Nap Turner

I was getting ready to work on this issue of the DC Blues Calendar when I received an email from Wayne Kahn about Nap Turner's passing. Many have seen the appreciation of Nap in the Washington Post. As a longtime member of the Society, I can tell you how much Nap has meant to us. I recall that Nap was one of the original directors of the Blues Society and participated in a number of events early in the Society's existence. There was the fundraiser the Society held to help the homeless at which Nap appeared with Bo Diddley, Jr. He was part of the line-up for the Society's first Blues festival. Nap later appeared at other Society events and he was a regular announcer at the Festivals as he was at the Bluebird Blues Festival. And one cannot help but remember Nap's performances at the Bluebird Festival, including a wonderful duet with the late Mary Jefferson.

Nap was also an important source of advice and encouragement. Former Society President Mike Roach mentioned several times how Nap was such a source of good ideas and advice. It was Nap who suggested we get Big Joe Maher to put together a backing band for Nappy Brown at our Third Festival, And Nap could always be counted on to help promote the Society, as he did for the jazz and blues community in the area.

When I first moved to the D.C. area, Nap, Bill Barlow and Jerry 'the Bama'Washington were the main voices for blues on WPFW. Each program had a different style and focus. Nap Turner's mix of jazz and blues on his "Don't Forget the Blues" program was invaluable. When the Bama passed away, Nap took over the show, although wisely continuing in the vein of his prior show, as no one could ever be another "Bama." The mix of music, poetry and storytelling provided Washington with a very distinctive listening experience that will be missed. His reading of the Simple stories by Langston Hughes brought to life the magical words of this great author. Nap's programs often were educational, but they never failed to be entertaining.

Nap was a veteran musician on the DC scene and also an actor, but it was not until Wayne Kahn recorded Nap for his Right on Rhythm label, that his music was issued on a recording. We are thankful to Wayne for documenting Nap's music, including Nap's only cds. The influence of Percy Mayfield was evident, in part by the number of Mayafield tunes that Nap performed. There is a eloguence and sophistication to Mayfield's poetic blues lyrics that well-suited Nap Turner.

You cannot replace Nap Turner. One can only hope we learned from his warmth, wit and wisdom and make this place a better world, like he did.

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Gaye Adegbalola


Neo-Classic Blues (Hot Toddy Music) is Gave Adegbalola's most recent "embrace" of the classic blues and the classic blues women. Accompanied by pianist Roddy Barnes, Gaye interprets wellknown classics and some obscure songs from the earliest days of blues recording. In addition, she contributes several originals that are presented in the same manner as her classic blues interpretations. From the opening moments of Ma Rainey's Black Bottom to the last notes of Roddy Barnes' Summer Sky, they treat us to some exquisite performances. Several selections are associated with Ma Rainey. In addition to the opening Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Gaye performs Yonder Come the Blues, Prove It to Me, and the immortal See See Rider, all of which Gaye delivers wonderfully with Barnes' complimentary backing. The bawdy The Dirty Dozens receives spirited treatment as does Lucille Bogan's BD Woman Blues. Another Bogan song, Sloppy Drunk, is taken at a distinctively slower tempo than Ann Rabson performs it with Saffire. Gaye's original, Twisted Woman Blues fits in seamlessly with Sippie Wallace's Up the Country Blues, while her ballad How Can I Say I Miss You, compliments her rendition of the Duke Ellington-Paul Webster classic, I Got It Bad and That Ain't Good. A couple of the most important songs in blues history are also refreshed by Gaye here. Crazy Blues, the bluesy Perry Bradford song that Mamie Smith recorded to launch the blues craze and Alberta Hunter's Down Hearted Blues that was Bessie Smith's first recording. In addition to the wonderful performances, Gaye provides short but insightful comments on all the songs in the notes. This is simply a marvelous disc of blues performed with so much heart and panache that is unreservedly recommended. She will have these at her Herndon Blues Festival appearance. Paul Oscher

This writer remembers catching Paul Oscher's impressive performance at the Pocono Blues Festi-

val in 2002. Oscher, was the harmonica player in the Muddy Waters Band between 1967 and 1971, the first white to be a regular member of this legendary band. He lived in Muddy's house and shared the basement with the great Otis Spann from whom he learned blues piano just like Muddy was his model for his slide guitar playing. Not nearly as known as other Muddy Waters' alumni, it is a reflection of the fact that fame is often elusive. With the release of his new Electro-Fi album, **Alone With the Blues**, one can hope that Oscher's time has finally arrived.

This is a varied album with solo performances mixed in with some small group sides. The mood ranges from his chromatic explorations on Richard Carpenter's *Walkin'* (yes, the tune known from Miles Davis' recording), a telling reworking of Jimmy Rogers' *That's Alright*, the zydeco groove of *My Sweet Suzanne*, with



his chromatic harp replacing the accordion, and his recasting of the Standing at the Crossroads theme into how John Lee Hooker might have reworked the song back in 1950, Blues and Trouble, is a slow Muddy Waters-styled blues with some strong slide playing, while on Chuck Willis' You're Still My Baby he plays guitar and rather full-bodied rack harp, and the title track is an instrumental tour de force based on After Hours, on which Oscher plays assorted harmonicas and the melodica. David Maxwell and ex-Muddy sidemen, Calvin Jones and Willie Smith, back his rendition of Robert Nighthawk's Anna Lee, while he plays accordion on Mississippi John Hurt's Louis Collins. The versatility does not obscure the fact that Paul Oscher's playing is of the highest level and his vocals ring true on this superb disc that is highly recommended.

Rod Piazza & the Mighty Flyers

Rod Piazza and the Mighty Flyers have a new disc on Blind Pig, Keepin' It Real. Its the first disc to feature guitarist Henry Carvajal and drummer Paul Vincent Fasulo. Long-time bassist Bill Stuve remains along with Piazza and his wife, pianist Honey Piazza. The album attempts to recreate the feel of their live performances with Piazza even introducing the band on the opening, Big Blues Party. As might be expected, the group is tight and swings with the rhythm section being exceptional. Carvajal is yet another fine guitarist to play with Piazza, and takes a credible vocal on Ain't Nothing Happening. While I find Piazza an inconsistent singer, he is quite strong on thew rocking Baby Please Don't Go, patterned after Muddy Waters' classic recording. Of course he is a brilliant harp player as the evocative West Coast Midnight Blues indicates. Thoughout this disc his playing is consistently swinging, and inventive, with a marvelous full-tone. Piazza is a master of the Mississippi Saxophone indeed. Like the live performances, this set contains a

boogie feature for Honey Piazza, *Buzzin'*, which unfortunately goes too long as the closing *Devil's Foot*. One problem with an attempt to recreate a live performance is the failure to edit one's performances.

Bobby Rush


Among the most popular entertainers in the blues arena, Bobby Rush has taken control over his own music by founding his own label, Deep Rush. Among the label's initial releases are **Live at Ground Zero** and **FolkFunk**. **Live at Ground Zero** is a CD/DVD combo taken from a live performance at the Ground Zero Blues Club that actor Morgan Freeman is co-owner of. The DVD captures Bobby in a typical performance that includes his dancers and provides the video aspect to his music that one

cannot get on an audio recording. The songs are familiar to anyone who has seen Bobby in performance and include *She's So Fine, Evil, I Ain't Studdin' You, Crazy ' Bout You, Everybody Knows Who I Am,* and *Chicken Heads*. The CD contains the audio for the eleven tracks on the DVD and two other numbers including *Sue*. This is the perfect souvenir for anyone who has seen Bobby live. No surprises are found here, but the performance is at the level one expects from this veteran.

The more recent FolkFunk finds Rush with a smaller band. Gone are the twin keyboards. Instead we have a trio led by Alvin 'Youngblood' Hart backing Rush's vocals and harp. This sparser backing gives the music a bit more intimate feel. The music here is mostly adapted from some classic blues themes as one can hear echoes of John Lee Hooker and Junior Parker on the two parts of Feeling Good that bookend the performances here, while Rice 'Sonny Boy Williamson is evoked in the rendition of Ninety-Nine. Otis Spann's The Blues Will Never Die is echoed in Rush's Everybody Wants to Know, while Ride in My Automobile is a theme countless blues artists have handled and Rush handles at an easy groove here. In addition to the down home funk feel of Uncle Esau, Rush revisits his classic Chicken Heads, while Voodoo Woman mixes lines from several sources for a song about going to Louisiana to get a mojo hand to do away with this spell the woman is putting on Bobby. Youngblood Hart provides some sympathetic backing for Rush with some nice stinging guitar at spots, but never overAll in all an interesting disc, and one must be curious to what extent Rush uses this material and approach in his live performances.



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8th Annual Herndon Blues Festival

BluesFest 2004, the 8th annual Herndon Blues Festival takes place Saturday July 24 at Frying Pan Park. One of the few blues festivals devoted to acoustic blues, this year's festival brings back some favorites and introduce new blues performers to the DC area. The free **BluesFest 2004** is from Noon to 8:00 PM though donations are requested and appreciated. As always we are pleased to present an overview of this festival which the Society has supported since its first year.

This year's festival opens at noon with **Frank Fotusky**. Fotusky plays Acoustic Blues in the style reminiscent of the great East Coast "Piedmont" players such as Rev. Gary Davis, Blind Boy Fuller, John Jackson, Blind Willie McTell to name a few. Along with this repertoire, his original compositions are rooted in this era and still carry a contemporary feel. He has performed with John Jackson, Paul Geremia, Roy Book Binder, Hubert Sumlin and was a solo finalist at the 2003 International Blues Challenge in Memphis. **Blues Access** said, "(Frank) offers a sparkling guitar

sound on fine Piedmont-style blues and rags....Fotusky's clean fingering draws you in and projects the music, which would be somber in other hands, out." In the fall of 1999, Frank released his first CD **Teasin' The Frets** to widespread acclaimand he has a new c.d. coming out.

At 1:00 PM, members of the Archie Edwards Blues Heritage Foundation will be performing. Located at 2007 Bunker Hill Road in Northeast Washington at the old Alpha Tonsorial Parlor that blues legend Archie Edwards owned and operated until his death, the Foundation keeps the legacy of one of the DC Blues Society's founders alive with the almost weekly Saturday jam sessions and special programs they hold that help pass down the legacy of Archie, just like he passed down the music he learned from the likes of Mississippi John Hurt. Mike Baytop the Foundation's President is likely to perform along with N.J. Warren, Nap Brundage and other jam regulars.

At 2:00 PM, **Rick Franklin and Neil Harpe** take the stage. Franklin and Harpe were there with Archie Edwards and others at the Blues Society's founding concert in May 1987, and have performed at a variety of Society events. Both have been directors of the Society and are regulars today at the Barbershop jams. They play a mix of acoustic blues ranging from songs associated with the Delta, Memphis along with the Piedmont and a healthy dose of Hokum blues. The two have recorded a couple of recent cds. Their mix of superb musicianship, strong, goodnatured vocals and a wide repertoire will delight audiences.

Gaye Adegbalola takes the stage at 3:00PM. Gaye is best known as a member of Saffire-the Uppity Blues Women, with whom she has made a number of acclaimed albums and toured world-wide with a mix of classic and new blues songs. A former activist, later a school teacher, she has developed into one of the finest singers (and songwriters) in the blues world. In addition to her performances and recordings with Saffire, Gaye teaches vocals at the annual Blues Week that is part of the Augusta Heritage Workshops at Davis & Elkins College in Elkins WV every year. Gaye, with pianist Roddy Barnes, has a wonderful new Hot Toddy c.d., **Neo-Classic Blues**, which is reviewed elsewhere.

Reverend Robert B. Jones takes the stage next, at 4:30 PM. He is a native of Detroit, with roots in Alabama and Mississippi. His background includes over fifteen years of experience as a blues performer, historian, radio-broadcaster, and educator. He is also an ordained Baptist minister who feels that blues has a lot to offer in terms of spiritual content. Jones is an extraordinary instrumentalist, playing guitar, slide guitar, harmonica, mandolin, fiddle, quills, and banjo in a variety of regional styles. In fact, he uses vintage instruments typical of early blues in order to convey the tradition and feel of the music. His albums include **In the Tradition** and **Blues From the Lowlands**. A marvelous performer he enlivens his performances with his storytelling gifts. Local blues master **Daryl Davis** (pictured on this page) is next at 5:45PM. The multi-talented Daryl Davis has been entertaining mid-Atlantic audiences for over two decades. Davis was

> mentored by legendary pianists Pinetop Perkins and Johnnie Johnson. In fact, he replaced Pinetop as the pianist in The Legendary Blues Band. He has established himself as perhaps the preeminent blues and boogie woogie pianist in the Mid-Atlantic, but is equally impressive as a guitarist and a vocalist. He is also a songwriter, author and actor. While Daryl has appeared on a number of recordings including Cephas & Wiggins' Flip Flop & Flv, it was not until the British Armadillo label issued Daryl's American Roots, that his fans could buy a recording by him which includes his aptly titled original, I'm a Boogie Man, along with homages to Chuck Berry and Jerry Lee Lewis.

Paul Rishell and Annie Raines close out the festival at 7:00PM. Paul Rishell honed his craft during the folk and blues revival of the 1970's. Possessed of a singular drive and passion, he soaked up all he could learn playing alongside blues masters Son House, Johnny Shines and

Howlin' Wolf.. Annie Raines took up harmonica while in high school and dropped out of college to pursue a musical career. Influenced by the trademark sounds of Muddy Waters, Little Walter and Sonny Boy Williamson, she played with Louis Myers and James Cotton. She has been hailed as one of today's top blues harpists, and now plays mandolin in addition to singing, writing, and playing keyboards. She met Paul Rishell during the recording of his CD, **Swear to Tell the Truth**, in 1993. Since then they have toured extensively together and recorded a number of acclaimed discs. Their CD, **Moving to the Country**, won the 2000 W.C. Handy Award for Acoustic Blues Album.

The festival takes place rain or shine in a barn and there will be plenty of food and beverage available from vendors. Frying Pan Park is located at 2709 West Ox Road in Herndon. Directions from I-66 is get off at Exit 55, Fairfax County Parkway, Route 7100 and go north for 6 miles, turn left on West Ox Road and go about 1.4 miles till you get to the Park where you will turn right. Brother Ray

Ray Charles' death of course deprives the music world of one those figures who shaped popular music. To use an expression used to describe Duke Ellington, Ray Charles' music is beyond category.

It is almost impossible to understate his influence or importance. His fusion of blues jazz and gospel led to modern soul music and his expansion into country and popular music helped performers from all backgrounds break down genre barriers. Numerous singers were influenced by The Genuis. Falls Church native Heywood 'Little Sonny' Warner was one of those. I still remember interviewing Sonny for the

DC Blues Calendar several years ago to promote his DC Blues Festival appearance and recalling Ray Charles being his main

man, Sonny told me about the time he and Ray were together at a hotel or backstage in New Orleans and swapping lyrics on one of Ray's classics. So many of Ray's R&B classics have become standards for soul and blues artists.

Drowing in My Own Tears, A Fool For You. I Got a Woman, What'd I Say and Jumping in the Morning. Fortunately Ray Charles left a substantial and brilliat musical legacy. I recommend The Birth of Soul, the three cd Atlantic box with all of his classic Atlantic singles and Ray Charles Live with performances from Atlanta and the Newport Jazz Festival.

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


