One of the nicest guys you would ever want to meet, his infectious smile would light up a room. Will Scott of The Moonlighters is putting together a benefit to assist Willie's family at Bangkok Blues for Wednesday March 31. Performers include Jesse Yawn, Chris Polk, Memphis Gold, and The Moonlighters. We hope to have more details on Willie next month.

Blues in Passing

A number of blues artists have passed away the past few months. I have cribbed some of this information from **Blues & Rhythm** obituaries by Phil Wight, Tony Burke and others. Check their website, www.bluesandrhythm.co.uk, for information on subscribing to this excellent publication.

Henry Qualls, perhaps the last authentic Texas country bluesman, passed away December 7 of complications from stomach surgery. He would have been 70 this coming July. Living in Elmo, Texas, about 40 miles from Dallas, Qualls honed his technique watching Lightning Hopkins, Little Son Jackson and Frankie Lee Sims in Dallas. He recorded Blues From Elmo Texas on Chuck Nevitt's Dallas Blues Society Records, an album of originals, covers of blues classics and a grungy rendition of The Newbeats pop hit *Bread and Butter*. Qualls also had four songs included on the Cannonball compilation, Blues Across America- The Dallas Scene. Qualls may have played with erratic timing and some bum notes might creep in, but the rawness and the feeling of his music left an impression on those (like your editor) who have been fortunate enough to hear his music.

James Carter, whose recording of *Po Lazurus* opened the film, O Brother, Where Art Thou, died in Chicago on November 26. Lazurus was incarcerated in a Mississippi State Prison before he was recorded by Alan Lomax as part of field recordings Lomax made in 1959. Carter was born in December 1926 in Sunflower, Mississippi. After he was released from Prison in 1967, Carter moved to Chicago. He was located after the release of the film and presented a check for royalties as

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well as a platinum album for the soundtrack of O Brother.

Al 'TNT' Braggs, a noteworthy R&B singer and songwriter, died December 3 at the age of 65. A member of several vocal groups, Bobby Bland caught Al in a Dallas club in 1959 and shortly thereafter Don Robey signed him and had him record for Peacock Records. Braggs began opening shows for Bland with spectacular showmanship and had 13 records issued by Peacock but none cracked the sales charts. As a songwriter, he penned such Bobby Bland classics as *Call On Me, Soul of a Man* and *Share Your Love*. He also produced records by Little Joe Blue, Ernie Johnson and R.L. Griffin.

Clarence Butler, a harmonica player and singer who with twin brother Curtis formed Detroit's Butler Brothers died on December 22 at the age of 61. A Florence Alabama native, he moved with his brother to Detroit in the early 1960s. They recorded several albums including a couple of cds for the English JSP label.

E Rodney Jones, legendary disc jockey died on January 2. Jones was a mainstay of WVON in Chicago and later at Baton Rouge, Louisiana's WXOK. In Chicago, he was one of the most prominent dee jays spinning blues records and Jones dubbed himself "The Bluesologist." He was inducted into the Black Radio Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Blues Hall of Fame

John Hart, a tenor saxophonist who is best known for his association with Clifton Chenier died December 26 in Opelousas Louisiana at the age of 1971. While he played with other zydeco and Louisiana bands and recorded an album under his own name, Hart's tenor saxophone can be heard on some of Chenier's finest recordings including the legendary Arhoolie album, **Bogulusa Boogie**.

Rather than helping blues performers in general, O'Neal notes "Some of the biggest beneficiaries appear to be the huge corporations that control the licensing and publishing rights to the classic blues songs used in the Scorcese series and its companion CDs and DVDs. In fact, some of those conglomerates even other companies from licensing their material so they could exert exclusive control over "The Blues."

In a review of the so-called definitive (and Grammy® Awardwinning box set in **Blues & Rhythm**, Norman Darwen notes the strange absence of Lightnin' Hopkins and the inclusion of Butterfield, Mayall, Jeff Beck, Fleetwood Mac, stating "which if I am going get on my high horse, smacks of trying to justify the white appropriation of the music through historical means. The year of the blues did not address the issue, but I did notice that as I typed the 'white' names, all of them could be and indeed have been described as rock artists without anyone raising a murmer..."

The fact that this rock centric blues history won a Grammy® says more about these awards recognize hype more so than quality. At least that's my opinion. Ron
