Westcott Brothers Band Win Tight Battle of the Blues

This year's Battle of the Bands featured a fantastic mix of 6 bands, after a full round of judging the 21 entries! The Battle was full of talent and it came down to .03 of a point between the winning band and the runner up.

Kicking it off with a bang was the Eddie Becker Blues Band with 4, count 'em 4 horns down front! They whizzed and turned through the blues and got the crowd to their feet. Next up to preach the blues was one of the area's best preachers... 'Big Daddy' Stallings and band who delivered a full and dangerous set with all the fixins. The Sherwood Blues Band was the next to grace the stage and that is exactly what they did... Sherwood sang, played harp and then brought the house down to a whisper with a beautiful and intimate solo tune - just the man and his guitar. Mike Westcott & Blues on Board hit the stage hoping to keep that crown as Battle winners two years in a row. They put on a tight set with Mike at the helm but alas the crown was passed. Bringing his old buddies back into his band, Clarence "Bluesman" Turner dazzled the audience with his fast fret work and his willingness to jump, and dance, in the middle of the crowd while he balanced the guitar behind his head. Closing out the battle were Mike Westcott's own brothers The Westcott Brothers Band sharing their own special mix of the blues and closing out one of the Society's great highlights of the year! Dare you ask who that runner up band was that scored so close to the Westcott's, well... it was the Bluesman himself, Mr. Clarence Turner and band.

Thanks to all the musicians, the judges (Brad Selko, Dr. S.O. Feelgood, Marilyn & George Cushman, Steve Levine and Sam'i Nuriddin), the volunteers (Joyce, Helen, Wanda, Karen, Gloria and Suni), the volunteer coordinator Ms. Cassie Sweet, Reid Lohr for steering the ship, Audrey for her math skills, the board for its support and fancy footwork on the floor, Ron Weinstock for great pictures, Blu Lou for his expert advise and help, Mike and Chris of the Surf Club, all the great bartenders and wait staff and you, the folks that came out to support it!

Marva Wright Benefit Fills Bangkok Blues

Friday, November 4, I was at Bangkok Blues in Falls Church VA, for a benefit for the New Orleans blues queen, Marva Wright. Wright, who with her family, evacuated to the Baltimore area after Hurrican Katrina. There had been a benefit for her at Madam's Organ in Washington, and a clip from it was shown on WUSA-TV, showing her with Bobby Parker and the Hungarian Ambassador to the USA backing her on guitar.

The opening act was Margie Perez and her band doing some fine original material mostly backed by a really solid band. Most of the band had never played with Ms. Perez before, and did a fine job. The band included Peter Locke on keyboards. Peter was a member of The BluesHounds who won the DC Blues Society's Battle of the Blues in the 1990's. Margie Perez is a DC native who moved

to New Orleans and returned here after Katrina, although she's moving back to the Cresecent City soon. She writes clever songs, and has a very appealing delivery that showcases a vivacious personality over a range of material that even included an amusing song about Beatle Bob (yes JazzFest regulars, that Beatle Bob).

Marva came on with Freddie King's brother Benny Turner on bass, L.T. King (part of Margie's band) on drums, Locke on keyboards and Robert Lighthouse on guitar, with a Thai alto sax player joining on several numbers. Benny opened up with a number and Lighthouse played some fine slide before Marva took over the place with *Let*











the Good Times Roll, and other songs. The band did a fine job of supporting her and Lighthouse stood out almost as much as her vocals, making for a great set of blues. Margie Perez also joined the band for a couple numbers during the set. It has been several years since I saw Marva Wright at JazzFest and she sounded even more commanding in the small club setting of Bangkok Blues which drew a full house.

Since Marva Wright relocated from New Orleans after Katrina, there have been several shows around Charm City, as well as the weeknight benefit at Madam's Organ. She is not rushing back to the Crescent City and staying around for Baltimore for awhile, so those living in the Mid-Atlantic can be treated to having her around for some time. Hopefully we will not take this talent for granted.

DC Arts Community Receiving Increased Funds Funds include Blues Festival Grant

Mayor Anthony A. Williams presented a symbolic check for \$4.5 million to DC artists and arts organizations representing the increased funding available for grants in FY 2006 for Washington's cultural community. This amount is a substantial increase over previous years and allows the DC Commission on the Arts and Humanities to provide financial support to approximately 400 artists and arts organizations through its competitive grant programs. The funding awards will support public performances, arts in education and other cultural enrichment activities. The average grant awards were \$12,000 for arts organizations and \$4,700 for individuals. Arts and culture are the second leading industry for the city behind tourism, generating an impressive \$1.4 billion for the District's economy each year. This funding includes the funds for the grant the Society will receive to help produce the 2006 DC Blues Festival. D.C.Blues Society Vice-President Amanda Sweet were among those present when Williams presented his symbolic check. Otis Rush

News of a previously unissued live recording of Otis Rush from the mid-seventies created much excitement among blues enthusiasts. Rush, a Mississippi native, moved to Chicago and became part of the West Side Chicago blues scene playing some blistering guitar and singing with great fervor. One of many blues artists in the post-B.B. King style, Rush's first recording for the Cobra label, I Can't Quit You Baby, charted on the R&B charts, and was followed by early recordings including All Your Love (I Miss Loving), My Love Will Never Die, and Three Times a Fool. After the Cobra label folded, he briefly was on Chess and then Don Robey signed him but only issued one single, Homework. Many of these songs have become part of the modern blues repertoire and covered by such blues-rock acts as John Mayall, Led Zeppelin and J. Geils. He was one of the artists featured on the legendary Chicago The Blues Today series and has had a number of albums issued over the past three decades.


Delmark issued **Cold Day in Hell** in the mid-1970's and it had received a fair amount of airplay on rock station WXRT which led to WXRT recording and broadcasting Rush in performance from Chicago's Wise Fool's Pub in January 1976. Now about three decades later, this performance is available for all blues lovers on a new Delmark cd, **All Your Love I Miss Loving.** Featuring his superb band of the time with Bob Levis on second guitar, Bob Stroger on bass, Jesse Green on drums and Alberto Gianquinto (ex-James Cotton, ex-Santana) on piano, Rush is in superb form opening with B.B. King's *Please Love Me* and redoing his *All Your Love* and *It Takes Time* as

well other songs from King, T-Bone Walker and Chuck Willis. To hear Rush, one of the most intense guitarists in the blues laying out his soul singing *You're Breaking My Heart*, or rearranging T-Bone Walker's *Mean Old World* to the melody of *I Can't Quit You Baby*, one is treated to a performance that will reaffirm for many of us why we love the blues, to paraphrase Steve Tomashefsky's liner notes. Few blues artists put as much soul into their performances and reach the level that Rush at his best achieved, and it is as his best that one hears here.

Maison de Blues Barclay Masters

There is a myth that there was very little new blues of note recorded in the 1970's. The fact is labels like Alligator, Delmark and Blind Pig produced fine albums and labels like Stax and Jewel produced strong modern urban blues. Also there was a number of recordings released in Europe, usually by touring American musicians on labels like Isabel and Black & Blue. Three reissues from Barclay's Maison de Blues series caught my attention, and replace my worn vinyl lps.

Memphis Slim & Buddy Guy, **Southside Reunion**, was recorded when Buddy Guy and Junior Wells was touring Europe in September 1970 and this 35 year old session brought together the expatriate Slim with the Buddy Guy-Junior Wells Band for a terrific session mixing Slim's rolling barrelhouse piano, urbane singing with the tough sound Guy and Wells



provided with one of the great all-time blues bands. Guy and Wells had Phil Guy on rhythm guitar, Ernest Johnson on bass, A.C. Reed and Jim Conley on sax and Roosevelt 'Snake' Shaw on drums. With Slim kicks it off with Buddy on the hot, opening shuffle, When Buddy Comes to Town. I doubt Buddy could match this today far as few bands today could handle the shuffle groove or settle in so ably behind Slim on Leroy Carr's classic, How Long Blues. Guy also sings on You're the One while Wells throughout ably supports on harp. An alternate take of You're the One, and Jamming at the Castle, are bonus tracks and come across as worthy companions for a really magnificent reissue.

Professor Longhair was at the beginning of his re-emergence when he recorded the 1974 release Rock'n'Roll Gumbo which has been reissued on George Winston's Dancing Cat label with horns added to the reworking of Mardi Gras in New Orleans. The Maison de Blues reissue is musically the same as the Dancing Cat and had Fess pared with Gatemouth Brown on guitar (and fiddle for Jambalaya), with a rhythm section of Julius Farmer on bass, Sheba Kimbrough and Alfred 'Uganda Roberts on congas. The music is marvelous as the empathy between Gatemouth and Fess is obvious whether on the remake of Hey Now Baby and Tipitina or bringing a fresh take to *Junco Partner*, Ray Charles' Mess Around, Stag-o-lee, and Mean Ol' World. After the mix of funk and blues grooves, the album closes with just Fess at the piano taking care of business on (They Call Me) Dr. Professor Longhair. This is perhaps my favorite Longhair album.

The third reissue is Clifton Chenier's **Frenchin' the Boogie**, recorded at a time when Stanley

'Buckwheat' Duval was part of the band. The Frenchin' in the title refers to the fact that Chenier sings a number of blues and rhythm and blues classics in creole french. Their are several nods to Louis Jordan, *Caldonia, Choo-Choo Ch'Boogie*, and Laissez *Les Bon Tons Roulet* (a retitled *Let the Good Times Roll*) along with versions of *Shake Rattle and Roll* and *Going Down Slow* mixed with a waltz. Chenier was in peak form for this 1976 session, singing ebulliently and soulfully, putting as much soul in his piano accordion as Jimmy Smith on the organ and the Red Hot Louisiana Band rocking as hard as any band ever did. Like the other two releases, this is spectacular stuff.

Johnny Guitar Watson

Few folk have had as much influence in the worlds of blues, soul and funk than Johnny 'Guitar' Watson. As David Ritz notes in the liner notes of the two disc, **The Funk Anthology** (Shout Factory), Watson lends a long shadow over hip hop, with the track *It's About the Dollar Bill*, exemplifying this best although rappers have long sampled his grooves and Snoop Doggy Dogg lifted a trademark phrase from Watson's *Bow Wow* (Which Watson in performance referred to as the dog song). He was a major influence on folks as varied as Etta James ("He's my model. He taught me to sing blues. He



taught me to sing ballads. ..."), Jimi Hendrix, The Vaughan Brothers ("He made magic," according to Jimmy), Prince and too many others to list as well as admired by so many others including Marvin Gaye, the Neville Brothers and Lightnin' Hopkins. When he collapsed in Japan on stage during the second verse of Superman Lover, a four decade career that took him from Houston to the world and transformed Young John Watson into the Gangster of Love and Superman Lover, from the pianist who could rock the boogie like Amos Milburn to the guitarist who wowed Frank Zappa with tracks like Three Hours Past Midnight and the incredible guitar showpiece from the mid-fifties space guitar plus his originals of *Gangster of Love* (with him playing a version on guitar for RPM and piano for Federal. I suspect Watson's recording of One Room *Country Shack* inspired Buddy Guy to do that number. Then their was his acclaimed piano album, the duets with Larry Williams which probably did not catch the mood of the audience turning to Motown, the two superb albums for fantasy which anticipated his maturation and funkster for DJM in the

seventies. The Funk Anthology has two and a half hours of Watson's music from his seven DJM albums From Ain't it a Bitch in 1976 to Johnny 'Guitar' Watson and the Family Clone (1981), as well as his last album in 1994, Bow Bow for Bellmark). This compilation made by his children certainly is full with some terrific music, some of which has become staples of blues and funk bands today like A Real Motha For Ya, Superman Lover, You Can Stay But the Noise Must Go and Bow *Wow.* There's the humorous post-Watergate *I Don't Want to* Be President that he co-authored with Percy Mayfield (and on whose Atlantic recording of this Watson played). I Want to Ta-Ta You Baby has to be as sexy a love song as one is gonna hear anywhere and with the mix of his soulful and bluesy vocals, modern funk feel the other songs like Ain't It a Bitch, the humorous Telephone Bill (where he sings about calling his woman after 9:00PM when the rates go down), the closing *Johnny G is Back*, although of course he never left and he does revisit and funkify Gangster of Love. I am sure that some of those who complain about 'purists' in the blues will also dismiss this as funk and not blues, but the simple fact is for the seventies through the nineties this was as contemporary as the blues got. Shout Factory will be reissuing the eight album collected here separately, so this also serves as an introduction to those releases. These two discs will certainly keep things funked up quite nicely.

Dan Penn and Spooner Oldham

The boundaries between blues and soul is a fluid one especially today. A variety of releases illustrate the continuing appeal of performers who can straddle both worlds. **Dan Penn and Spooner Oldham** are among those who helped the development and evolution of soul music, as songwriters and in Oldham's case as a member of some great studio bands. Think of James & Bobby Purify's I'm Your Puppet, The Box Tops Cry Like a Baby, and Solomon Burke's Out of Left Field, and



you have some of the classics the duo wrote along with other great songs like It Tears Me Up, A Woman Left Lonely and You Left the Water Running. And Penn with Chips Woman wrote Do Right Woman, Do Right Man for Aretha and the James Carr deep soul classic, The Dark End of the Street. Proper American has just issued Moments From the Theatre, a collection of live performances from 1997 when they opened for Nick Lowe in England and Ireland triumphs red. Oldham's Wurlitzer piano and Penn's acoustic guitar provide the backing for Penn's soulfully rendered vocals on the previously enumerated classic songs and others. The intimacy and sparse backing highlights Penn's delivery of the lyrics that stand out even more than on so many classic recordings. Penn may not quite take us to church but he certainly does deliver the goods (Oldham sings one song) and a welcome release.

Bettye Lavette

Bettye Lavette is one of the most exhilarating performers this writer has seen in the past few years. Blues Express issued a superb album a few years ago that led her to win several major blues awards. Joe Henry and Anti Records' Andy Kaulkin got her into the studio to record

a disc modeled after Solomon Burke's recent discs which had Burke record songs by contemporary songwriters. This time all the songwriters are women and Lavette release I've Got My Own Hell to Raise (Anti) should take her to similar recognition. From the opening a capella rendition of Sinead O'Connor's I Do Not Want What I Haven't Got that comes off like a field holler to the closing treatment of Fiona Apple's Sleep to Dream from which the album title derives, Lavette lets everything out when singing. There might be vocal similarities to Tina Turner (who covered some of her sixties recordings), but Lavette never strays from the lyrical themes of hurt, heartache and looking for her angel. With the sparse backing band providing her with the framework to deliver her voice at times evokes the field holler as on the opening track, while at other times sing sings of heartaches as only one who has experienced them as she has can deliver. Some new lyrics are added to Lucinda Williams' Joy and she transforms Rosanne Cash's On the Surface into a deep soul masterpiece as well as the wonderful country ballad, *Just Say So,* by Bobby Cryner with just simple acoustic guitar backing. When she sings "never trust the heart of a man" in Dolly Parton's Little Sparrow, one knows she is not just singing words. A superb disc that gets better with every new listen. She appears at Fall Church's The State Theater on December 1.

Lou Pride

Severn Records latest new disc is by the terrific soul-blues belter, *Lou Pride*, Keep on Believing. Mostly comprised of Pride's originals, Pride's performances benefit from a strong studio band that includes the fabulous Texas guitarist Jon Moeller, Benjie Porecki on keyboards, Steve Gomes on bass and Robb Stupka on drums. Backing vocalists on the disc include Lady Mary and Margie Clarke, two of the D.C. area's finest female singers along with Eddie Jones, the leader of the old school group, The young Bucks with a full horn section punching out their riffs using Willie Henderson's arrangements. After the strong groove of *Midnight Call*, Pride handles his one cover

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on this disc, Bob Marley's Waiting in Vain, with his vocal complemented by his vocal that does not overuse his falsetto towards the end. A quote notes a touch of Bobby Bland in his approach, but to these ears Al Green and Otis Clay are more apt touchstones for his singing. The relentless groove on I Can't Hold It, suggests the classic Hi Rhythm section with a strong, concise guitar solo from Moeller. The topical plea of Love Will Make It Alright, with its hope to change this world of hate and strife is followed by a terrific soul ballad with a great vocal and lyric, I Want to Hold Your Hand, and the medium tempo-ed lament Another Broken Heart. The remainder of this disc keeps up this high level with some exquisite playing and Pride's strong singing for a terrific, soulful session. Another really fine release from David Earl's label.

Books on the King of the Blues

One looking for a holiday present for a blues lover could do far worse than purchasing an absolutely wonderful new coffee table book plus more devoted to the King of the blues. **The B.B. King Treasures : Photos, Mementos & Music from B.B. King's Collection** is by King, Dick Waterman and Charles Sawyer (Bulfinch). Sawyer, who wrote the first booklength biography of King, The Arrival of B.B.

King, contributes a concise biography from King's days growing up in Mississippi to his days as an ambassador for the music. The remainder of the book is filled with King's recollections as given to Dick Waterman who supplements these recollections of growing up, working on the farm, moving to Memphis, touring and crossing over. There are not only some terrific photographs (many are very rare), but also some reproductions of memorabilia including his sharecropping account from 1940, mostly tickets, programs and posters for his shows, along with sheets showing how much he was earning prior to Sid Seidenberg taking over King's management in the late sixties. You can witness his rise from sharecropping to his WDIA days to becoming a major musical performer that transcends genres to receiving the musical equivalent of the Nobel Prize in Sweden as King Carl XIV Gustaf hands him the 2004 Polar Music Prize. In addition there is a cd with King's recollections and some unissued tracks. This is a multi-media feast for fans of one of the true legends of world music. Compiled in part to celebrate his 80th birthday, The B.B. King Treasures, is a treasure. While it has a \$40.00 list price and is in local stores, it can be obtained from amazon. com and other places for under \$30.00. Hopefully places will have it on sale for the holidays.

A different approach to King and his life is **B.B. King, There is Always One More Time** by David McGee (Backbeat Books). Part of the **Lives in Music** series, McGee provides some biographical overview of King's music and life but this is really a survey of King's lengthy recording career that is now in its sixth decade. This is more than simply a survey of King's extensive recordings as McGee has interviewed numerous participants in many of these recordings ranging from first sessions with the Nashville Bullitt label and Calvin Newborn who was on that session with other members of his family to his recent collaborations with various blues and pop superstars. He also provides extensive



commentary on the recordings themselves which can be somewhat exhausting reading at times although worthwhile as he traces the development and maturation of King's style and maturation. Unfortunately some of the major players, especially in King's earlier days like Maxwell Davis are no longer with us. He presents his opinions intelligently and fervently, and is not afraid to critique some recordings. He generally notes the sources of King's recordings although there are gaffes as he fails to correct the source of *Gambler's* Blues that King originally recorded on his Blues is King disc (it was a top ten hit for Dinah Washington as You Satisfy and then redone by her as Gambler's Blues), nor correctly attribute Sloppy Drunk (he attributes it to Jimmy Rogers who likely got it from John Lee 'Sonny Boy' Williamson but the song goes back to Lucille Bogan). There are a few other examples and also King's first three albums for ABC Paramount are inadequately covered. The first album Mr. Blues is discussed but not given its own subchapter like most recordings but neither Confessin' the Blues nor Paying the Cost to be the Boss are mentioned nor analyzed even briefly. While King's guest appearance with U2 is discussed at length (deservedly so), his appearances on cds by blues legends and associates like Arthur Adams and

Robert Lockwood, Jr., are not mentioned. This is not as serious as the omission of the ABC albums, but these recordings still say a lot about King, especially Lockwood who played an important role in helping shape King's career at the beginning. These points detract a little from the book, but are relatively minor. This is slower reading than **The B.B. King Treasures**, but that is in its very nature of what McGee is attempting. It is not something for a vary casual fan of the blues or even King, but rather for the serious enthusiast of his music. One will fine much to provoke thought and perhaps lead one to listen again or anew to King's music.

Hot December & January Blues To Warm Up Those Wintertime Blues

There are a number of noteworthy blues coming to the area for December and January. Hopefully this will get to you by December 1 so you don't miss the great **Bet-tye Lavette** if you can help it. This veteran soul and blues

singer has a terrific new disc out and she puts on an amazing show, as your editor can attest to from her Pocono Blues Fest appearance a couple years back. Also at the State Theater in December will be **Pinetop Perkins, Bob Margolin, Willie 'Big Eyes' Smith** and **Mookie Brill**.
