **Houston Guitar Blues.** The music here is, to quote Mr. Wood, "piercing fretwork on gutbucket guitar" and" "weathered, wailing voice," producing a distinctive sound in recordings that have "bursts of stream-ofconsciousness expressionism." Several songs hark back to recordings he made under Johnny Otis' direction for the Federal label including Somebody Loves Me, I Feel Alright, and Bossa Nova Part 2. Listening to his phrasing and guitar tone, one hears echoes of Johnny 'Guitar' Watson, Albert Collins and others in how he hammers his twisting guitar lines from the opening bars of the opening Hard Way 6 to the closing Bye Bye. Vocally he can't really capture the ballad feel on his remake of Somebody Loves Me, and his vocals are often a bit more fragmentary elsewhere as on I Feel Alright, a lengthy slow blues where her scats along with his solo and then his guitar echoes his vocal and then turning in blistering single note runs for the turn around. He takes things down in the alley on Last Tear, but is also capable of playing in a jazzy vein as on Bossa Nova 2 and the fine rendition of Horace Silver's Song For My Father. Both tracks benefit from the very adept rhythm section that accompany Washington on this disc. While his solos occasionally amble a bit and his weathered horse vocals and lyrics aren't fully developed, Washington's heart and soul are quite evident listening to this album that this writer did find compelling listening at times.

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John Brim and his wife Grace were part of the blues scene in Gary, Indiana that included Jimmy Reed, prior to Reed becoming a major blues star. Brim recorded for several labels including J.O.B. and Chess, and is known for such songs as the topical' Tough Times, Be Careful and Ice Cream Man. Fans of D.C. area bluesman Robert Lighthouse will be familiar with the last song from Robert's performances. In recent years Brim had an album on Tone-Cool and more recently did a studio album and a live album, that showed him still to be a vital performer of classic postwar Chicago blues. Rev. Willie Lee Morganfield, a preacher and gospel singer who had several gold records, passed away October 18, 2003 at the age of 76. One of 14 children, he was the cousin of Muddy Waters and was also born on Stovall's Plantantion. He was a member of various gospel groups including the New Orleans Chosen Five, the Soproco Singers, the Kings of Harmony (based in Baltimore and New York), and the Cleveland, Ohio based, the Delta Friendly Four which included two of his brothers. Later moving back south he sang with Early Wright's Four Star Quartet and the Clarksdale-based Glorybound Singers. He recorded gospel hits What Is This, Serving The Lord and Lord, Thank You, Sir, but was known even more for his sermons, several of which are available on cd. "I don't want to be known as a singer that can preach," he was quoted in Woke Me Up This Morning: Black Gospel Singers and The Gospel Life by Alan Young (University of Mississippi Press). "I want to be known as a preacher that can sing. 'Cause preaching is first. It takes priority." (Much of the information here is taken from The Rev. Willie Lee Morganfield (Muddy's Cousin), "Link

between gospel and blues," dies by Rebecca Hood-Adams from the October 20 Clarksdale (MS) Press Register.

Scott Dirks posted on the Blues-L internet mailing list that "Chicago blues bass man **Willie Black** died a couple of days ago. Willie was on the scene in Chicago from the mid '50s or so onward, and played with almost everyone at one time or another, but never did much recording. But he was a great, rock-solid player, and could do everything from traditional." Artists that Black recorded with include Lurrie Bell, Little Willie Anderson, Lacey Gibson, Brewer Phillips, Aaron Moore and Sunnyland Slim.
